Happy New Year to all! Another one 'round the bend and we move forward. I would like to take this opportunity to begin this year with a discussion about our Rosary Altar Society of St. Joseph Parish. Each year in our envelope packets, we have a dues envelope. Some ladies pay their dues regularly and even ahead. Others toss it. Dues are only \$10 per year and go to supporting this church, priest, and deacon. I would like to address Rosary-Altar.



This group is made up of ALL the women of the parish that are St. Joseph members and can include the wives who may not be Catholic

but have husbands who are St. Joseph members. This group has been a mainstay of our church for many, many years. It used to have circles and those circles would meet at someone's house or have a special project for the church like the Chicken-Noodle dinner. It gave women a chance to be sociable with the other ladies of their church.

Nowadays, most women work. No longer do we have circles with names like St. Annes, St. Mary's, Our Lady of Fatima or St. Elizabeth's and the women do not socialize that way anymore. Now we are split into 8 groups of women of the parish. That is a lot of women as you are automatically a member of this group. The group meets once a quarter to discuss church or priest needs and we do have some fundraisers. Most importantly, it is the women of Rosary-Altar who provide food and assistance to families who have had a death.

Sooner or later we will all have need of our church for a funeral in our family. Many have a lunch afterwards where family and friends gather to honor the deceased. Families take pictures as it is one of the few times they are able to come together. Sad but true. It is up to us, the ladies of the parish, the Rosary-Altar group, to assist with that lunch through help, cakes, or salads. As a member of the parish and community it is what we do to help each other, and an act of mercy, to meet those needs as we hope will be done for us someday.

In order to make this happen, each group has a calling tree. A leader will ask for help, salad or cake. Sometimes we do not have current numbers. Please take care of that. Usually, you will only be called once a year. We are aware many work, but many do not. Help for a funeral luncheon is a problem. The need for cakes and salads is usually met. Even if you can come to help clean up for an hour or just set tables...GREAT. Please know you are providing a wonderful and unique service to your church and community when we can provide the luncheon. Many churches cannot provide this any longer. We do not want St. Joseph's to be among those.

As a member of the parish, staff and one who helps with many funerals, I am asking you to please acknowledge the call when you get it and do what you can. Ignoring this Christian duty is not something we should be doing. The need will not be going away and our help is a help to any family going through the funeral process. Please make it one of your 2023 resolutions. Thank you for reading this about Rosary-Altar.

Division 1: Grades 4-5 Categories: Essay, Poetry, Art, Computer Art

Division 2 Grades 6-7-8 Categories: Essay, Poetry, Art, Computer Art, Music, Photography

Division 3

Grades: 9-10-11-12 Categories: Essay, Poetry, Art, Computer Art, Music, Photography

Division 4

Adult CDA members Categories: Essay, Poetry, Art, Photography

CATEGORIES AND SPECIFIC RULES:

- Essay: Typed only, not to exceed 500 words on one page, not front and back.
- Poetry: Any style of poetry, typed, not to exceed eight (8) lines
- Art: Size: 8 1/2 x 11 No Lettering (your art carries the message). Do not put your name on the Art. How the theme is carried out in Art will be part of the judging, in addition to artistic talent. Medium: Crayon, markers, ink, paints (watercolor, acrylic, oil), charcoal, pencil (black or colored), pastels (chalk) and duct tape.
- Computer Art: Size: 8 1/2" x 11" or 8" X 12", No Lettering. Art must be artist's own creation and should fill the majority of the page. NO clip art or images imported from web sites.
- Music: Lyrics and notes must be on professional music score paper (melody, harmony and accompaniment, all of which must be notated accurately) and must be contestant's own creation. Composition music paper, CD or thumb drive (no Mp3, MIDI or other electronic formats allowed) of the performance must accompany the entry using the music score paper. While the composition must be the contestant's own creation the performer of the composition does not need to be the composer. No DVD.
- Photography: Size 8" x 10" picture depicting the theme. No matting allowed. The contestant must have taken the photo. The picture may not be a computer downloaded image or a picture of a picture. It can be colored or black and white but no collages.

Judges will use rules of Clarity, Grammar, Spelling, Interpretation of Theme, and all peculiar rules in the categories listed above.

GENERAL RULES:

- 1. Contestants may enter a category only once but may submit entries in multiple categories. A local CDA Court must sponsor contestants.
- 2. Entries not conforming to one of the themes or not conforming to the rules will be disqualified.
- 3. Entries will not be returned. All contest material becomes the property of the National CDA court with the right to display and/or publish any or all material
- 4. Decisions of the judges will be final. Judges reserve the right to make no awark in a Division or Category. Commercial entries will be disqualified. Judging will be based on the Rubic Scoring provided by National.
- 5. A 2022 2023 National CDA Education Contest Entry Form must accompany each entry and be properly signed and completed. Names must be legible. Forms are to be taped or glued to the back of the entry.
- 6. All entries must be of contestant's own imagination and creation.
- 7. No entries should be folded or rolled. Neatness is a key factor in judging

DEADLINE: Entries must be received by February 1, 2023.

AWARDS:

The one first place winning entry for each Category in each Division (either theme, not both) will be forwarded to the State Contest Chairperson and the winning entries at the State level will be forwarded to the National Education Contest Chairperson.



The St. Joseph Social Justice Committee met Wednesday, December 7, 2022. The meeting was called to order at 8:18 a.m. by Chair Koelder. Present were Lois Koelder, Connie Bjornstad, Fran Cerny, Bob Moore, Diane Clary, and Dedie Thompson. Dennis Lippon attended by proxy given to Bob Moore. Father Brian Hughes joined the meeting at 9:12 a.m.. Bob Moore opened the meeting in prayer.

Agenda – There were no additions or changes to the printed agenda.



Financials – Koelder gave the report of the current Social Justice financials to November 30, 2022. A motion was made by Moore and seconded by Bjornstad to approve the financial statements as of November 30, 2022. Hearing no further discussion, the motion was put to a vote with all present voting aye. Motion carried.


