

weather creates a bit of anxiety, our season of Autumn with its magnificent colors and changes, and stark beauty, brings us close to the breath of our Creator. As we hear in Ecclesiastes: "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven." Not to mention Psalm 8: "I look at your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place." Weather can be fickle during this season of Autumn but our Creator always leaves us with glimpses of beauty and stark simplicity as the humidity and temps drop. Take the time to clear away the endless voices, face time on screens, daily distractions and consider a few moments or more outside—alone with your thoughts—possibly guided by the whisperings of the Spirit. Mountains, seas and forests are grandeur, but the simple deposit of nature—anywhere—is a marvelous reflection of our Creator's Spirit. Consider the thoughts of writer and activist Rachel Carson who forewarned us about the delicate balance between the preservation of nature and our human advancements: "Those who contemplate the beauty of the earth find reserves of strength that will endure as long as life lasts. There is something infinitely healing in the repeated refrains of nature -- the assurance that dawn comes after night, and spring after winter."

And Ann Frank, holed up in hiding for most of her last few years alluding the Nazi repression: "The best remedy for those who are afraid, lonely or unhappy is to go outside, somewhere where they can be quite alone with the heavens, nature and God. Because only then does one feel that all is as it should be and that God wishes to see people happy, amidst the simple beauty of nature. As long as this exists, and it certainly always will, I know that then there will always be comfort for every sorrow, whatever the circumstances may be. And I firmly believe that nature brings solace in all troubles."

Sometime during this Autumn season, however much you need to bundle up, take a "Prayer-Walk," and maybe repeatedly. Regardless of the distance or time taken, you merely step outside, acknowledge God's presence and His Son at your side with the Sign of the Cross. No need for ritual prayers to be silently prayed; rather, allow yourself to take in the various thoughts that cross your mind and especially the hidden beauty within the stark simplicity of this season we call Autumn. And "saunter," as John Muir would say, not constricted by time or pace, but by the patience of nature. As you return to the door of your humble abode, pray the Lord's Prayer and make the Sign of the Cross, a gesture of acknowledgment and graciousness for Christ's companionship along the walk. As someone informed me years ago about entering a 'retreat time,' "Don't anticipate, merely participate." In the words of John Muir—the founder of our National Park System—speaking from his Christian perspective: "In every walk with nature one receives far more than he seeks." Our Savior and Holy Friend, Christ Jesus, himself 'sauntered' miles in the many Prayer Walks that centered his mission away from the numerous distractions and voices.




is what cultivates in them the desire to do good and be good. It is one of the finest things we can do for our children.
