## The Parish Pastoral Council is a 9-person council.

Three members will be rotating off in November and one member has moved from the area. As a result, we will be discerning four new members for a three-year term.

The process involves the following steps:

- 1) A 90 minute information session will be offered twice: on Wednesday, October 19, at 7 pm in St. James Chapel, and Monday, October 24, at 7 pm on Zoom (see the <u>Calendar</u> on the website for the link). This session is open to any parishioner who, after prayerful reflection, would like to know more as he or she discerns whether God might be calling them to serve on the Pastoral Council.
- **2)** A discernment session will be held on Monday, November 14, for those who attended one of the information sessions and who want to be considered for the Pastoral Council. From this session, the names of those discerned for possible service on the Council will be submitted to Fr. Burke, who will prayerfully consider the results of the discernment session and, based on that, appoint the four new members of the Parish Pastoral Council.

### Increase Our Faith!

This weekend we celebrate the Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time. The readings focus on asking God to help us increase our faith.

In the first reading from Habakkuk, we read how a prophet has assurance from God to keep the faith. The Book of Habakkuk is often referred to as one of the "Twelve Minor Prophets" in the Old Testament regarding the length of his book which is only three chapters long. His message focuses on challenging the people to trust in God.

In the second reading from the Letter to Timothy, we read how Paul celebrates the gift of the spirit and the message of the Gospel. He encourages Timothy to trust in God and remain loyal to the message.

In the Gospel of Luke, the Apostles ask Jesus to increase their faith. Jesus points to a mulberry tree and tells them that if they have faith the size of the tiniest seed it will grow into bigger and better things. Even a little faith in Jesus can achieve remarkable outcomes.

Let us pray for our families, parents, and grandparents, who are the first evange-lizers of their children, and pass that faith on to future generations.

### Fr. David Taylor



Waiting can always be a time of grace. We are living in times when many cannot appreciate the

spiritual opportunities afforded during a period of having our plans delayed or put on hold. This can be a time of reevaluating our priorities and seeing our challenges in a new faith filled perspective. Putting our plans on hold can sometimes be to our spiritual advantage.

Waiting for an important medical appointment or surgery can be a real test of faith. Several years ago I arrived at a hospital early in the morning for a surgical procedure. While this can be a time of anxiety it can also be a time of renewed faith. Right before I went into surgery I was informed that it had to be put on hold to address a medical risk. Although I was disappointed, I had to be thankful that this was discovered. It was an experience that both put my faith in action and gave me a new sense of patience.

The prophet Habakkuk, like many others before and after him, were tested in their most weak and difficult times. Although he questioned God, he never gave up. He knew his prayer would be answered but only in God's time and not his own. When the Apostles asked for faith Jesus knew the real issue was putting into practice what they already possessed.

In the end the outcomes of our greatest needs reside with God. And this is where faith always brings us to hope God's vision for our future is always on the way to fulfillment. Hope is always alive.

What is characteristic of Catholic literature and art? What should we expect from the Catholic artist and

writer? Last spring and summer, the Frick Pittsburgh exhibited 50 pieces of art by Romare Bearden (1911-1988). Bearden was an influential African American artist who spent part of his youth growing up in Pittsburgh. He was born in North Carolina and spent his adult years living in New York.

The themes of Bearden's work included the shame and pride of heritage connected to the survival of the legacy of enslavement in the United States, the social conditions of black Americans during the great migration to the north (1918-1922) through its aftermath for the next two generations in the 1970s and 80s, the Harlem Renaissance (the 1920s-30s), the rise of the jazz, bebop, and the blues, and the rituals of everyday life in the rural south and the urban north the 20th throughout century. Bearden's artwork also depicted Western mythology, epics, literature, and sacred scripture as seen through the lens of the everyday lives of African Americans.

There was something that was very "Catholic" about Bearden's work, even though he probably was not a member of the Catholic Church. When I refer to Bearden's Catholicity, I am not just thinking about his depictions of the Annunciation, the Visitation, and the Passion of Christ; I am thinking about his insistence that the greatest art and literature have universal resonance. They explore the human condition, regardless of one's

race or the period of history in which one lives.

In a very Catholic way, Bearden depicted spiritual transcendence in everyday life and universality in particular cultural circumstances and experiences. As the printed guide to Bearden's work pointed out: "Southern traditions, Harlem nights, and scenes from art and literature (recast with Black figures) are filtered through Bearden's vision, telling an empowering tale of Black life in America." As he matured, Bearden did not approach his depiction of African American life as onedimensional political statements; instead, he sought to draw out the humanity of his subjects in all of their contradictions.

In 1969, Bearden said of his work: "...It is not my aim to paint the Negro in America in terms of propaganda. It is precisely my awareness of the distortions required of the polemicist that has caused me to paint the life of my people as I know it ... passionately and dispassionately ... my intention [...] is to reveal through pictorial complexities the richness of a life I know."

This is the goal of the best of Catholic literature and art: it is to capture the complexity and richness of everyday life; it is, as the printed guide pointed out, to see "struggle and strife, but also ritual, music, and joy" in our everyday experiences.
