course, one was Paul's letter to the Corinthians—"faith, hope, and love; and the greatest of these is love"—a commonly chosen passage, but their gospel pick surprised me. Seldom chosen by couples for wedding liturgies, they wanted Matthew's passage of the Beatitudes, "Blessed are they" Reflecting on the respect they had for each other's opinions and thoughts during our visit, a gracious attitude despite the restrictions, a hopefulness for their future together and simple kindness during our time together, possibly their choice of Matthew's Beatitudes is apropos.

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of God," the essential blessing, is really about recognizing your need for God; a recognition that you can't save yourself. Those who are poor in spirit are people who are humble in spirit; they don't look down on others or think they are better than other people. Being poor in spirit is the faith to acknowledge our frail and beautiful humanity, and that of others, while searching for the presence of God for direction and hope in this world. In other words, "poor in spirit" is an appreciation of knowing we're made unique in the face of God.

Yes, our social lives and activities and financial means may have been turned upside down during these past weeks—not to mention the self reflection of our personal attitudes and prejudices watching the protests and demonstrations—but the presence and power and grace of God remains within the commotion of our daily lives and relationships and omnipotent throughout all creation. As the early Roman philosopher Seneca remarked,

"True happiness is to enjoy the present, without anxious dependence upon the future, not to amuse ourselves with either hopes or fears but to rest satisfied with what we have, which is sufficient, for he that is so wants nothing. The greatest blessings of mankind are within us and within our reach. A wise man is content with his lot, whatever it may be, without wishing for what he has not."

We each have our opinions concerning the coronavirus threat and restrictions, and recently, the demonstrations and protests taking place. No doubt, we have our own thoughts about the guidelines set down by the Church and diocese as we reopen our parishes, and too an anxiety about our health and protection. Looking forward we have gratefully remained connected to the Eucharist through the abilities of those who have brought it online into our living rooms and homes. And now, the opportunity to participate and receive the Sacrament providing us with the hope, the gratitude and the acceptance of the life God has granted us through the compassionate love of his Son, our Brother and Savior, Jesus. Under the circumstance of the guidelines in place for our gatherings at the Eucharist, we will form community, welcome a presence of hospitality and receive the true Presence, our guiding light "in good times and bad, in sickness and health," (the marriage vows shared out of faith).

Please pray for Bishop Nickless' wellbeing and guidance as our shepherd during these surreal times, and likewise the presence, the determination, the sacrifices of those health care workers, law enforcement officers and voices of those reminding us of the dignity and hope of each life regardless of age, race or background.

With faith and hope and acceptance of God's presence in our presence we gather for the Eucharist—not limited but protectively wearing a mask, distancing six feet apart, actively participating in Mass with a humble reserve, seeking Christ's Peace within ourself and those present, and graciously receiving the Eucharist as the guiding Presence within our personal lives.

At this time we will remain with the summer schedule, though such could change: Saturday, 4pm & 5:30pm; Sunday, 7:30am, 9am, 10:30am. For the time being only the west canopy doors and east main doors will be unlocked. Though such would be normal and expected, we are to enter and leave church without gathering to visit inside. You must wear a mask, but if you forget we do have a supply on hand. Please help the ushers by following




