


When someone recently shared the findings of their "ancestry test-

ing" which concluded a presence of Native American blood in their background I grinned, a bit unbeliev-Such ing. brought back а memory of a beautiful La-Sioux kota

woman who worked for Pine Ridge Indian School guided by the Jesuits. With her long black hair, olive complexion, and perfect English there was no mistaking her back-Her discussion around. with us about the Lakota Sioux, their spirituality, customs and the influence of the Catholic faith through the presence of the Jesuits reflected a certain pride in her background and strength of her Catholic faith and spirituality. She reminded us of the circular formation of the Catholic church, embracing Native American spirituality of the cycle of



life—the earth and human life all tied together in the grace of God's creation. We were offered an explanation of how the tradition of our Catholic faith embraces the principles



of their culture, providing an extraordinary spirituality to the prayers and Sacraments shared on this Lakota reservation. Her sincere words of explanation—though most likely shared many times over for visitors—reflected a deep love of God, the Sacraments, and the sacredness of the earth and humanity so profusely tied

together through the seasonal cycles.

Lent is a similar journey of rediscovering the facets of our Catholic faith, nurturing our personal relationship with Christ Jesus prompted by a desire to open our eyes to the different facets of God's presence before us, within us and around us. Our forty day axiom of fasting, prayer and almsgiving can guide us to a renewed vision of God's grace within the Sacraments we share.

> and the world around us. As Pope Francis reminds us. "Lent comes providentially reawaken us, to shake us from our lethargy." Of course. the prospect of Lent can simply be dimin-

ished by stepping aside the forty days and remain focused on the routine of daily life; or with little wonder or risk, simply doing the personal touches of prayer, fasting and almsgiving that has safely brought you through the forty days of Lent in previous years. I can't help

but to wonder though, how this beautiful Lakota woman senses a renewal of God's grace in her life each day, inspired by continuity of the Sacraments and the seasonal challenges. But such may be our course, to seek that renewal within the routine of our daily lives and yet the evolving face of God that seeks our attention, our gratefulness regardless of the season. "We must be willing to get rid of the life we've planned, so as to have the life that is waiting for us. The old skin has to be shed before the new one can come."

As explained, the Lakota culture have no specific word for "good bye." Such is to 'final' of a parting. Rather, the word they share when leaving another's presence—"doksa"—means 'we will see you again if not physically, in spirit.' May our Lenten journey and resolutions, personal efforts and prayer guide us to believe in such the same with Christ Jesus—never seeking a farewell but reawakening of the soul to his presence greeting us in a new day, at a given moment. And with Spring a mere three weeks away so true the words, "The beautiful spring came; and when Nature resumes her loveliness, the human soul is apt to revive also."

May the words on St. Patrick's breastplate give us the fortitude through these forty days of Lent.



Since children will be here for faith formation classes that is a perfect time for families to attend Mass and eat together. At this special Mass we tell the children not to rub off their ashes, a reminder that we are sinners and we need to use the next forty days to do better and grow in grace.




Some people think Lenten practices are a thing of the past. They are not. Lent is a time to hold up a mirror to ourselves and ask, "Am I all that Jesus asked me to be?" For most of us the answer is "NO". We need to make a better effort. For adults and children alike, the time to do it is Lent. Learn to pray if you don't, fast from those rich foods, squirrel away some money for the church collection this year, do a friend or stranger a favor, open your heart and let the river of goodness flow. We get caught up in ourselves much of the time. Lent is the break we need to make with ourselves and put other needs ahead. Those ashes are also a sign that God decides how long we will be on this earth and that someday we will be returned to the earth. The use of ashes as a sacramental has been part of our faith for about 1000 years.

During Lent our students will be able to learn about our church practices and symbols for Lent. One of those things is the Stations of the Cross. Our church offers Stations after certain Masses, and our children will experience them through their classes. All ages can appreciate the final walk Jesus took to His death. 
Enrich your Catholic life and grow strong together as a family this Lent by participating in as much as you can as a family. I highly recommend it.

Lent, Triduum, Easter

1. LENTEN REGULATIONS ON FASTING

- 1. Ash Wednesday is a day of fast and abstinence. This means that all those between 18 and 59 years of age, who are otherwise in good health, should eat only one full meal on Ash Wednesday. Two lighter meals are also permitted. In addition, the law of abstinence requires that all those 14 years of age or older abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday.
- 2. Similarly, Good Friday is also a day of fast and abstinence. The same rules apply as for Ash Wednesday.
- 3. The Fridays of Lent are to be observed as days of abstinence—that is, meat should not be included in the menus of that day.
- 4. Each individual Catholic should resolve upon some other good work or act of penance during the Lenten Season. Above all, this should be a season of prayer, of joining with our brothers and sisters in the faith by assisting at Mass, by the reception of the sacraments, by generosity to religious and charitable causes, and in other good works.

2. THE SACRAMENT OF RECONCILIATION

- A. Communal Penance Services are set for Sun., March 15 at 1:30 p.m. at St. Joseph.
- B. Sacrament of Reconciliation, 30 minutes before daily and weekend masses.

3. ALMSGIVING

Traditionally, almsgiving took the form of giving money to the poor and to other worthy causes. The term has been expanded to include any outreach of time, talent, money or service in behalf of those in any need. During Lent, there are a number of collections taken up for the need of the Church through out the world and in this country:

- a. FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT (Feb. 29-March 1, 2020) Now known as Aid to Global Churches, this collection combines previous collections for Central and Eastern Eurpot, Latin America, Africa and Catholic Relief Services. An envelope for this collection is included in your mailing.
- **b. GOOD FRIDAY (April 10, 2020)** This is a worldwide Collection for the sacred places in the Holy Land. Our offerings maintain and support the shrines remembering events of our Lord's life, death and resurrection in the Holy Land. There is an envelope in your mailing for this collection marked "Holy Land."
- e. EASTER VIGIL AND EASTER SUNDAY (April 11-12, 2020) This is the annual collection for Retired and Infirm Priests. An envelope for this purpose is in your mailing.

Easter Flowers

Remember your loved ones with a contriubution to the Easter Flower Fund for Easter flowers on the altar. Cost is \$12/plant. A mix of various Easter flowers will be purchased from Hy-Vee in Spirit Lake. Envelopes for this purpose are in the packet. Deadline for inclusion in the bulletin is April 8, 12 noon.

Committee members find a special bond working with other churches in the community in the planning of the services. Fr. Tim is currently seeking one or two persons to replace Mary Lou. If you are interested, please call the parish office.






Dedie Thompson presented information regarding a family, who has recently had struggles. No action taken, as no specific needs were noted.
