

Eight weeks ago our Bishop mandated the suspension of all public Masses, of all social and religious gatherings, meetings within the parishes and schools of our diocese. He was following the guidelines of the Center For Disease Control, keeping in mind the wellbeing of the most vulnerable and others during this



period of uncertainty due to L the threat of the virus. During this time, as surreal as it has been, I have listened to the opinions of various individuals—each with their own slant as to the threat or over reaction to the spread of this virus.
