

WE ARE KNOWN BY OUR FRUIT

This week, Jesus tells us that we must examine our own inner selves, our attitudes and dispositions, virtues and faults, rather than judging others. What is in our hearts comes out in what and how we speak. If our hearts are filled with kindness and compassion, those qualities will be evident in our speaking, just as beautiful, wholesome fruit comes only from healthy trees. And vice-versa. The Wisdom writer Sirach in the first reading agrees with this concept—that we will be judged by our words. Paul reminds us that the reward of discipleship is eternal life. Today's psalm of thanksgiving and praise reminds us of God's kindness and faithfulness, which we are to emulate in our thoughts, words, and deeds. We are known, each of us, by our own fruit.

Saint Paul provides some welcome reassurance this weekend, as we prepare to once again embrace the holy season of Lent: "Therefore, my beloved brothers and sisters, be firm, steadfast, always fully devoted to the works of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain."

I have to admit, Lent is my favorite liturgical season, which probably makes me a statistical outlier. (I mean, who has favorite liturgical seasons to begin with? And if you do, why pick Lent?) For many, Lent can seem very daunting; almost impossible to make it through. Humans are very resilient, though, and we're much stronger than we think. We shouldn't look at Lent as something to be survived for forty days – although we can endure a lot in that time – but we should look at Lent as a privileged opportunity to grow. If we are firm and steadfast, the works we do during Lent will not be in vain; rather, they will lead us closer to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Lent is not complicated. There are three pillars of Lent, each equally important: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving.

Prayer: We can't get closer to the Lord without deepening our prayer life. That will look different for everyone. Maybe it's turning the radio off and saying the Rosary during your commute. Joining us for evening prayer and Adoration on Sunday nights. Praying the Stations of the Cross on Friday. Finding a way to get to daily Mass. Making time to read some Scripture daily. Even if you can't do something every day, the key is to do more in a week than you usually would.

Fasting: This is what everyone thinks of when they think of Lent, generally speaking. It's the age-old question: what are you giving up for Lent? The practice of self-denial, whether it's from a certain type of food, or video games, or any other guilty pleasure, is good... but it is more important to remember why you're denying yourself that thing. You want there to be a sense of emptiness precisely so that Jesus can fill it.

Almsgiving: Almsgiving can be a tricky one for some people, because everyone's financial situation is different. But there is more to almsgiving than just making financial donations. Time can be just as valuable a gift as money. Almsgiving is rooted in charity; what matters is doing something that will be of tangible benefit to another person.

Enjoy your Lent! Be firm, steadfast, always fully devoted to the works of the Lord, knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain.





THE EMMAUS ROAD (The Gospel of Luke 24:13-35)

The disciples were returning to Emmaus after the crucifixion of Jesus when they encountered a man who wanted to know what was troubling them. He walked with them and opened their hearts and minds to Scripture and what it said about Jesus – the promised Messiah. Arriving at Emmaus, they invited the man to stay for dinner. At the table, He broke bread, gave thanks, and handed it to the disciples. At once, their eyes were opened, and they recognized the man as the risen Lord. Immediately, He vanished from their sight leaving them with the bread, a renewed faith, and an everlasting sign of his Holy presence.

What is a Men's Emmaus Weekend Retreat? An Emmaus Men's Retreat is a spiritual retreat for men. It is organized and given by laypeople who are your peers in the community and who face the same challenges – and successes – that you do daily. The weekend begins on Friday evening and ends on Sunday afternoon; its purpose is to give you the opportunity to ponder and reflect upon your life, and on your individual relationship with Jesus Christ. The men who attend Emmaus are ordinary men who come from all levels of society.

How much does it cost? The all-inclusive cost for the weekend is \$150 per attendee. This includes a private room and all meals (including snacks) Friday evening through Sunday lunch. 

Gospel: Luke 6:39-45

Jesus told his disciples a parable, "Can a blind person guide a blind person? Will not both fall into a pit? No disciple is superior to the teacher; but when fully trained, every disciple will be like his teacher. Why do you notice the splinter in your brother's eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own? How can you say to your brother, 'Brother, let me remove that splinter in your eye,' when you do not even notice the wooden beam in your own eye? You hypocrite! Remove the wooden beam from your eye first; then you will see clearly to remove the splinter in your brother's eye. "A good tree does not bear rotten fruit, nor does a rotten tree bear good fruit. For every tree is known by its own fruit. For people do not pick figs from thornbushes, nor do they gather grapes from brambles. A good person out of the store of goodness in his heart produces good, but an evil person out of a store of evil produces evil; for from the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks."

Profession of Faith


