Our holy day, the Immaculate Conception of Mary, fell on Saturday this weekend. As always there is confusion about the premise of this feast day on our Church calendar. Recognized and celebrated in our Church for over a thousand years, it was formalized in1854, when Pope Pius IX solemnly proclaimed: "The most Blessed Virgin Mary, in



the first instant of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege granted by almighty God, in view of the merits of Jesus Christ, the savior of the human race. was preserved free from all stain of original sin." Such proclamation, inspired by the Holy Spirit, has guided the Church to remember Mary's place in salvation history, her definitive faith, and her gentle spirit that continues to intercede upon those seeking God's grace in their lives. Though born without original sin Mary was human in every other aspect, facing her struggles and anxieties, her daily responsibilities and friendships, her blessings and steadfast beliefs. My grandmother Johnson had a rosary on her kitchen table, on the living room stand next to her chair, and on her nightstand. Her faith has given me a better understanding of Mary's grace guiding us toward Christ Jesus.

We welcome Cain Junkman whom I hired to replace Jennifer. He has considerable experience with music and piano from high school years onward, staying present to the liturgy of our church playing at various churches over the past few years. He moved to the lakes region two years ago, presently working as a dispatcher for our law enforcement at the courthouse. In my discussions with Cain I emphasized the quality of the music Jennifer has established at our parish, and my hope that such remains a vital part of our gatherings for the Eucharist and other Sacraments. Jennifer was a gift to our parish, and Cain will likewise bless us with his talents and faith and presence. Please welcome him.

Next week Sunday, December 16, 1 p.m., our parish will have its Advent Reconciliation Penance Service with the help of additional priests. I welcome all to this Sacrament regardless of how long it may have been. May this Sacrament be a blessing of peace in preparation for Christmas. At the same time I will be in the Reconciliation Room before each weekend Mass, and before each daily Mass.
