



### **Pastor's Note**

#### <u>"Let's Eliminate Negative</u> Thinking"

Each year I give up sweets for Lent including Ice Cream, Hershey Chocolate Bars, and Boston Cream Pie. Hopefully, I will not be tempted and keep to my promise these next forty days.

This weekend we begin the Season of Lent which is a time for preparation and making some internal changes in our life. The readings this weekend focus on recognizing our dependence on God and avoiding those temptations in life that cause us to turn away from our faith. In the First Reading from Genesis, we read how Adam and Eve ignore the Word of God and choose to listen to the serpent. God has provided so many blessings for man and woman, but they get tempted and fall from grace.

In the Second Reading to the Romans, we read how Paul explains that the sin of Adam and Eve brought about judgement and death for all the world's people. In the Gospel of Matthew, we read the "temptation in the desert" as Jesus is tempted three times by the devil to prove by miraculous actions that he is the Son of God.

The devil tempts Jesus with food - to turn stone into bread, tempts him with comfort by telling him to jump from the parapet of the temple without incurring injury, and tempts him with power, telling him all this kingdom could be his if he worships the devil. We are likely to be tempted many times during this Lenten Season. As we begin Lent, let us center our relationship with God with prayer, fasting and almsgiving.

There are plenty of Lenten Activities to participate to enrich your spirituality including: Discovering Christ Program every Wednesday evening from 6 to 8pm in the St. James Chapel for seven weeks. Join us Friday's during Lent at Noon for Stations of the Cross at Mother of Good Counsel or 7pm at St. Bede for Stations of the Cross followed by Eucharistic Adoration till 8:30pm. Saturday mornings at St. Bede Church for 9am daily mass, followed by Eucharistic Adoration and the Sacrament of Reconciliation available from 9:30-10:30 am.

#### Fr. David Taylor



For some converts to the Catholic Church, learning about the teachings and regulations of

the Lenten season can be both challenging and inspiring. The specific rules about fasting and abstinence are often seen as admirable practices but sometimes misunderstood. This was true from my own family experiences.

Families facing food insecurity or dietary restrictions related to health issues can find unique challenges. The church recognizes this in emphasizing the spirit of the law. Jesus often criticized the Pharisees and Sadducees for being experts in the law while rarely living in the spirit of the law.

Lent is all about making spiritual choices and decisions. We face a crossroad each day knowing that our moral decisions not only determine our relationship with God but with each other as well. The beginning of sin also ushered in the challenge of moral decision making. All of our actions, good or bad, come from this freedom of choice which will never be taken from us. Facing this reality the church offers us much freedom in determining our personal Lenten resolutions. Lent can be a time of both self-denial and self-fulfillment. It can be a unique time for giving more emphasis to spiritual reading and reflections. And all of us can benefit from more generosity and service to other. Our parish offers many opportunities.

Penance is not an end in itself. The whole object of Penance is to reform and change to a better way of living, sharing, and caring. We are all capable of being a better self. Lent is this gift for all of us.



#### Fr. Matthew Hawkins



The nature of temptation has not changed for thousands of years. Given human nature, the tempter knows how to get our attention and

draw us in. We are tempted by things that catch our eyes, promise to fulfill our desires, and appeal to our vanity and pride.

One of the first things we notice in this Sunday's readings is how Jesus' temptations parallel Eve's. We are tempted by what we see. In Genesis, we read, "The woman saw that the tree was ... pleasing to the eye..." In the Gospel of Matthew, we read, "Then the devil took him up to a very high mountain, and showed him all the kingdoms of the world in their magnificence..."

We are tempted by our appetites. We are tempted by what we desire. In Genesis, we read, "The woman saw that the tree was good for food ... and desirable..." In the Gospel of Matthew, we read, "... afterward he was hungry. The tempter approached and said to him ... command that these stones become loaves of bread."

We are tempted by vanity and pride. In Genesis, we read that Eve was tempted when the serpent said, "God knows well that the moment you eat of [the tree of knowledge], your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods ..." In the Gospel of Matthew, the tempter repeatedly tries to get Jesus to question his own identity by saying, "If you are the Son of God..." and challenges him to prove it, "... throw yourself down. For it is written: He will command his angels concerning you, and with their hands, they will support you ..."

Our weaknesses are those things that are attractive to our eyes, appeal to our pride, and that we desire with our flesh. Pride and vanity are the most powerful of the temptations because they are the gateway to everything else that separates us from God.

Notice how the tempter entices Eve and Adam by suggesting that the all-loving God, who gave them the breath of life, would withhold something good from them. The promise of the tempter was absurd, but with minds clouded by that which was pleasing to the eye, desirable to the flesh, and appealed to their pride, they took the bait.

The irony is that God withheld nothing from them that was good. He created them in His own image. He established them as stewards of all creation. He gave them the tree of life and all the other plants and trees in the garden. They could do everything so long as they remained in communion with God, but he also gave them free will so they would be like Him. In the center of the garden was an attractive tree of false hope. If they wished to remain in communion with God, they would have to reject the false hope that appealed to their pride. They had to choose freely because love is consensual; we cannot enter it without a choice.

Instead, they chose to separate from God and become little gods. This was the meaning of "the tree of knowledge of good and evil." It meant that rather than accepting the wisdom God revealed, they would create their own standards and opinions about what was "good" and "bad." They would try to replace the living God.

When they aspired to be little gods, they broke communion and separated from the God of life and truth. It is separation from the source of our being, which means death. We disintegrate into nothingness.

The irony is the knowledge that the tempter promised, which he said would make them powerful, only made them aware of their nakedness and vulnerability. That's the way it is with temptations. They draw us away from that which is life-giving and attach us to death, which is deceptively disguised. That is why, during the rite of baptism, we are called to "reject Satan and all his works, and all his false promises." We are called to "reject the glamor of evil and refuse to be mastered by sin."

Jesus succeeds in resisting these temptations where Adam and Eve failed. This is why the apostle Paul wrote in his letter to the Romans, "Just as through the disobedience of the one man the many were made sinners, so, through the obedience of the one, the many will be made righteous."
