Happy 63rd Anniversary, Bev and Kent Hansen



Ken & I were married February 13, 1960 at St. Ignatius Catholic Church in Portland. Our wedding was at noon. In those days, we had to fast from midnight the night before in order to receive communion.

When I got to the Church, I kept sending Ken's cousin, our best man, back to the Sacristy to make sure Ken was still there. Pete kept assuring me he was.

After Mass, we went out for Brunch, then to the Grotto of Our Sorrowful Mother where we placed my wedding bouquet on the Altar, asking God's Special Blessings on us. That was a most beautiful day - everything seemed so perfect. Like all young married couples, we saw nothing but rainbows.

Ken hid our car across town so that no one could decorate it. After the reception, and we had said our goodbyes, Ken's sister Marilyn and her boyfriend Jack drove us to the car. We got all the way over there... Ken had forgotten the keys. So, we had to go back to my parents' home and pick them up. Many friends and family were gathered there so we ended up staying to eat and visit...getting a late start on our honeymoon to a cabin in the Cascade mountains.

We are now celebrating 63 years of marriage and know God has blessed us...with the closeness of our 7 wonderful children, spouses, 7 beautiful grandchildren, extended family, wonderful friends, and a strength our Faith gives us.

The Fullness of Righteousness

Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year A)

Jesus said to his disciples: “I tell you, unless your righteousness surpasses that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will not enter the kingdom of heaven.” [Matthew 5:20–22](#)



The scribes and Pharisees were masters of the Old Law. Now that the Messiah had arrived, they were unwilling to go deeper and move beyond the Old Testament teachings that they often misrepresented. They preferred a black-and-white approach to morality that had been with them for centuries and did not want to change when presented with Jesus’ new and higher calling.

Today’s Gospel continues Jesus’ Sermon on the Mount, which began with the Beatitudes. In today’s portion of Jesus’ sermon, we are taught about anger, adultery and oaths. In every case, Jesus refers to the Law as it was taught in the Old Testament but then elevates it to an entirely new level. The line quoted above makes it clear that the only way to accept these new teachings of Jesus was to surpass the “righteousness” of the scribes and Pharisees. And the dire result of not surpassing their righteousness was the loss of the Kingdom of Heaven.



Jesus begins by recalling the Old Testament commandment, “You shall not kill.” But then He takes that commandment further by saying that “whoever is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment.” Of course, killing remains a grave sin. But now Jesus explains that the interior attitude of anger, even if not acted upon, is a sin. He goes on to teach a similar lesson about adultery and swearing oaths.

It is helpful to understand these new teachings in the context of the approach that the scribes and Pharisees took in regard to the Old Testament. About that, Jesus says, “Do not think that

I have come to abolish the law or the prophets. I have come not to abolish but to fulfill.” Thus, the primary problem with the scribes and Pharisees is not that they failed to teach the Old Testament Law properly. The primary problem is that now that the Messiah has arrived and has ushered in a new time of fulfillment and righteousness, they would not go deeper and would not embrace the fulfillment of the Law of God. They are not willing to grow in holiness and embrace the fulfillment of all that had been taught before.

Reflect, today, upon the calling given to you by our Lord’s new and glorious teachings. If you are to truly embrace the Gospel of our Lord and live in His New Law of grace, then you must be willing to go deep, become truly radical in your faith, and allow God to transform every part of your life. The New Law is one of the fullness of love, mercy, surrender, zeal, conversion and transformation. Commit yourself to surpassing the old and limited righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees, and God will do glorious things in your life.

Lord of all grace, You came and not only taught us about the heights of holiness, but You also lived it and have bestowed upon us all we need to imitate Your every virtue. Please fill me with Your mercy and strength so that I may live a new righteousness of the fullness of love. Jesus, I trust in You.

