# Pastor's Note

## Forgive!

Last Monday afternoon, I left my office around 3pm and headed down South Dallas Avenue and turned on the radio to KDKA Radio 100.1 FM to listen to the news. There was a live news conference regarding the shooting of McKeesport Police Office Sean Sluganski who was killed in the line of duty just after noon on Versailles Avenue in McKeesport. I was in complete shock and had to catch my breath and cling on to the steering wheel. I was very familiar with McKeesport with my best friend, Fr. Steve Kresak being the Pastor of the former Corpus Christi Parish in McKeesport, just down the street from the shooting My classmate, Fr. Terry O'Connor, is now the Pastor of Mary Mother of God Parish which serves the communities of East McKeesport, McKeesport, and White Oak. Officer Sluganski grew up in Baldwin and his mom Terri is a member of Blessed Trinity Parish in Baldwin, Brentwood, Carrick, and Hays which Fr. Steve Kresak is the Pastor.

Fr. Steve, Bishop Zubik and I concelebrated the funeral for Officer Slugnanksi this past Tuesday at St. Albert the Great Church of Blessed Trinity Parish. It was a very emotional day. I grew up in a Police Family, with my father Bill, serving thirty years on the Pittsburgh Police Force and is the founder of the Law Enforcement Officers Memorial on the North Shore and my brother-in-law, Eric Schueler, currently serves on the Pittsburgh Police

Force. I am also the Catholic Chaplin for the Pittsburgh Police Department.

It is very emotional and heartbreaking losing a police officer killed in a line of duty, but as people of faith we need to pray and keep the faith.

This weekend we celebrate the Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time. The readings focus on forgiving our enemies. In the first reading from Leviticus, we read how God instructs Moses to challenge the people of Israel to be bold and strive to exhibit such divine love in the way they treat each other.

In the Second Reading to the Corinthians, we read how Paul teaches that belief in the Lord Jesus leads to true wisdom which is exhibited in those who know they belong to Christ, who rule over all creation. In the Gospel of Matthew, we read the conclusion of the "Sermon on the Mount" which we have been reading the past several weeks as Jesus redefines the meaning of retaliation and the love of enemies. Jesus teaches us that we are not to hold grudges or seek revenge. We are called to forgive and seek reconciliation.

God is merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in kindness. We must be willing and eager to forgive those who wrong us. As we prepare for the Lenten Season this week let us forgive someone who has hurt us. Let us Let Go and Let God.



# Fr. David Taylor



Today continues a series of Gospels from the Sermon on the Mount. At the heart of today's

Gospel is that a disciple of Christ must be willing to love unconditionally. Many would see this as nearly impossible. We live in a society where conditions are preeminent in nearly every aspect of daily life. Indeed we impose many of these conditions on ourselves and others.

Hate is a very deadly and dangerous thing. It has to be reserved for actions such as intolerance, injustice, bigotry, racism, selfishness, and self-centered living. It can never be directed to a person. We must hate sin but never the sinner. This is one of the most challenging aspects of Christianity.

When Nelson Mandela was released from twenty seven years of unjust imprisonment, he had every reason to be bitter and angry. Many looked for him to exact revenge. But immediately he sought reconciliation with justice and peace. He was often criticized for this. But he knew better. His years in prison taught him the price of discipleship. Archbishop Desmond Tutu of South Africa helped lead the way for Mandela to embrace leadership without hatred and retribution. Mandela was able to lead a new South Africa with justice and peace.

Hate can deprive us of every good thing in life. It can rob us of our dignity and give a "victory" to evil. Mandela and many others have suffered unjustly. But he never gave up his dignity by caving into hate. He leaves a legacy for all who would heed Christs call to rise above a call for retribution.

As someone not born into the Catholic Church, it is difficult for me to understand those who think Catholicism has no appeal

beyond cradle Catholics. While Protestants are often guilty of doing nothing but evangelizing, Catholics err in the opposite direction; we tend to do everything except evangelize. Marcel Dumais, in his groundbreaking work on Catholic evangelization titled "After Emmaus: Biblical Models for the New Evangelization" (2014), explained it this way:

We have a lot of questions today about how to evangelize, how to bear witness, how to transmit the faith. These questions about 'how' are very important, but the more fundamental question is 'what' --what to transmit. We are no longer sure about what to transmit, and that is why we are so worried about the question of how. If we knew exactly what to communicate, it would be much easier to find the answer of how [to communicate it].

This is the fundamental question: what do we propose to share with the world? It shouldn't just be apologetics, dogma, and doctrine. People will have little interest in our answers until they first have an opportunity to discern the questions that should be most important to them. What questions should they be asking? Konstantin Stanislavski, one of the leading theater directors of the 20th century, told his actors to ask three questions as they are on the stage: "Who am I? Where did I come from? Where am I going?" These questions are not only good for the theater; we should ask them amid the drama of life. They will prod us toward deeper selfexamination.

The "what" of evangelization is when, where, and how we first encountered Christ and our ongoing relationship with the Lord. It is not enough to think and speak in cliches and empty talking points; we must examine our life in Christ with all of its challenges and complexities. It is not enough to talk about what we know through instruction and memorization; we have to learn how to talk about our journey through life.

The ability to share the experience of our encounter with Christ in our ordinary everyday activities, relationships and experiences is an important part of real evangelization. That requires considerable


self-reflection and examination. Such deliberate and disciplined reflection and self-examination is rare.

Recently, Father Dwight Longenecker, a "convert" to Catholicism, wrote a column titled "10 Reasons Why Catholics Don't Evangelize." It appeared in the National Catholic Register. Fr. Longenecker made many potentially controversial points. He talked about the lingering effects of clericalism in which "The people in the pew don't take ownership [or] feel it is their job to evangelize," and that "too many Catholics confuse evangelization with getting people to join the Catholic Church." One of my favorites is where he discusses the need for "a more creative and flexible approach" to RCIA. The column is worth reading in its entirety. Two points stood out for me: the tendency for cradle Catholics to be "cultural Catholics" and "slack use of [digital and hard copy] resources" to strengthen our formation. Fr. Longenecker points out that cultural Catholics "regard their religion like Jews do. It's something you're born into." Cultural Catholics see their membership in the Church as something like an ethnic or national identity. Us "converts" see things differently.

For the past 2,000 years, the Church has struggled against reducing religion to ethnic or national identity. This is why our Old Testament readings during Mass focus on the theme of "The New Jerusalem." The city of God is no longer just for those born into the faith; people are drawn to it. God has children but no grandchildren. You do not inherit the Catholic faith; you are formed by the liturgy, sacraments, and apostolic teaching.

This is why we should be dissatisfied with our slack use of resources. Fr. Longenecker points out we have "more resources than we can handle ... It's not the lack of resources as much as the lack of people who will use [them]." Longenecker notes that "orthodox, relevant, attractive and dynamic" resources are available online and in books and pamphlets, but they are wasted if unused.

We Catholics tend to believe that it is sufficient to be born into the faith. The truth is that being born into the faith is not enough; we must participate in an ongoing faith-formation process. We must also be aware that Catholicism is not like a national or ethnic identity; our parishes should become places where people encounter Christ regardless of their ethnic or cultural background. That is the essence of 21st century evangelization.
