



Prayer: The Rosary

In the second of St. Timothy's four-part series on prayer, today we highlight the rosary, a beautiful meditation on the life of Christ. It is often prayed as an offering for specific intentions. This prayer is directed to God through the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mother.

The rosary is a Scripture-based prayer, beginning with the Apostles Creed which summarizes the mysteries of the Catholic faith, to the Our Father which is taken from the Gospels, to the Hail Mary which is composed from verses from the Gospel of Luke when the angel announces Christ's birth and Elizabeth greets Mary.
