



PRIEST'S DESK

Dear Brothers and sisters,

I always find it fascinating how Jesus operates. He is always very deliberate, and everything has meaning and purpose.

Today's episode of the raising of Lazarus is no different. He knows his hour, when it shall come, when he needs to hide from the authorities, and when he can be out in the open. We see this here when Jesus hears of the illness of Lazarus. He did this and said, "So when he heard that he was ill, Jesus remained for two days in the place where he was."

Then after this, he said to his disciples, "Let us go back to Judea." The disciples said to him, "Rabbi, the Jews were just trying to stone you, and you want to go back there?" The Lord says he has some sense of what is coming as he has a mysterious knowledge of what is ahead through a parable.

Jesus answered, "Are there not twelve hours in a day? If one walks during the day, he does not stumble, because he sees the light of this world. But if one walks at night, he stumbles, because the light is not in him." He said this and told them, "Our friend Lazarus is asleep, but I am going to awaken him."

I think our Lord was knowingly bold because he knew his time was drawing near. It is almost time for his passion so he can afford to return to the south to Judea, where those are who are wanting to put him to death.

In the catechism in a year study, we came across the part about the kingdom of God. I was struck with the question, 'why did Jesus not just die his sacrificial death at the beginning? If he came to die for our sins why wait for the moment of Calvary?' The answer, of course, is that he wanted to establish a new kingdom. He brought us all into a new assembly or Church built on the rock of faith given to Peter and the Apostles to be handed down to us in and through that Church.

We as a Church hold to the truths the Church hands down. Salvation is not just that we get to go to heaven but that we, through our faith, are being healed and transformed and made Christ-like. None of us are perfect, but we can cooperate with God's grace and become what we will be entirely in heaven.

In this time of Lent, we share the great fast that leads up through Holy Week and ends with the Feast of Easter! I encourage you to ramp up your fast to deepen your connection with Jesus. God did not create or desire death, but sin brought it into the world. As God allows sin, he allows death, even the death of his friend. He allows it to strengthen our faith which ends the second death a greater evil than the death of our body, for one is temporary, and the other is eternal. The raising of Lazarus shows us how deeply Jesus desires to identify with us. He weeps with Martha and Mary, but then he goes and changes their "mourning into dancing; you have loosed my sackcloth and clothed me with gladness."(Psalms 30:11). Our Lent is a foretaste of this as our penance or sackcloth will be removed in the feast of Easter. Lazarus, unfortunately, had to die again. Still, in Jesus, he conquers death such that death will be no more in our resurrection. Easter Joy is soon upon us, but it comes from and through rejection, passion, and cross. We will have our own passion or sufferings, but they are not the end! While we don't know or understand our trials, Jesus does, and we need to work to be with Jesus in them. To pray such that we recognize Jesus enters our every trial and is closer to us than we know and he is in control. St. Lazarus, pray for us! Pray that we might know that God has a plan for us even amid our struggles.
