In today's Gospel passage (Matthew 13:44-52) Jesus speaks to the disciples about the kingdom of heaven. In the passage Jesus compares the kingdom of heaven to several things meant to convey some understanding about heaven. First Jesus compares the kingdom of heaven to a treasure buried in a field. Something of great value. Then Jesus compares the kingdom of heaven to a merchant searching for fine pearls, someone looking for something of great value. And finally, Jesus compares the kingdom of heaven to a net thrown into the sea, collecting fish of every kind, both good and bad. In each case heaven is not depicted as a place. Rather, Jesus speaks of heaven in terms of value. Which leads us to think about what we value, because where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

## Diocesan Council Meeting, June 3, 2023 (Zoom Meeting) [Part 1]

The Eastern Diocesan Council meeting was opened by Bishop Sobiechowski at 10:06 am. Father Senior Nemkovich offered the opening prayer. All those in attendance had been previously sworn in so there was no need for the oath of office to be administered.

The agenda was accepted on a motion by Shirley Mietlicki-Floyd, seconded by Ray Pierczarka, and passed. Bishop appointed Marilyn Folcik and Janice Klimczak as co-secretaries to complete the term of Jo-Ann O'Connell.

No minutes of the 2022 meeting were available because of the death of Jo-Ann O'Connell. There was no correspondence.

The treasurer's report was given by Cindy Hebert. Books have not been audited because of illness of the auditors. Motion to accept the report was by Father Senior Nemkovich, seconded by Father Tenus.

Congratulations to Robert and Emilia DeVore who both celebrated their 100th birthdays this week.

A prayer was offered by Father Senior Soltysiak for the repose of the souls of Father Senior Fryderyk Banas who passed away on July 18, 2022, and Jo-Ann O'Connell who passed away on March 16, 2023.

Ray Pieczarka gave a report on the Finance Commission. He stated that the diocese relies on these monies to fund loans to parishes. He also mentioned that it takes between \$130,000 to \$150,000 to keep the diocese afloat. As of May 27, 2023, the fund had a balance of \$1,919,885.

### **Administrative matters**

There are no plans for the movement of the clergy. Father Walsh and Father Piekarzewski have been formally installed in St. Joseph's Parish, Stratford, CT, and St. John the Baptist Parish, Manchester, CT respectively. Father Koerber must be installed as pastor of Holy Name of Jesus, South Deerfield, MA. Shirley Mietlicki-Floyd was asked to look into arranging a date for installation.

Stipends to Administrative Seniors, the Diocesan Treasurer and the editor of The Messenger were reviewed. On a motion by Ray Pieczarka, seconded by Shirley Mietlicki-Floyd, the stipends were set at \$1,025/month for Administrative Seniors, Diocesan Treasurer, \$750, and Editor of The Messenger, \$900/ quarter.

A discussion regarding increasing Bishop Paul's salary took place. Father Senior Krusienski was given the chair to oversee the discussion and vote. On a motion by Father Senior Nemkovich, seconded by Kathy Nemkovich, Bishop's salary was set at \$4,884.35-an increase of \$250/month.

Our legal advisors continue to be Sheehan, Phinney of Manchester, NH.

The Holy Cross Church property (Enfield, CT), including the cemetery, has finally been sold to Holy Ghost Temple Church (Pentecostal). A corporation consisting of Bishop as president and the seniors as officers had been formed in order for this to be accomplished. The new owners will maintain the cemetery (grass cutting) and Father Senior Soltysiak will maintain the cemetery records for the time being.

The diocese had kept the property insured with a multiperil policy which has since lapsed and will be canceled, and Father Senior Soltysiak had been having services to eliminate the possibility of paying real estate taxes.

Thanks were expressed to Father Senior Soltysiak and Father Senior Krusienski for taking care of the legalities and to Father Senior and Janice Soltysiak for removing over 40,000 pounds of debris from the buildings in preparation for the sale. We are waiting for the final bills from Paul Chello, Attorney, and need to dissolve the corporation.

After all costs to the diocese have been paid, the net proceeds equal about \$30,000 which can remain in the diocesan coffers for five years.

Some have done free lunches, fed the homeless, and distributed bags of groceries. Father Wos reported that people who have heard about the work of his parish have given donations to continue the work. Written reports from the recipients will be submitted for review by the Council for the next meeting.

Kathy Nemkovich reviewed the Salaries and Benefits report for 2023 and the 2023 COLA.

# Important announcement concerning St. Joseph's Cemetery – *Starts this week*!



Dear Parishioners of St. Joseph's Church and nonmembers, the Parish Board is going to begin cleaning up grave plots that have overgrown trees, shrubs or anything surrounding a grave stone that is not in

compliance per the Rules and Regulations of the cemetery. Please see below:

### **PLANTINGS:**

- 1. Planting of trees or shrubs is not permitted as they are detrimental to adjoining plots.
- 2. Flowers and potted plants are permitted in front of the monuments and may not exceed the width of the monument.
- 3. Artificial flowers, evergreens in boxes and Christmas wreaths are permitted in front of the monument and must be removed when unsightly.
- 4. Grave blankets and sprays are not permitted.
- 5. Funeral flowers are removed from grave sites in one week to not damage the sod.
- 6. Crushed stones, wood chips, shells and bricks are not permitted and will be removed.
- 7. Fencing, edging and border of any material are not permitted.
- 8. The Cemetery Committee reserves the right to remove and dispose of all floral pieces after the interment, inurnment, or when they become unsightly.

Effective August 1, 2023, any grave plots that have not been cleaned up and adjusted to align with the rules and regulations will be handled by the Church committee and Cemetery Landscaper. Anyone needing guidance or extra time to attend to this, please contact Fr. Tom to make arrangements. We respect everyone's sacred family plots. This is not meant to be punitive in nature, but there are many plots that have been neglected for years that must be attended to.

Thank you for your attention to this important matter.
