

### You Play an Important Role in Priestly Formation

My Dear Eastern Diocesan Family:

You've all heard of Peter the Apostle, one of the Twelve,

who declared "You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God" (Matthew 16:16). Peter was with Jesus for three years, listening and learning, and imitating his Rabbi; being in every way a disciple of Jesus Christ. He, along with James and John, was with Jesus from the beginning of His ministry. They are given the special grace of witnessing the Transfiguration, the raising to life of Jairus' daughter, and being closest to Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane. Indeed, Peter was so prepared for his ministry that "on the Day of Pentecost, Peter boldly preached to the crowd, and the Holy Spirit worked in the hearts of the listeners, so that 3,000 people put their faith in Jesus that day" (Acts 2:41).

He had learned all that was necessary, and no one else would be needed in his Christian and Apostolic formation, right?!

But then how do you explain the part Cornelius the Centurion played in Peter's learning that the Holy Spirit and therefore the faith in Jesus as Son of God could be a grace for the non-Jewish people? Indeed, Cornelius was the first Gentile who became a baptized member of Christ's Church. Peter came to understand that Jesus' teaching was not only reserved for the Jewish people. He further learned, after the first council of Jerusalem, that Jesus' sacrifice ended the need for a non-Jew to be circumcised.

Indeed, Peter, kept learning, continued to be "in formation" through his Apostolic ministry. We see this in his letters and in the Acts of the Apostles. Most assuredly, those with whom Peter kept company also played a role in his "formation".

On September 27th, I had the opportunity to thank the All Saints Parish family in Sterling Heights, Michigan for forming me into a disciple of my Lord, Jesus Christ. Their influence was always a part of my sacramental ministry in Scranton, PA, in Chicago, IL, in Davie, FL, and in Manchester, NH; in my work as a deacon, priest, administrative senior priest and as a bishop. I will be forever grateful to them.

The apostles were thankful to those whom they served for their help in forming their ministry.

Who are you touching by your faith, love, hope, and your active life of discipleship? Who is choosing to adopt their path of discipleship based on the example you are setting?

You play an important role in priestly formation. In fact, with so many different vocations in the Church today: altar servers, lectors, sacristans, teachers, parish committee and society members, organists, choir members and more, you play an important role in all vocation formation.

# Resolutions of the XXVI General Synod of the Polish National Catholic Church

Whereas, we the delegates to the XXVI General Synod of the Polish National Catholic Church—representatives of the holy People of God—have convened under the leadership of our Prime Bishop and Bishops in Scranton, Pennsylvania, from the 18th through the 21st days of October in the year 2022;

Whereas, we were strengthened, enlightened and sanctified by our Lord Jesus Christ, Himself, truly present in our very midst through Word and Sacrament during the celebration of the Most Holy Eucharist, concelebrated by our Prime Bishop and Bishops at St. Stanislaus Bishop and Martyr Cathedral, first parish of the Polish National Catholic Church, and as Eucharistic people, and proclaim it as the most beautiful and important aspect of the great work of these blessed days;

Whereas, all of the Bishops of the Union of Scranton—the Most Reverend Anthony Mikovsky, the Right Reverend John Mack, the Right Reverend Paul Sobiechowski, the Right Reverend Bernard Nowicki, the Right Reverend Jarosław Rafalko, the Most Reverend Robert Nemkovich, and the Most Reverend Roald Flemestad—were gathered around God's altar to witness the Most Reverend Ottar Myrseth of the Nordic Catholic Church sign the Declaration of Scranton and to welcome him into the Union of Scranton;

Whereas, we offer our gratitude to the Central Diocese of the Church, under the leadership of the Right Reverend Bernard Nowicki, and all those who selflessly assumed and attentively carried out the responsibilities of planning and hosting this Holy Synod;

Whereas, the Polish National Catholic Church joyfully celebrates the 125th Anniversary of its Institution, and we offer our humble and sincere gratitude to God for Bishop Franciszek Hodur and the dedicated and faithful parishioners who, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, sacrificed much in working together to organize our beloved Church;

Whereas, we recognize the foundation that was laid at the XXIV and bolstered at the XXV General Synods of the Polish National Catholic Church regarding our Future Direction and acclaim the efforts made over the last eight years by the Future Direction Subcommittee, wishing to especially recognize the enthusiasm of the Very Reverend Robert Nemkovich, Jr., as he steps down from the chairmanship of the Subcommittee and praying that the Holy Spirit will guide another dedicated disciple in leading these endeavors in the coming years;

