

the Shepherd of our Roman Catholic Church. His self deprecation did not deter his spirituality, his calling to lead our Church, nor the significance of the Vatican II Council he presided over. Like his predecessors and those who followed in the "Chair of Peter," Pope John XXIII's faith guided his humanity and 'calling' to minister as our Shepherd through the grace of the Holy Spirit. Our gospel passage this weekend highlights the 'calling' of our first pope as Jesus' conversed with Peter: "And I say to you, you are Peter, and upon this rock I will build my church, and the gates of the netherworld shall not prevail against it." Until Pope John Paul II the pope residing in Rome was distantly respected so to speak, rarely traveling to other countries. Pope Paul VI led our Church when I was a youngster; and my image of him was tied to the Christmas Eve Midnight Mass he presided over in St. Peter's Basilica televised in black and white with hazy reception picked up on a local network. His motto—"If you want peace, work for justice"—defined his papacy. and the faith of those who followed in the Chair of Peter. Pope John Paul II certainly brought the papacy to the forefront, with his travels throughout the globe, and intimately for us lowans with his presence and Mass at Living History Farms, Des Moines, in 1979.

I speak for myself, witnessing the faith and guidance of five popes during my lifetime: my reverence for the "Bishop of Rome" has been reinforced by their humanity, personality, and Christian compassion. As Pope Francis leads our Church, we must remember such as we consider the misunderstanding of 'infallibility.' Often misunderstood concerning the Pope to be without error or sin in his ministry, the proper definition remains: "the Pope is infallible only when he defines a doctrine concerning faith or morals as a deposit of divine revelation handed down from apostolic tradition." (Such as the Assumption of Mary, body and soul, into heaven as declared by Pope Pius XII in 1950.) Pope Francis—not unlike previous popes—has his 'confessor' he goes to. seeking God's forgiveness for grievances committed. I was heartened in my faith and as a Catholic when Pope John Paul II—early in his papacy—voiced the need of the Church to seek forgiveness for past errors and hurt we have incurred as people of God. Thus, as I recall the gifts and humanity of each of the five popes who shepherded our Church during my lifetime, Pope Francis words bolsters my faith: "God created every person with a unique dignity, inviting us into communion with him, with our sisters and brothers (and) with respect for all creation. . . . As disciples of Jesus, we do not want to be indifferent or individualistic — two ugly attitudes, which are against harmony. Indifferent, I look

the other way. And individualistic, 'only for me,' looking only at one's own interests... We want to recognize the human dignity of every person, whatever his or her race, language or condition." May we remember to pray for Pope Francis' guidance and that of our local Shepherd, Bishop Nickless during these challenging times.

Next month we will begin RCIA, the step into our Catholic faith, sharing the gatherings with St. Mary Church, Spirit Lake. If interested in becoming Catholic or if you know of someone who may be interested, please contact me at the parish office. RCIA shares a blending of different personalities and faith backgrounds that coalesce with the sharing in the Eucharist.

We continue to follow diocesan guidelines, with social distancing and the wearing of masks in church. I hope for those who are sharing in the Eucharist attending Mass feel safe and prayerful within our parish. For those who are still a bit reluctant in respect to their health, may you share a bond with others, and the Eucharist, through participation online. Thank you for your faith, and understanding at this time—and your presence in community with our shared prayers. At present our parish offices are open, but please call ahead to come in. Considering the diocesan guidelines our parish hall remains closed with special considerations, trying to safeguard the wellbeing of all who come into our building.

I leave you with Pope John XXIII's graceful reply when he overheard someone calling him fat: "Madame, I trust you understand that the papal conclave is not exactly a beauty contest."

And here we go with the start of school I am sure everyone is apprehensive about this week but just keep praying that everyone stays healthy and it goes well. I will be meeting with Catechists and helpers on the evening of the 26th at 6:30 p.m to go over what this year will look like. Then on the 29th and 30th, I will be out after Masses to accept registrations and discuss the year ahead. It you have a new student(s), please stop or contact me before classes begin on Sept. 9th for all grades' weekly lessons. If you have chosen to be in Family Formation, I will contact you by email for specifics as the first full meeting will be in October.

We will be ready. The group that was to be Confirmed last Spring will meet with their Catechist on Aug. 30 to prepare for Confirmation on Sept. 9. Then the new group of Confirmation students (10th grade) and parents will meet on the evening of Sept. 2nd. Grades K-5 will meet weekly from 4-5 pm with grades 6-12 meeting from 7-8 p.m. Masks will be required while here on the church property.

At this time, I do have most of my Catechists, but need a few volunteers to be substitutes. I will be doing most of the younger grades lesson plans so that should take off some of the pressure. Whether a DRE or a Catechist, I have never tired of bringing the richness of our faith to our young people. It is so important for the future. I will miss the large group activities this year but right now can not plan for any of those. One of the casualties is the annual Christmas pageant. Maybe something will work out.

In addition to weekly classes and monthly Family Formation, I am happy to work with individual families if they have a child who has missed Sacraments or has a specific need. I can meet at your convenience on a day other than Wednesday. Fr. Tim works with adults who would like to join our church or who want to find out more through the RCIA program. It is also ideal for Catholics who have been away from practicing their faith for some time.

Whatever the need, we can try to help bring it all together. Sometimes when you think you have something missing in your life, being active in your faith might just be the ticket.
