THE PASTOR'S CORNER



Last weekend I had the awesome opportunity to climb Gorham Mountain on Mount Desert Island with a couple dozen of our college students. The weather was ideal for hiking and we all had a wonderful time, but the peak for us was not reaching the 525 foot summit, but rather the celebration of Mass on the mountain. We found the perfect spot with the perfect rock “altar” and offered the perfect sacrifice of Christ to the Father in the perfect beauty of His creation. It was wondrous and life-giving. At different points during the Mass, I caught glimpses of other hikers who stopped to see what was going on...it’s quite the spectacle to see a bunch of 20-something year-olds on their knees in adoration before the presence of God in the middle of the wilderness. As we descended the mountain to go indulge in some ice cream in Bar Harbor, it struck me just how blessed we are in our parish to have the witness of our college students. They spent their entire Saturday with a priest climbing a mountain. They come to the Newman Center week after week for Mass and confession, adoration and Bible studies, Men’s and Women’s Groups, suppers and fellowship. They go on mission trips and retreats, they reach out to those in need, and they care about each other deeply. They are young and free and could be doing anything, and yet they have chosen and continue to choose Christ. This is powerful, and it’s right in front of us! I am blessed, *we* are blessed, that they are a part of us and we are a part of them. When we look at them, we’re looking at the future of our Church, and it’s a privilege to be able to see this and to invest in it.

That being said, I’m going to make a shameless plug for our capital campaign. After several weeks of experiencing the life and faith of these college students, I am convinced now more than ever of the necessity and urgency of building them a new home. The Newman Center is their haven, the place where they encounter the love of Christ in an intimate way and where they are prepared to live that love in the world. They don’t have to be there – they actually *want* to be there, and this is amazing and inspiring. But their home is deteriorating, rotting away, and is too small...that’s where you and I come in. God has blessed us and is giving us the opportunity to witness to them as they have to us. So let’s build them their new home. Let’s build them a shelter where they can grow, and pray, and adore, and eat, and commune, and be filled. Let’s build them a place their children will be able to come to and do the same. I am so excited about this endeavor...*they need you to be too!* Thank you to all who have given to our campaign so far. If you haven’t yet, please consider doing so. Your investment will reach much, much, much farther than you can imagine. God bless you for your goodness!

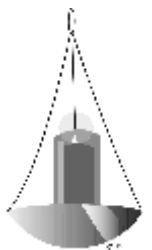

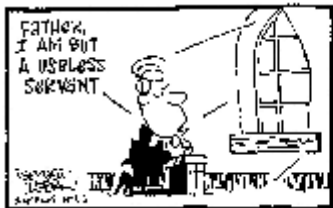

Gospel Meditation

“When you have done all you have been commanded, say ‘We are unprofitable servants; we have done what we were obliged to do.’” The metaphor in the story could seem harsh to us today. A servant has worked hard all day, and rather than receiving a much-needed respite, the master commands an additional task. Jesus, however, is appearing to their sensibilities. This was a hierarchical society in which everyone had a place. His listeners would know this. No servant would presume a reward for good deeds.

It’s important to remember that we do have a place at God’s table. But we don’t “earn” it. Dining with the Lord at the heavenly wedding feast requires surrender. It requires deep faith in God and His promises. It also requires commitment. The kingdom takes work! There are fields to plow and initiatives to prepare. There are sheep to tend to and family to care for. There are people waiting for our yes to generous service. When we serve dinner at a homeless shelter, we are waiting on the table of Christ. When we visit an ill relative, we’re imitating the Good Samaritan. We’re visiting Jesus! We’re growing his kingdom of life and love.

The Gospel today reminds us to check our motives. Are we serving because we’re seeking a reward? Or because we have faith that this is who we’re meant to serve? That is, is this where we’re meant to be? The Gospel reminds us that this faith can do powerful things! *“If you have faith the size of a mustard seed, you would say to this mulberry tree, ‘Be uprooted and planted in the sea,’ and it would obey you.”* But, ultimately, we’re not the ones doing the deeds. We’re not the ones “earning” the grace. Faith, and the good we do for others, is a gift.



Questions of the Week for Scripture Reflection

Hebrews 1:2-3; 2:2-4

The prophet Habakkuk sought answers from the Lord to the sufferings of his times. Habakkuk was encouraged to seek answers through the lens of faith. How does your faith help you sort through the social discord of our times?

2 Timothy 1:6-8, 13-14

Paul opens his letter to his co-worker Timothy urging him to pass on the faith without hesitation. What gives you pause to share your faith with others?

Luke 17:5-10

In the apostles’ request to “increase our faith,” Jesus emphasizes the importance of service. In what ways does your service to others reflect what you believe?

What is the story behind the Rosary?



The rosary is a sacred and popular Catholic devotion, but its origins are mysterious. Prayer beads to facilitate meditation began in the early ages of the Church. In the early medieval period, bead strings were used to count Hail Marys or Our Fathers. A tradition has developed that the rosary in its current form was given to St. Dominic by the Blessed Mother. However, the earliest biographies of the saint do not include this story. In the Middle Ages, the prayers were grouped into 50 Hail Marys with verses from Psalms and vignettes from the lives of Jesus and Mary. By the 16th century, the Joyful, Sorrowful, and Glorious Mysteries were established.

The rosary rose to prominence in the late 1500s. The Turkish Empire was spreading across eastern Europe, and pirates were raiding Christian ships. The Christian nations of Europe rallied for a great battle at sea. Pope St. Pius V urged all Christians to pray the rosary for victory. While vastly outnumbered, the Christian fleet was victorious at the Battle of Lepanto. The pope established October 7th as the feast of the Holy Rosary. Later, all of October would come to be known as the Month of the Rosary.

Inspiration for the Week

All of the violence and unrest we regularly witness in our world can easily distress us. We can also find ourselves wondering how long it will take before God intervenes and does something about it. Then we remember our call to discipleship and spreading the Good News of the Gospel. We recall the persecutions the early disciples endured and the fate of so many martyrs throughout history, both past and present. It is not God’s responsibility to fix our mess but ours. God has given us the power of love and a strength of endurance that comes from Him alone. Our request of God becomes that of the disciples: “Increase our faith.” It is our task to stand up for the values of the Gospel and live them regardless of the price.

St. John XXIII

On October 11th, we celebrate John XXIII, the pope who was first a pastor. Born in Italy at the turn of the 19th century, he was ordained in 1904. His priestly assignments brought him in close contact with the faithful time and time again. He served as a seminary professor, an assistant to the bishop leading pilgrimages and social programs, and a medic and chaplain during World War I. After his ordination as a bishop, he served in Bulgaria, Turkey, and Greece to assist the Church there in her dialogue with Muslims and other Christian communities. John XXIII would bring this concern for personal dialogue into his papacy. He convened the Second Vatican Council to promote renewal in the Church as it faced the challenges of the modern world.

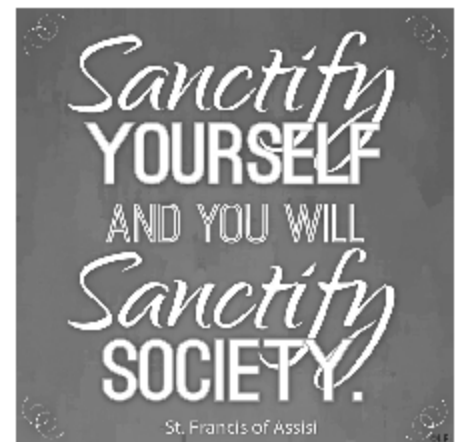