Whereas, we received an impassioned and enthusiastic report from the National United Youth Association as delivered by its president Jorge Hernandez Arjona, and now pledge our support to National United Youth endeavors, and are zealously committed to work for growth or establishment of youth groups within our parishes, and for increased attendance at the biennial National Youth Convocations for which the Polish National Union of America has announced its gracious establishment of scholarships to provide financial assistance to youth who wish to attend the Convocations;

Therefore, fervently praying that Almighty God, One in the Blessed Trinity, through the prayers of Our Lady, St. Stanislaus and all the Angels and Saints, will bring forth abundant fruit from the proceedings of this XXVI General Synod, and as we now prepare to return to our parishes and build up Christ's Church by executing its work, we hereby resolve:

To continually draw our strength from the Most Holy Eucharist and the whole Sacramental life of the Church; to seek the true enlightenment that comes to us from the Sacred Scriptures and through the holy teachings of the Church; to selflessly embrace the sacrificial work that Christ has entrusted to our care by fulfilling His Two Great Commandments of Love; to faithfully walk the pathway of Christian discipleship as marked out by the pristine faith of the Undivided Church of the first millennium; and to plainly show the Polish National Catholic Church to be an integral part of the One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic Church founded by Christ and professed within the Creed, by the bold witness of our words, by the shining example of our compassion, mercy and charity, and by our own lives of true and abiding holiness.

#### Resolutions of the XVII Eastern Diocese Synod October 5, 2024

The XVII Synod of the Eastern Diocese convened virtually on October 5, 2024. Hosted by the Holy Trinity Cathedral, the see of the Eastern Diocese on the PNCC, this Diocesan Synod was summoned under the authority of Rt. Rev Paul Sobiechowski, Bishop Ordinary of the Eastern Diocese, and attended virtually by the Most Rev Anthony Mikovsky, Prime Bishop of the PNCC.

The Synod began with prayers from the PNCC Prayer book for the church, Diocese, clergy, and youth, which set the tone and inspirations for the proceedings of this day. "Through the various reports and deliberations, we all learned of the current status of our Diocese.

**Whereas**, we are thankful to Bishop Sobiechowski, our senior priests - Very Rev Joseph Krusienski, Very Rev Joseph Soltysiak and Very Rev Robert Nemkovich Jr. for the planning and execution of a very successful virtual Synod.

**Whereas** we acknowledge the active participation of the delegates, guests, and clergy in fulfilling their discipleship role entrusted to them as members of our Holy Church and through their attendance and commitment in spreading God's word throughout our communities, our diocese and our Church.

**Whereas** we as delegates, have reflected upon the legacy of our faith as set forth upon us by our organizer, Bishop Francis Hodur, the clergy, and organizers of the Church.

**Whereas** we continue to support the endeavors of the Eastern Diocesan Mission and Evangelism Commission with the overall theme of Discipleship towards increasing the growth in our faith in Christ with monthly presentations and with renewed Spirituality among all members; in expanding community outreach programs; and enabling our responses to God's call to Sacred Vocations and service.


**Whereas** we acknowledge the work of the Eastern Diocesan Strategic Planning Committee which has recently merged with the Eastern Diocesan Mission and Evangelism Commission, and has worked for many years to increase the awareness of our church by enabling parishes to use more social media technologies, especially Facebook, in promoting Holy Mass and special services, as well as holding various events and fund-raising activities, and to encourage the expansion of community engagement efforts among our parishes in exemplifying our Christian discipleship to help those in need, those in transition, and those organizations striving to assist others. **Whereas** in 2026, the Polish National Catholic Church will convene in Manchester, N.H. for the XXVII General Synod, as well as hosting the 2026 Youth Convo at the Berea Campus in Hebron, New Hampshire.

We, therefore, seek the grace and strength from our Lord, Jesus Christ to embrace the work He has entrusted to our care; to be inspired to execute the proceedings of this Synod as we return to our parishes and to stay strong in our commitment and firm in our Catholic faith as members of the PNCC in spite of the everchanging and challenging chaos around us. With truth, work, and struggle, we shall and will continue to succeed!

