
**Saturday:** 5:00 p.m. (with American Sign Language interpretation) **Sunday:** 8:30 and 10:30 a.m.

The Church of St. Timothy has a long history of partnering with the Minnesota Council of Churches to welcome refugee families settling in Minnesota. The Minnesota Council of Churches is currently assisting three to five refugee families every week. These families come from Burma/Myanmar, El Salvador, Ethiopia, Eritrea, and Somalia. Many families arrive in the U.S. with almost nothing after having lived in refugee camps for multiple years. On Epiphany weekend when we hear the story

of the three Magi who made a long journey, St. Tim's parishioners are invited to support refugee families in Minnesota. Your support can assist these families begin a new life and develop a sense of home.

## **Prayer Before Weekday Liturgy**

St. Timothy offers daily liturgy (either Mass or Word and Communion service) every day at 9 a.m. in the church unless there is a funeral scheduled. Parishioners gather at 8:25 for shared devotions before the liturgy. All are welcome to join them in praying the rosary and chaplet before weekday liturgy in the church.

## Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Mother of God

Monday, January 1 is the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God. Though it is not a holy day of obligation this year because it falls on a Monday, Mass will be offered at 9 a.m. that day in the church and all are encouraged to attend. January 1 has also been designated as a world day of prayer for peace. Since Pope Paul VI in 1967, January 1 has been set aside as a day to pray for an end to all forms of violence.

## **The Christmas Season**

In the culture at large it may seem that the Christmas season begins the moment Thanksgiving dinner tables have been cleared and ends on December 25. But liturgically the season of Christmas, also known as Christmastide, begins on Christmas Day and lasts until the day before Epiphany. So on December 25, the lights, the music, the joy, the celebration have only just begun!

These days are known as the twelve days of Christmas, familiar to many of us because of the popular Christmas carol. In some parts of the world, it is customary to celebrate Christmas for forty days until the feast of Presentation on February 2, also known as Candlemas.

So continue to celebrate the birth of Jesus during these days of the Christmas season by leaving your nativity scene and other Christmas decorations up at home. Listen to Christmas music and continue to focus your prayer on the mystery of God who comes to us as a vulnerable and humble child in a manger. The liturgical calendar invites us to enjoy the richness of the season, so continue to stay close to the Christ child in your hearts through these days.
