
A friend and I argued about the actual time when the trees would leaf out; I stubbornly clung to a time closer to the end of April and he chose a time in early May. At any rate, entertaining one of the many facets of this season of

Spring, the buds are beginning to appear, the leaves sure to follow, with the Magnolias flowering first then the flowering crab trees. Robins have recently discovered earthworms. tulips will soon show their colors, and the smell of lilacs will fill the air. Such is the character of Spring that renews the earth in our sector of the world, and lifts up

our spirits. Though by and large unwanted and unloved, I do miss the other sign of this season: the yellow faced dandelions. So it is apropos to recognize and remember the nurturing gift of mothers in this season. Hardly a secular day, its roots can be traced back to a woman named Anna Jarvis. In 1908 she held a memorial for her mother at St. Andrew's Methodist



Church in Grafton, West Virginia. As a peace ac-



tivist who cared for the wounded soldiers on both sides of the Civil War, she actively campaigned to make Mother's Day a recognized holiday in our country. Though Congress ini-


tially rejected her proposal, by 1911 all the states observed the holiday. In 1914 President Woodrow Wilson signed a proclamation designating Mother's Day to be held on the second Sunday in May. Our recognition and

remembrance of mothers seems as natural to the season of Spring as the return of the robins.

I was recently struck by the bio of Marina Tsvetaeva, a talented woman and protective mother who was born in Moscow, Russia, 1892. She published her first book of poems at the age of 18, attracting the attention of writers and publishers, and

continued to write prolifically. During the Bolshevik revolution and the War she was forced to live apart from her soldier husband, at the same time grieving the loss of her youngest

Finance Council

The St. Joseph Finance Council met Thursday, April 4, 2019, in the parish office Fr. Tim Johnson called the meeting to order at 5:15 p.m. and led the group in prayer. The following were in attendance: Fr. Tim Johnson, Lay Directors Pam Fisher and Chris Stein, Council Members Holly Skopec, Chad Harms, Tony Peschong, Steve Anderson, Jim Baumgard and Financial Secretary Susan Reiser. Absent and excused was Connie Jones. The minutes from the Feb. 13, 2019 meeting were reviewed. Baumgard moved with a second by Skopec to approve the minutes. All ayes. Carried.

Haiti Representatives

Haiti Committee Representatives Kathy Banwart and Aaron Lorch were present to discuss the work of the Haiti Committee and possible funding for FY 19-20. Haiti reps said that they need \$5,710 per quarter or nearly \$23,000 per year to keep the Haiti school in operation. The 2019-20 budget includes a \$3,500 budgeted line item.

Financial Reports

The comparative balance sheet ending March 31, 2019, the profit and loss statement as of March 31 and the budget vs. actual statement as of March 31 were reviewed. Discussion was held. Anderson moved with a second by Harms to approve the reports. All ayes. Carried. After discussion, Harms moved with a second by Peschong to move \$100,000 to a certificate of deposit. All ayes. Carried.

Projects Update

Bell Tower: Fr. Tim updated the group on the bells/clock tower project. Several boxes of equipment have arrived from the Verdin Bell Company. Work is expected to begin in early spring.

Gutter Project: The gutter damage on the southside of the church will be repaired when weather allows in the spring.

Fire Alarms: After a recent inspection by Johnson Controls, the monitoring company for the fire alarm system, it was determined that additional horns, smoke and heat detectors, strobes and electrical work needs to be completed to be in compliance with Iowa Code. Harms moved with a second by Anderson to approve the quote of \$21,580 so St. Joseph will be in compliance with the code. All ayes. Carried.

Adjacent Property: Discussion was held on the property for sale to the north of the rectory. A group of Building and Grounds and Finance Council members recently toured the property. Staff will continue to monitor.

Rectory Trees: Last year a wind storm uprooted a large tree in front of the rectory. Fr. Tim has requested that two Prairie Fire trees be planted to replace the downed tree. A local tree firm has been contacted and will complete the project in the next few weeks. The project is being funded by two parishioners who wish to place the trees in memory of loved ones.

Classroom Door: A door will be relocated on the north classroom. We are on Alex Jones' list.

2019-20 Budget

The 2019-20 preliminary budget was reviewed. After discussion, the budget will be finalized. The Finance Council will approve it at the June 6 Finance Council meeting.

Second Collection

Staff will meet with a representative from Peace and Justice and the Haiti Committee in the next few weeks to finalize the summer second collection schedule.