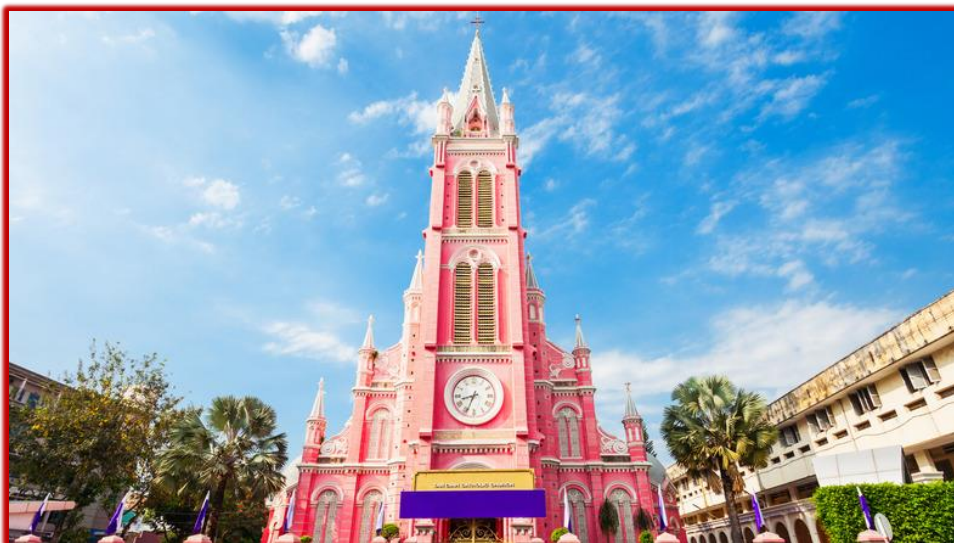

God's House on Earth Tan Dinh Church in Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam

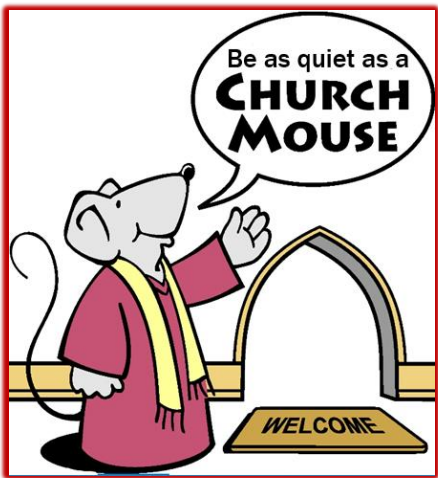
If you like the color pink (I chose to feature this church for Valentine's Day), then you will be a



fan of Tan Dinh Church in Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam. This 150-year old building is known for its bright, bubblegum-pink hue, attracting visitors far and wide. The building was constructed between 1870 and 1876 and draws influence from French and Roman architectural styles.

However, the building is more than a pretty face — it also played an integral role in the local community. In 1877, Father Donatien Éveillard opened an orphanage and boarding school on the church grounds. Over 300 children called this place home in just three years, according to Hotels.com. When a publishing house was built beside the church, the children were given a place to learn the ins and outs of the publishing industry and gain valuable work experience. In honor of his service, Father Donatien Éveillard was buried in the church after his death. Silence is Golden



Paragraph 45 of the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) states:

Even before the celebration itself, it is commendable that silence be observed in the church, in the sacristy, in the vesting room, and in adjacent areas, so that all may dispose themselves to carry out the sacred action in a devout and fitting manner.

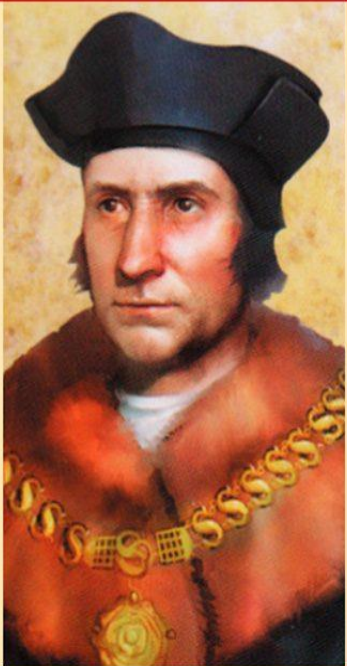
Talking in church is disrespectful of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. We are in the House of God, in the Presence of God Himself in the Tabernacle, not in a coffee shop. All our thoughts should be directed to Him.

It teaches disrespect. When children see adults talking, giggling, and laughing in church, especially before, during and after the Holy Mass, instead of in prayer or silent meditation it teaches them that its OK, thus further eroding respect for the Blessed Sacrament in the next generation. It's hypocritical for parents to “shush” their children while they themselves continue to talk.

