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Often during these last five months of the restrictions and guidelines due to Coronavirus I have quietly pondered the "blessing" of receiving the Eucharist daily; and, as you know, the restrictions withheld others from receiving this Sacrament. I understand and accept the guidelines that have created a different scenario these last

several months, but so appreciative of the 're-opening' of our churches and the invitation for all to receive the Eucharist. Wearing a mask, seating every other pew and keeping a social distance doesn't deter from the grace of the Eucharist or the gracious invitation to receive. As much as possible, we are safe in our gatherings here at St. Joseph with those in the congregation mindful of the wellbeing of others. Whether older or young, I hope all our parishioners and visitors recognize and share in the "blessing of the Eucharist," and comfort with their own wellbeing within our beautiful church. We do what we can to maintain a safe environment within our church and offices, and God supplies us with the invitation and the "blessing" of His Son's real presence in the Eucharist. Regardless of how many come to our church, we will maintain a safe environment and a prayerful presence for all participating in the Eucharist.

Recently a friend inquired about the meaning and substance of a "blessing." She closes her notes and letters with the words "bless you" and was questioning what exactly that means; and if it depends on the disposition or faith of the receiver. According to the Church "people witness bishops, priests, and deacons blessing objects or persons in the name of the Church. Indeed, the more a blessing concerns ecclesial and sacramental life, the more its administration is reserved to the ordained ministry (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 1669), often with the participation of the local parish community gathered in prayer. Whenever an ordained minister is present, he should be called upon to give the blessing." With this understanding aside, my friend was searching for an understanding of "blessing" in general.

One spiritual writer describes it as such: "In the biblical sense, if you give me your blessing, you irreversibly convey into my life not just something of the beneficent power and vitality of who you are, but something also of the life-giving power of God, in whose name the blessing is given. Even after old, halfblind Isaac discovered that he had been hoodwinked into blessing the wrong twin, he could no more take the blessing back and give it to Esau than he could take the words of it out of the air and put them back into his mouth again."

Another scripture scholar is more 'black and white': "When we bless others in the name of God, we are in effect praying that God would send his blessing to them. When we bless we are asking God to bless someone to be successful in God's good will and intentions for them. It is also an acknowledgement that

we can't do this without His power. It's not simply a matter of desire, but of design doing the very good that God intended and designed us for. He tells us what to do in His word, and His blessing is His given power to do it. He gives us commands, then He alone is the one who gives us the capacity to be fruitful in obeying them."

Regardless if the person who is to receive the blessing is a believer or nonbeliever, lukewarm or active, once communicated it remains the grace of God's presence. As St. Francis said before a large crowd harboring different beliefs and convictions, "Since many of you do not belong to the Catholic Church and others are non-believers, from the bottom of my heart I give this silent blessing to each and every one of you, respecting the conscience of each one of you but knowing that each one of you is a child of God."

I leave you with the following prayer; and may God bless, Fr. Tim
