A SURVEY OF THE BIBLE - THE BOOK OF MICAH

Micah, whose name means "Who Is Like Yahweh?" was a late 8th century prophet and contemporary of Isaiah. Micah was deeply aware that he had to speak out against the socioeconomic and religious abuses of his day. God's judgement, he proclaimed, would come upon Judah. Even Jerusalem and the Temple would be destroyed. Micah's prophecy goes beyond judgement; he also announces salvation. He provides hope, and proclaims that one day Judah will be restored.

The Book of Micah may be divided as follows: The Lord's judgement against his people (1:1-3:12), the restoration of the New Israel (4:1-5:14), and a message of warning and hope (6:1-7:20).

Micah's most memorable passage presents his message as a synthesis of the teaching of the great eighth-century prophets,

"You have been told, O mortal, what is good, and what the Lord requires of you: Only to do justice and to love goodness, and to walk humbly with your God." RSV-CE.


