Cost of Being a Disciple of Jesus

In today's Gospel, Jesus speaks to the crowds with striking words: "If anyone comes to me without hating his father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple." At first glance, these words may sound harsh. But Jesus is not commanding hatred in the literal sense. He uses strong Semitic language to make a point: following Him requires absolute priority. Love for Christ must come before all other loves, even the good and holy loves we have for family, possessions, and even our own plans.

Being a disciple of Jesus is beautiful, but also demanding. Jesus is not trying to push His followers, but He wants to be followed with freedom and clarity. Discipleship is not a part-time commitment or a convenient hobby. It's a daily decision to carry the cross, to put the Gospel first, and to live no longer for ourselves, but for Him. Just as a builder doesn't begin construction without calculating the cost, Jesus asks us to consider seriously what it means to follow Him.

In a world that values comfort, success, and self-fulfillment, Jesus offers us something deeper: the path of self-giving love that leads to true life. Today, as we approach the altar, we might ask: What am I clinging to that keeps me from fully following Christ? What attachments, comforts, or fears prevent me from carrying my cross? May the Eucharist strengthen us to surrender more completely, and to follow the Lord — not just with our words, but with our lives.

Perhaps this is why he was away from you for a while, that you might have him back forever, no longer as a slave but more than a slave, a brother, beloved especially to me, but even more so to you, as a man and in the Lord. So if you regard me as a partner, welcome him as you would me.




Yoga to return next week!

Reception of the Holy Eucharist



Baptized Christians who believe in the Real Presence of Christ in the Holy Eucharist and are in a state of grace, free from mortal sin, are invited to partake of this Holy Sacrament. It is the practice of the PNCC to distribute the Holy Eucharist through the method of intinction. The Body of Christ is dipped into the Precious Blood and is placed on the tongue and not in the hand of the communicant. If you are unable to receive the Precious Blood, please alert Father before Mass so that he is aware of the situation. If you would like to receive a blessing from

Father instead of Communion, come to the altar rail with your arms crossed, palms on shoulders. Come and let us be one with our Lord.
