

Anytime we can celebrate the martvrdom of Korean saints alongside that of the apostles, with Mother Teresa in company alongside a young Mohawk Native American and young Edith Stein visiting with each other, not to mention Patrick shar-

ing stories in his Irish lilt voice, interspersed with grandparents, dads and moms, siblings as well as uncle and aunts, old neighbors and friends—such a company of saints seems so exciting and eclectic as to be a possibility for each of us to be judged worthy.

During this month of November, our time of Remembrance, beginning with All Saints Day and All Souls Day we pause in faith to ponder the aspects of



eternal life—"heaven" and whether we will be



judged worthy. As the song denotes, "I can only imagine," but I always harken back to the experience my retired friend Frank shared with me. He struggled with heart complications, joint arthritis and

surgeries as he aged. Recovering in the hospital from surgery on his heart he recalled in his words: "I was lying comfortably in the bed when a nurse came in to check on me. I told her I was peering at a little black dot on the wall before me. She in-

stinctively knew this sign, hurriedly left the room and called 'code blue.' I don't remember anything following with the exception of the immense presence of peace I felt within myself. They resuscitated me and explained what had happened. But if heaven is anything like the peace I felt at that moment, I no longer have any fears or qualms." sibly, the saints could provide us a bit of enlightenment concerning the eternal grace of heaven.

"There, good will shall be so ordered in us that we shall have no other desire than to remain there eternally." (St. Augustine) "If we only got to heaven, what a sweet and easy thing it will be there to be always saying with the angels and the saints, 'Sanctus, sanctus,'" (St. Philip Neri)

"No one will have any other desire in heaven than what God wills; and the desire of one will be the desire of all; and the desire of all and of each one will also be the desire of God." (St. Anselm of Canterbury)

"Earth hath no sorrow that heaven cannot heal." (St. Thomas More) Each of us have our own opinions and thoughts about heaven, hell and purgatory. Whatever the descriptive reality of these 'spheres'—our opinions notwithstanding—only God has the power to judge us worthy to be received into his eternal presence or not; to withhold our souls for a time of 'refinement.' Only God has that power to judge however well intentioned our Christian judgments may be. During this "Month of Remembrance" I leave you with a poem by the esteemed poet Ted Kooser of Nebraska which reflects what we feel in light of death, heaven, hell and grace:

FATHER

Today you would be ninety-seven if you had lived, and we would all be miserable, you and your children, driving from clinic to clinic, an ancient, fearful hypochondriac and his fretful son and daughter. asking directions, trying to read the complicated, fading map of cures. But with your dignity intact you have been gone for twenty years, and I am glad for all of us, although I miss you every day—the heartbeat under your necktie, the hand cupped on the back of my neck, Old Spice in the air, your voice delighted with stories. On this day each year you loved to relate that at the moment of your birth your mother glanced out the window and saw lilacs in bloom. Well, today lilacs are blooming in side yards all over lowa, still welcoming you.






Together In Faith