### Blessing of backpacks



### A Season of Renewal at Holy Cross Church in Ware







### Bible Study

With new families and youth in the Church, we are taking the initiative of an upcoming Bible Study for young adults and a Sunday School for youth. We thank the grandchildren of recently departed Ray and Beverly Leyko, who have joined our Parish with their initiatives in community and youth involvement with great spirit, warmth, and dedication to faith. We look forward to spending this time with our youth.

### Music Ministry

The organ plays tunefully the Amen's, Peace Be With You responses, And Also With You, Thanks Be to God, Glory Be to You Lord, and Praise be to you Lord Jesus Christ in G-major. The happy, joyous key helps us understand God's peace. Melodic and soft, full and airy, the organ sits on the preset 1 for the chosen instruments and sound, and is turned 2 notches to the left of N on the Transposer which lowers the scales to help our early morning songs reach the high notes. The rolling of the wooden cover when lifted, the soft yellow lights on the pages, the pedal resistance increasing volume of song, and the foot-keys' deep, rich bass are all comforting and familiar. Likewise, the knowledge of the Preface key shift into the Bflat provides a familiar reverence with B-flat and E-flat notes, and together with the words, the piety and sadness of the key shift and lyrics foretell and capture Jesus' sadness in the garden of Gethsemane. Shortly after, hands lift left and right to play the Sanctus, joyful words of Hosanna sung in a sad key before Communion. Silence follows, with prayer of the Canon, remembering the Last Supper. With more prayer thereafter, we sing like a lullaby, "Our Father." When I was young, the Our Father was played forcefully on the organ with power, as was the Sanctus, on preset 4, with powerful loud instruments that support the fear of the Lord and voices filled with a tone of fortitude. I still love playing the dramatic last reach over 3 octaves for the last chord in Sanctus, but playing it softer, and especially playing Our Father softer, provides reflection over the words sung, and a chance for wisdom.

Reflecting on Wisdom, I've been intending to write how I still have difficulty mastering the chords for our hymn to the Holy Spirit, whose lyrics include, "teach our hearts to know your wisdom." Mysteriously enough, in writing about the music ministry throughout the Mass, six of the seven *gifts of the Holy Spirit* have already found their way into the writing study above; and the remaining gift is *counsel* - advice. In counsel, I advise everyone in their free time to download the Spotify app or open the website Spotify.com on their web browser, and enjoy listening to "Psalm 19: Your Words, Lord, Are Spirit and Life" by Bob Hurd, Craig Kingsbury, and Rick Modlin, found in the album or compilation "Journey songs Third Edition: Volume 1." I also highly recommend Volumes 22 and 28. They are beautiful, inspiring compilations and they're free. Happy listening!

Thank you to Lee, Sue, Karen, and the congregation for their part in my music journey, and to my parents, for without whom I would not be able to read music. I dedicate this piece in memory of Jenny, whose only memory of mine is her holding the church door open for me; let us continue to open welcoming doors for each other into the church with kindness, and practice difficult songs that the Spirit has yet to teach us, we still have more to learn about God's wisdom for us.

The parish must submit a proposal in writing to the Eastern Diocese Grant committee detailing how they will use these funds to promote their parish and /or what type of mission, community outreach and evangelization program(s) they will be undertaking that need funding. The parish should also include an amount of funding they request for their proposal (but please know this amount is solely determined by the Eastern Diocese Grant Committee and the financial standing a parish applying will be strongly considered)

# Jerzy Ficowski

(October 4, 1924, Warsaw - May 9, 2006, Warsaw)

Poeta, pisarz i tłumacz (z hiszpańskiego, niemieckiego, jidysz, rosyjskiego, romskiego, włoskiego, francuskiego i węgierskiego). Podczas okupacji niemieckiej Ficowski był członkiem Armii Krajowej, był więziony w niesławnym Pawiaku i brał udział w Powstaniu Warszawskim. Pod pseudonimem *Wrak* walczył w rejonie Mokotowa. Po Powstaniu Warszawskim Ficowski był więziony w obozie wraz z innymi ocalałymi z powstania.