It is the Lord’s House, which Jesus taught was “a house of prayer” (Mt 21:13) and thus should be used according to its purpose. It is unholy to turn the Holy House of God into a man-made place of socializing or gossiping. The House of God, where dwells the Real Presence of God, must be treated with ongoing reverence. Talking in Church is a violation of justice against God, for whom we should have reverence. -Simply Catholic

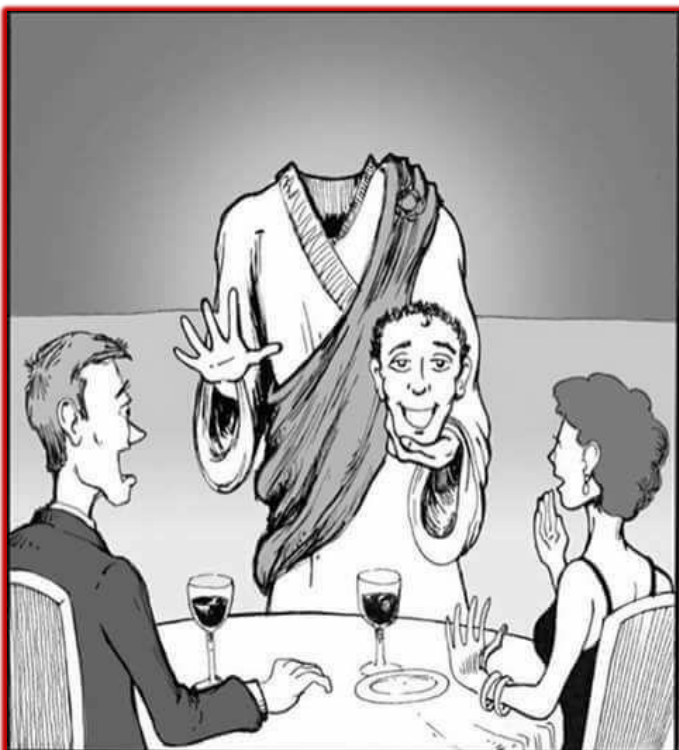
PRAYER FOR GOOD HUMOUR BY ST THOMAS MORE

Amen.

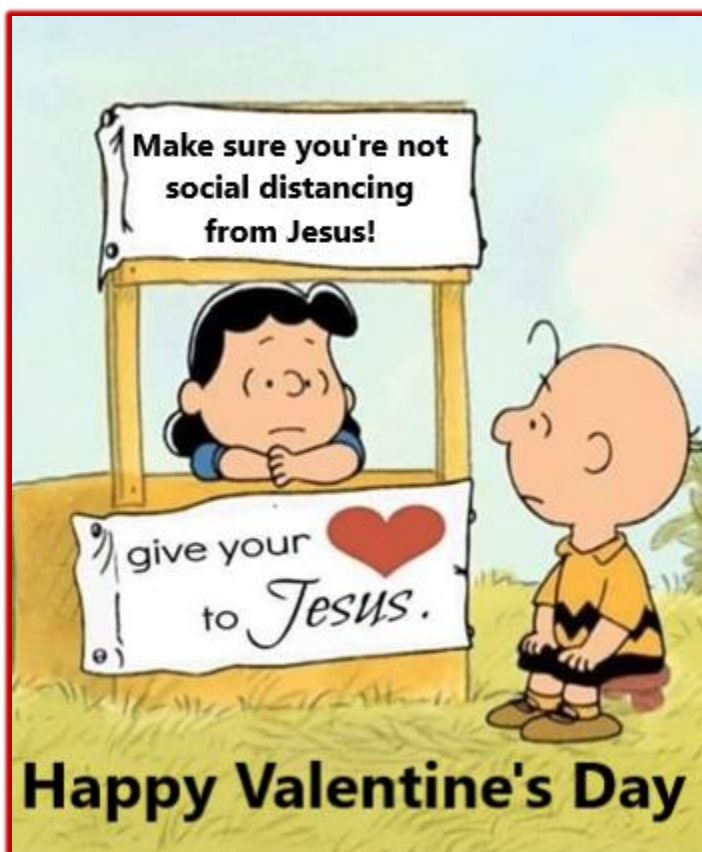
