<u>First Penance</u>: We congratulate our 2nd Graders who celebrated their First Penance on Saturday, December 2. As they waited in line, a few students said that they were nervous. When they walked out of the confessional, they were hopping to pray their penance and to meet their families! We thank the parents of our young people for practicing with the children at home. We thank Mrs. Stokes and Mrs. Smith for all that they did to prepare their students. They are so dedicated to leading their students in their faith and sacramental life. Thank you!

<u>Uniform Policy</u>: There are many students who are not adhering to the Uniform Policy. We need your help with the following:

- Sneakers are only worn to school on gym days with gym uniforms.
- Girls should be wearing KNEE socks. Some students have begun to wear Nike and other sport socks.
- Some boys need haircuts. The hair is in their eyes and too long.
- Polo shirts are NOT part of the winter uniform. Boys should be wearing collared shirts and a tie.
 They must either wear a sweater or vest as well. The girls in Grades 5 to 8 should be wearing
 collared shirts with either a sweater or a vest. The correct shirts must also be worn with the
 three-quarter zip jackets.
- In many grades, the girls are coming to school with nail polish and with bracelets/hair ties, etc., up their arms.

Now that the 2nd Trimester is underway, we will need to start to issue demerits so that our students will adhere to the dress code. Thank you for your help and support in following the uniform policy.

<u>Traffic Concerns</u>: I still have concerns about the way students are dropped off and picked up in the school yard.

Our goal is to eliminate the students walking in the school yard as cars are driving in. If you have to drop them off, you need to drive to the cones. Your child should exit the car and walk directly to the cones. If it is a longer distance, then please walk them to the cones. At dismissal, please do not pull out of the parking lot while the students are walking out to Rhawn Street. No one should enter Jeanes Street, nor should you park by the library. I feel that Stanwood is getting better at dismissal. We ask that our younger students stay with their parents as you wait for older siblings. Some of our young ones are throwing leaves in the mailbox on Stanwood. This just makes it more difficult for the mail carriers. Thank you so much for your assistance with arrival and dismissal!