Po wojnie Ficowski powrócił do Warszawy i wstąpił na uniwersytet w celu studiowania filozofii i socjologii. Tam opublikował swój pierwszy tomik poezji, *Ołowiani Żołnierze* (1948). Tomik ten odzwierciedlał stalinowską atmosferę we wczesno-powojennej Polsce, w której bohaterowie AK z

Powstania Warszawskiego byli w najlepszym razie traktowani z podejrzliwością, w najgorszym zaś aresztowani i straceni.

Jego wczesna twórczość wskazuje na wpływ Juliana Tuwima. Potem zainteresował się wierszami z okresu międzywojennego, z elementami fantastyki i groteski. W późniejszym okresie jego poezja odzwierciedla różne moralne i społeczne aspekty życia w PRL-u.

W latach 1948-1950 Ficowski podróżował z polskimi Cyganami i napisał kilka tomów o nich lub zainspirowanych sposobem życia Romów, w tym Amulety i defilacje (1960) i Cyganie na polskich drogach (1965). Był członkiem Gypsy Lore Society i przetłumaczył wiersze Bronisławy Wajs (Papuszy). Tłumaczył wiersze hiszpańskiego poety Federico García Lorca. Był także znany jako specjalista folkloru żydowskiego i współczesnej poezji hebrajskiej, stając się redaktor naczelnym antologii wierszy żydowskich Rodzynki z migdałami (1964).

W 1967 Ficowski opublikował biografię Brunona Schulza Regiony wielkiej herezji. W 1977 otrzymał nagrodę Polskiego Pen Clubu. Jego zbiór wierszy Odczytanie popiołów z 1979 został nazwany najbardziej poruszającą relacją z Holokaustu napisaną przez nie-Żyda.

W konsekwencji podpisania przez Ficowskiego Listu 59 w 1975, jego twórczość stała się w Polsce zakazana i dopiero pojawienie się Solidarności przyniosło jej powrót na polskie półki. Aktywnie udzielał się w opozycji będąc członkiem Komitetu Obrony Robotników (KOR), a następnie Komitetu Samoobrony Społecznej KOR.


Po upadku komunizmu, liberalizacji Polski i jej zerwaniu z blokiem sowieckim, Ficowski nadal tworzył i tłumaczył twórczość z wielu języków obcych.

Polish poet, writer and translator (from Spanish, German, Yiddish, Russian, Romani, Italian, French and Hungarian). During the German occupation Ficowski was a member of the Home Army (pol. AK), was imprisoned in the infamous Pawiak and took part in the Warsaw Uprising of 1944. His codename was *Wrak* and he fought in Mokotów region. Following the Warsaw Uprising, Ficowski entered a camp with other survivors of the battle.

After the war, Ficowski returned to Warsaw and enrolled at the university in order to study philosophy and sociology. There he published his first volume of poetry, *The Tin Soldiers* (1948). This volume reflected the Stalinist atmosphere of the early postwar Poland, in which

heroes of the Home Army from the Warsaw Uprising were treated with suspicion at best, arrested and executed at worst.

His early works show the influence of Julian Tuwim. Later he became interested in the poems of the interwar period, with elements of fantasy and grotesque. In the later period his poems reflected various moral and social aspects of life in the People's Republic of Poland.

From 1948 to 1950 Ficowski traveled with Polish Gypsies and came to write several volumes on or inspired by the Roma way of life, including *Amulets and Defiles* (1960) and *Gypsies on the Polish Roads* (1965). He was the member of the Gypsy Lore Society and translated the poems of Bronisława Wajs (Papusza). He translated the poems of the Spanish poet, Federico García Lorca. Also he was a known specialist of Jewish folklore and Modern Hebrew poetry, becoming an editor of the Jewish poem anthology *Raisins with Almonds* (1964).

In 1967 Ficowski published biography of Bruno Schulz, entitled *Regions* of the Great Heresy. He received the award of the Polish Pen Club in 1977. His 1979 collection of poems, *A Reading of Ashes*, has been called the most moving account of the Holocaust written by a non-Jew. As a consequence of his signing, in 1975, of the *Letter of 59*, Ficowski's writings had become banned in Poland, and only the emergence of Solidarity has brought his works back to bookshelves. He was active in the opposition as a member of the Workers' Defense Committee and subsequently of the Committee for Social Self-defense KOR.

Following the fall of communism, liberalization of Poland and its breaking with the Soviet bloc, Ficowski continued to write and translate works from many foreign languages.


