
place palms that you might have in your home. This is a wonderful old tradition and we would like to restore it here at St. Joseph's.

days. We fast.


◆ Catholics are obliged to abstain from eating meat on the Fridays of Lent. We fast and abstain during Lent to help us focus on the



CDA Scholarship Forms Available





Together In Faith

March ushers in for us the Season of Lent. There are many special things that happen during this season and the first of which is Ash Wednesday. Most every Christian acknowledges this day by the receiving and wearing of Ashes to indicate we know we are human and that means we tend to sin. As a result of sin, we have death which will only leave our soul to join with God in heaven. I think it is safe to say we all want that for the end but is it automatic?

That answer would be NO. In our lifetime and especially during seasons like this we need to re-examine how we are conducting ourselves in life. Are we following Jesus' example of taking care of others and our church? Lent reminds us of



how we can better follow His example. The Bible stories of Lent are classic. Raise the bar for yourself during Lent: give something up that you really like as an example of sacrifice, do something extra for others daily or weekly, refamiliarize yourself with Mass and get close to Jesus. There are many, many examples of things to give up or extras to do even if it is just a pledge to give someone a compliment each day of Lent instead of only being concerned with oneself. How about Mass?

COVID did a number on Mass attendance. However, it is time to not use it as an excuse. The Eucharist is still the most important reason for attending Mass. In a word association game, if I say Eucharist, you say______. Your answer should be "Jesus." This most Holy Sacrament was begun at the Last Supper by Jesus for us forever. We believe, as Catholics, that Jesus is present in the bread and wine once consecrated by the priest, to become His Body and Blood. It is one of our greatest Mysteries and gifts, and it delivers us the Real Presence of Jesus. What can be greater than that? The benefits of receiving the Eucharist are many. When we receive, it takes away venial sin and increases grace in us, we become one with Jesus, it helps us love others better and strengthens us to overcome our own faults. It can allow a deeper relationship with Christ. If you have mortal sin without confession however, all of the above is null. For this, we have the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Gratefully, God allows us forgiveness and to be able to walk side by side with his Son. We do not have to go through life carrying baggage that is too heavy for us.

Our Catholic faith will work to our advantage if you let it. Making the effort to increase



the benefit of our faith is worth it and Lent is a perfect time to reorganize priorities to better our efforts. Check out all the special things offered during Lent in this newsletter. One addition will be Children's Liturgy offered during the Sundays of Lent to our children in third grade and younger. They will gather at the front when called and leave with a Catechist to hear the Word of God and do an activity on their level. I have missed this activity and it will make a comeback just for this special season. Bible studies are going on, soup suppers, the Sacrament of Reconciliation, and service opportunities. Lent is a time to better ourselves. Are you up to the challenge?
