


the world in a single evening, was crucial to the belief in a God and His Son who was ever present in my life. Oh, I remember



believed and more importantly, had faith in that mystery that was indeed reality for me, and so many others.

We woke up early—sometimes too early for my parents' convenience—with much anticipation and wonder of what was left under the tree. And I can still feel that gentle peace and protective grace sitting next to my parents in the pew of our humble church, the fresh evergreen trees near the altar, the numerous candles lit, the nativity scene providing me the reassurance of a God who was very present in our daily lives. Those very visible symbols provided a re-assurance for the simple but confident faith I had in the reality of the mysteries so many adults have lost touch with in the every-day reality of their lives. To believe in such mystery is to capture one's spirit, to hold onto a deeper meaning to life than the motions we go through each day to fulfill our responsibilities, to attend to our activities. Such mysteries draw us to concede that truth is more than what we can visibly witness and credibly explain.

I can't explain how a child can hold so fervently onto the simple belief of the preposterous notion of a Santa Claus; and I can't quite grasp the peace I have witnessed within the faces of the individuals who were just minutes from taking their last breath. There is truth in the world, and the existence of reality beyond the visible, beyond what can be credibly explained. For me at least, the reality of a Santa and the anticipation I felt as the 25th drew closer, was a stepping stone to the faith I held in a distant, all-powerful God who could be born as an infant in a simple barn—with a glow and unspeakable peace emanating from that manger forever present in soul of each person. As another Christmas approaches I long to grasp the wonder, the faith, the belief in such mystery that alone frees me to receive the gift of peace, the gentle spirit of hope that is and can be a reality of God's intimate presence in our world.

Finance Council

The St. Joseph Finance Council met Thurs., Nov. 15, 2018, in Nazareth Hall. Fr. Tim Johnson called the meeting to order at 515 p.m. and led the group in prayer. The following were in attendance: Lay Directors Pam Fisher and Cory Knudtson, Council Members Holly Skopec, Chad Harms, Tony Peschong, Connie Jones and Steve Anderson and Financial Secretary Susan Reiser. Absent and excused was Jim Baumgard.

The minutes from the July 17, 2018 meeting were reviewed. Skopec moved with a second by Jones to approve the minutes. All ayes. Carried.

Newly appointed Finance Council member Tony Peschong was welcome by the group.

Financial Reports

The comparative balance sheet ending Oct. 31, 2018, the profit and loss statement as of Oct. 31 and the budget vs. actual statement as of Oct. 31 were reviewed. Discussion was held. Harms moved with a second by Anderson to approve the reports. All ayes. Carried. The members reviewed a transaction list.

Bells/Clock Tower

Fr. Tim updated the group on the bells/clock tower project. Verdin Bell Company has been on site and started preliminary work. The company will return in the spring to complete the project. The total \$55,000 cost of the project has been raised.

Second Collection Discussion

Fr. Tim presented a recommendation for next year's summer second collection. After discussion, Anderson moved with a second by Fisher to allow a detailed solution that includes: two collections to be for the work of the Haiti Committee and two collections for the Peace and Justice Committee. One of the Haiti Committee collections will include an envelope in the pew. Representatives from the Peace and Justice Committee and the Haiti Committee will meet jointly with staff to determine the dates for those collections. The remaining weekends of the summer, approximately 11 additional, will be pooled by and split equally by the music department, youth ministry, building and grounds, Catholic Charities, Seminarian Support and Outreach, faith formation, parish charity fund and Catholic Relief Services. In addition, the Haiti Committee will received \$3,500 from the general budget. All ayes. Carried.

Good of the Order

Fr. Tim reported that the weekend of Nov. 17-18 would be the final weekend for Music Director Jennifer Johnson. Applications are being taken for her replacement. A job description was reviewed by those in attendance.

Finance Council members toured the northwest corner of the school to view the location of the music director's office. Fr. Tim would like to move the door to the music director's office to the south so a clear, visual of the room can be seen. This would convert this room into a permanent classroom. Another door into the northwest classroom would be added to separate the two rooms. The former office of the Faith Formation Director is expected to become the new office for a new music minister.

Staff presented carpet bids for offices that were discussed last fall. After discussion, Harms moved with a second by Skopec to recarpet the offices and include the furniture moving fee in the bid. All ayes. Carried.

Fr. Tim reported that beginning in January, parishioners will receive their stewardship envelopes in the mail rather than picking up a box at church. In the past, over 350 boxes have been discarded because they were not picked up. This new system will track parishioners' addresses and reduce the amount of envelopes printed.


Discussion was held on automatic withdrawal availability for stewardship. St. Joseph currently has about 10 parishioners who have established ach payments on a weekly and monthly basis. More information will be published in the future about the various options available.

In the past, a local business has purchased religious calendars for distribution to St. Joseph Parishioners. This business will no longer be providing calendars. Fr. Tim is working with a company to produce a calendar. Thanks to a memorial gift, religious calendars will be available to parishioners in December.

Fr. Tim reported that four persons had applied for the part time rectory housekeeping position. Lois Eckard has been hired for this job.

Fisher moved with a second by Harms to adjourn at 6:17 p.m. All ayes. Carried.



OPERATION: CLOCK TOWER WE MADE IT TO THE TOP!

Thank you to the many generous parishioners and visitors we have at St. Joseph.

The Verdin Bell Company will be back in the spring to complete the project.



As the Verdin Bell Company begin the work next spring, refurbishing our three bells and the installation of the new parts and digital control system, may I provide a brief background. Our existing three bells were cast by the Stuckstede Bell Foundry out of St. Louis at the time the present church was constructed in 1920. They are valued at \$45,000, \$15,000 and \$8,000 respectively. Forty years ago, in 1978, Verdin Bell Company installed the digital control system we are presently using; and, as they have informed us, it is certainly at the end of its life expectancy. Inspecting the bells and steeple clock last fall Verdin Company noted the swinging bell ringers were not operating on the large, medium and small bells, and need to be replaced. They will install a new custom engineered swinging bell ringer with the correct horsepower to properly strike the bells. Verdin will complete their work with the installation of the new digital bell controller capable of handling several different rings at the touch of a button (or preprogrammed): Westminster Chime, funeral tolls, hour and half hour strikes, wedding peals, the Angelus, call to worship before weekend Masses. All programming will be stored in the battery back-up memory, automatically correcting after power failures as well as spring and fall time changes. Without having to climb the steeple, our clock tower will be controlled from the digital box in the sacristy. May we continue to protect and enhance our church and surrounding property, providing an environment that is inviting and welcoming to all who desire to share in our Eucharist, our faith and parish gatherings.