Fisher moved with a second by Baumgard to adjourn at 6:40 p.m. All ayes. Carried.



daughter who died from malnutrition. For reasons of safety she left Russia with her older daughter, finally settling in France. At the insistence of her family Marina returned with her daughter. Shortly thereafter her husband and daughter were both arrested and he was later executed. Her former friends were afraid to associate with Marina and eventually, for her safety and that of her only remaining child, her son, Marina moved to a far distant rural village. With little means of support she tenaciously protected her son, though her prodigious writing was halted out of fear of the Communist regime. Marina Tsvetaeva, a gifted writer and a protective mother, died without notice and buried in a mass grave.

Why such tragedy happens I will never understand. But her purpose like so many women whom God blesses as mothers, capable of loving and nurturing, gifted with abilities that make a difference if not in the world at large at least within their family and community, are rightfully acknowledged on Mother's Day. Lest we forget, one of the last scenes on the cross edifies this special day we celebrate each Spring. "When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple whom he loved standing beside her he said, 'Woman, here is your son.' Then he said to the disciple, 'Here is your mother.'"

As the leaves soon appear on my prairie fire crab tree planted next to the church playground I leave you with this poem by David Young entitled, Mother's Day:

I see her doing something simple, paying bills, or leafing through a magazine or a book, and wish that I could say, and she could hear, that now I start to understand her love for all of us, the fullness of it. It burns there in the past, beyond my reach, a modest lamp.

May the Lord renew the spirit of hope in each of us this Spring, and protect the nurturing and gifted grace within all mothers,

Building and Grounds Committee Meeting

The St. Joseph Building and Grounds Committee met Thurs., March 21, 5:15 p.m. in the parish office. In attendance were: Fr. Tim, Pam Fisher, Chris Stein, Dean Reiser, Deb Travis, Irene McCoy, Bill Aumer and Susan Reiser. Jim Sporrer was absent and excused. Fr. Tim opened the meeting with prayer.

Project updates were given.

Tile Movement

It has been suggested that the tile adjacent to the serving windows in the parish center be enlarged so that the entire steam table area is on tile rather than carpet. The tile would be extended to the east side of the storage door. The bumps will also be removed to allow for better movement of glass and cup carts. Father will check with Gary Espinoza.

East Wall Banners

Fr. Tim reported that he would like to hang a wood cross and two banners on the east wall of the parish center to give the room more of a religious tone. Banners would be donated by the St. Joseph Quilters. The cross will be constructed by resident wood-maker Bill Aumer.

Fire Alarms

Johnson Controls recently inspected the facilities and have determined that several additional fire alarms and horns are needed throughout the facility to meet lowa Code. After we receive a cost estimate, a two-day installation of needed items will be completed.

Bells

Fr. Tim reported that the Verdin Company will be on-site this spring to complete the bell renovation project.

Rectory Trees

A storm last fall caused a big tree in the rectory front yard to be uprooted. Fr. Tim said he would like to plant two trees in the place of the large one that fell. Persons interested in contributing funds for two prairie fire trees in memory of a loved one should call the parish office. Fr. will contact Ferguson's and arrange for the trees to be planted.

Gutter Project

Last year's late snowstorm caused significant damage to gutters on the southside of the church. Because of timing, Christiansen's Sheet Metal, of Spencer, was not able to complete the repairs last fall. Additional damage was done this winter on the north side. Staff will continue to work with Christiansen's to complete the entire project this spring. Most of the repair costs are expected to be covered by insurance.

Classroom Door

Some time ago, Fr. Tim suggested installing a door to the south of the back classroom. We are currently waiting for the contractor to arrive. Alex Jones has assured us that St. Joseph is on his list.

Adjacent Property

Fr. Tim told those in attendance that the property adjacent to the rectory to the north is for sale. Members will tour this property next week to check out the possibilities of owning adjacent land to the church.

Employee Review

Those in attendance were updated on job descriptions.

Inspection

Members toured the facilities and found the following items that need attention:

- → Southeast corner of church ceiling needs dry wall repair.

Cracks are more noticeable in the ceiling of the north wall of the side altar. Some new peeling of paint was also reported. Staff will contact a company for inspection purposes.

- → Repair cement outside sacristy door.
- ✓ The corner ceiling of the balcony may also need attention.
- ▼ The wall on the southwest side of the basement door seems to be bowing.
- → Bricks on landing need to be scrubbed to remove white calcium.
- ✓ Cement by end of sidewalk by handicapped area may need to be repaired.
- ✓ Uneven level of sidewalk to street needs yellow paint marking.
- → Branch hanging in front tree needs to be removed.

The meeting adjourned at 6:25 p.m.






