Bishop Nickless sent out a letter to each pastor last weekend asking us to be aware of and cautious about the spread of germs, colds, flu symptoms, and in particular the Coronavirus. Though reluctant at this time to declare an all-encompassing directive for all parishes, Bishop Nickless asked each of us to make our own judgment. As of this L

weekend we are suspending (temporarily) the Blood of Christ offered at Communion. Likewise, we will suspend the Sign of Peace (temporarily) considering how germs could spread. Some parishes have initiated such changes earlier this winter season because of the outbreak of the flu and colds in their respective areas. Our Conference of Catholic Bishops and Catholic Mutual Insurance have issued statements of caution and awareness in line with Bishop Nickless' directives. Our Bishop went on to state, "I would especially encourage you to be extra vigilant regarding the washing of hands as preventative practice, particularly by anyone involved in the distribution of holy Communion, the visiting of the sick, home bound and those in extended care facilities. . . . Obviously, individual parishioners who are ill should be assured that they are not obligated to attend Mass . . . and exercise their best judgment about Mass and parish events."

As aspects of Vatican II were slowly incorporated into our Sunday Mass, the Sign of Peace and the offering of the Blood of Christ were two of the prevalent renewals within our liturgies that took place. In my hometown parish, indeed very German—parishioners were hesitant to offer the Sign of Peace (not quite comfortable with this outward expression of faith). In the same manner, very few received the Blood of Christ when it was initially offered to all during Communion. Our present Sign of Peace was a part of the very early Church, and practiced through the decades until the 17th century when it became relegated to those in the sanctuary. "Then after the Second Vatican Council the Church took a new look at the ancient custom and decided to restore the original action of the faithful. The sign of peace is a highly symbolic act that is meant to point towards the disposition of heart required for receiving the Holy Eucharist. It reminds the faithful that in order to be in full communion with Christ, one must first "love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength," and not forget to "love your neighbor as yourself" (Mark 12:30-31). Personally, though it was uncomfortable for me when initially re-instituted, it has been a significant ritual and gesture in my participation of the Eucharist. I hope we can re-instate this ritual soon with respect to all parishioners. I strongly believe the Blood of Christ should be offered to all who desire to receive as an essential part of our Communion, the Eucharist. For many decades the chalice was restricted to the priest presiding at the Mass. However, we remember the Gospel passages of the Last Supper: While they were

eating, Jesus took bread, said the blessing, broke it,


