

I haven't a clue what gifts we unwrapped the following morning, or the Christmas meal, but that unusual, brief interlude on that early evening the day before Christmas has



never escaped my memory. Yes, dad was intrigued



by his toy if you will—the Canon camera—but more so his desire to find that true Spirit of Christmas within the silence and the lights, within the peace and grateful anticipation—on that Holy Eve. I call such endeavor we all desire, "A Sense of Place." Finding the essence, the

Spirit, the holiness of this Season beyond the cards sent and received, the gifts wrapped and given, those received; a Sense of Place where we find the presence of God before and within us, and the purpose of life at that moment. Such resonated within Mary on that cold evening in Bethlehem as

The St. Joseph Finance Council met Thursday, Nov. 5, 2019, in the parish office. Fr. Tim Johnson called the meeting to order at 5:15 p.m. and lead the group in prayer. The following were in attendance: Fr. Tim Johnson, Lay Director Pam Fisher, Council Members Tony Peschong, Chad Harms, Steve Anderson, Jim Baumgard, Connie Jones and Holly Skopec and Financial Secretary Susan Reiser. Absent and excused as Lay Director Chris Stein. The minutes from the Sept. 5, 2019 meeting were reviewed. Baumgard moved with a second by Skopec to approve the minutes. All ayes. Carried.

Projects Update

Gutter Project: Fr. Tim reported that repairs to the copper gutters have been completed and repair of the window and walls inside have also been completed.

Bell Tower: Fr. Tim updated the group on the bells/clock tower project. The motor on the clock is having difficulty keeping time. Verdin Clock Company suggested that we install a new motor to be digitally updated. This repair is expected to save about 90% of the electricity we are now using to operate the clock. Baumgard moved with a second by Anderson to purchase the new motor at a cost of \$14,000 to solve the problem. This part will automatically set the time on the clocks to be in sync with daylight savings time.

Landscaping: Lisa Pederson has started on revamping and sprucing up the landscaping on the grounds. Her work will continue next spring.

Cemetery: Gayle Weiskircher has mowed twice, filled graves and seeded various areas of the cemetery.

Commercial dehumidifier: Fr. Tim said that a new commercial dehumidifier will be installed shortly in the basement. It will be connected directly with a floor drain and can be shut off and moved in the case of an event being held in the basement.

Financial Reports

The comparative balance sheet ending October 31, 2019, the profit and loss statement as of October 31 and the budget vs. actual statement as of October 31 were reviewed. Discussion was held. Fisher moved with a second by Jones to approve the reports. All ayes. Carried.

After discussion, Harms moved with a second by Peschong to authorize Fr. Tim to move funds from the checking account to certificates of deposit in increments of \$25,000 as needed. All ayes. Carried.

Good of the Order

Discussion was held on *The Globe* and the new "Together As One" campaign, formerly known as Diocesan Annual Appeal.

The Clothing Room situation was discussed. At this time, members feel the clothing room should remain as is.

Some members asked about the status of the adjacent house and garage to the west of the church. Fr. Tim said he would check the status with the owner.

Finance Council member Holly Skopec was thanked for her years of service to the council. Her second term has expired and this meeting was her final meeting of her term. Fr. Tim is expected to appoint a new member in the near future to fill Skopec's position.

Harms moved with a second by Skopec to adjourn the meeting at 5:57 p.m. All ayes. Carried. The next meeting will be held in February of 2020.




Miracle Choir Plans for Christmas
