

STEWARDSHIP ENVELOPES: Just up-

dating our parishioners that we are moving from boxed stewardship envelopes in 2019 to a new program where envelopes will be mailed to you on a bi-monthly basis. Most parishioners will receive envelopes for January/February use except persons who are on ach status.* Those persons who contribute one time each year will not receive additional envelopes until November. From then on, all parishioners who have a contributing history, will receive envelopes bi-monthly. At any time, parishioners may drop their contribution into the weekend collection in a regular envelope with their name on the outside. As with any other new system, there may be a bug or two hiding. Please be patient with the implementation of this system. It is expected to save the church a substantial amount of money. Last year, nearly 400 families did not pick up their envelopes. (*St. Joseph offers an automatic payment program where a specific contribution can be electronically transferred from your account each week or month. If you are interested in this program, please call the office to set-up or for additional information. We currently have 15 parishioners on this system.)
