BAPTISM


To begin the process of having your child baptized, please call the office or visit our website.

IS CHRIST DIVIDED? ST. PAUL'S CHALLENGE TO THE CHURCH TODAY

Is Christ divided? (1 Corinthians 1:13)

Today is the final day of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. For the past week, believers from virtually every Christian tradition have been praying for an end to all division among Christians: an end to the division between the Orthodox, Protestant, and Catholic churches; an end to divisions between Orthodox, Protestant, and Catholic believers; and an end to divisions within churches and parishes.

What a perfect reading, then, to close out this week! In it, we get a glimpse of St. Paul's inspired insights into causes of division. When he learns that factions are threatening the church at Corinth, he goes right to the heart of the problem. "Is Christ divided?" he asks, almost sarcastically (1 Corinthians 1:13). In other words, *How can you take sides like this when you were all baptized into the one Lord, Jesus Christ?*

Paul understood that divisions happen when we focus too much on our own opinions and selfish desires and not enough

on Jesus. We might favor one church leader over another (1 Corinthians 1:12). We might prefer our wealthy brothers and sisters over those who are struggling (11:18-22). Or we might be more impressed with those who seem spiritually gifted and less so with the ones who seem "ordinary" (12:4-7). But in each case, one crucial truth gets obscured: "In one Spirit we were all baptized into one body," the body of Christ (12:13).

Cardinal Raniero Cantalamessa, former preacher to the papal household, once said, "If we will turn to Christ and go forward together toward him, we Christians will draw closer to each other" (Sermon, March 18, 2016). The closer we get to Jesus, the more he heals our wounds and leads us to repentance. And the more we are healed and forgiven, the easier it becomes to love and reconcile with each other.

No, Christ is not divided. So let's all draw closer to him and ask him to make us one! "*Jesus, heal every division! Lord, bring us together!*"

HOLY FATHER PROCLAIMS JUBILEE YEAR OF ST. FRANCIS


Pope Leo XIV has proclaimed a Special Franciscan Jubilee Year to mark the 800th anniversary of the death of St. Francis of Assisi, inviting the faithful to a year of spiritual renewal rooted in humility, peace, and love of the Gospel. The Jubilee will be observed January 10, 2026, through January 10, 2027.

The Jubilee decree, issued through the Apostolic Penitentiary, grants a plenary indulgence to the faithful who fulfill the usual conditions of confession, reception of Holy Communion, and prayer for the intentions of the Holy Father. The indulgence may be obtained by making a pilgrimage to a Franciscan church or shrine dedicated to St. Francis. Those who are elderly, sick, or homebound may also participate by uniting themselves spiritually through prayer and offering their sufferings to God.

In calling for this Jubilee, the Holy Father encouraged Christians to rediscover the heart of the Franciscan charism—conversion of life, simplicity, and reconciliation—especially in a divided world.

St. Francis himself reminds us of this call: *“Lord, make me an instrument of your peace.”*

May this Franciscan Jubilee Year inspire all of us to draw closer to Christ and to become instruments of His peace in our families, parish, and world.

St. Bernadette Church



Question: Do we need to fast for one hour before Mass, or one hour before communion?

Answer: The practice of fasting before receiving the Eucharist is a centuries-old act of devotion that was once very different than it is today. In the 1917 Code of Canon Law, for example, anyone who wanted to receive the Eucharist had to fast from midnight until the time of communion (even water and medications were forbidden). Over the following decades, the rules for the eucharistic fast were relaxed, first by Pope Pius XII and, later, by Pope Saint Paul VI.

The current Code of Canon Law (1983) states very clearly: “A person who is to receive the Most Holy Eucharist is to abstain for at least one hour before holy communion from any food and drink, except for only water and medicine” (Canon 919, §1). And, in the case of those who are ill and the elderly, the rules are even more accommodating, “The elderly, the infirm, and those who care for them can receive the Most Holy Eucharist even if they have eaten something within the preceding hour” (Canon 919, §3).

So, if we strictly follow the “letter of the law,” the fast is calculated from the time of Holy Communion and not the start of Mass. However, when we remember why we fast — it is a reminder of the deeper hungers of the spirit that our physical thirst or hunger symbolize — we see that the issue is much bigger than simply fulfilling what is called for by Church Law and tradition. Joining fasting to our prayers and reflection before Mass is an opportunity to really center ourselves and to prepare our minds, hearts, and bodies to welcome the One we receive in the Eucharist.
