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Dear Friends:

On behalf of our parish family, please accept our deepest sympathy on the loss of your loved one. We understand that this is a most difficult time with many needs that must be addressed in a short period of time. Our hope is that the funeral liturgy will be helpful and a source of grace and comfort for you.

This booklet is intended to help you choose readings from Scripture and music that will make the funeral meaningful for you and all who attend. To assist with that planning, a representative from our parish will contact you prior to the wake and funeral Mass to set up a time to meet with you and any family members or friends to help you with your choices.

There are many ways to involve others at the Mass. You may choose individuals to lead the Scripture readings and the Prayer of the Faithful. Others may bring up the sacramental gifts or serve as pallbearers. We can help you with those choices as well.

We have found that often the most difficult time for those who have lost a loved one are those weeks and months following a death. We want to assure you of our continued prayers and our desire, as your parish family, to continue to be of assistance in the days that lie ahead. Whatever we can do to ease your burden and help with your loss is both an honor and a privilege.

Approximately one month after the funeral, the repose of the soul of the deceased and the comfort and healing of the family will be a specific intention at Mass. We will invite you and your family to that Mass.

Wishing you God's peace and grace throughout this difficult time.

1. Funeral Liturgy Overview

The funeral rites of the Church are celebrated to offer worship, praise and thanksgiving to God for the gift of a life which has now been returned to Him. Through these rites the Church intercedes on behalf of the deceased, and also ministers to those who are sorrowing with the strength and comfort of God's word and the sacrament of the Eucharist. The Funeral Mass is a prayer for God's mercy for the deceased and a solace for the living, including the entire faith community.

The Order of Christian Funerals is divided into three rites.

- 1. Vigil (Wake) and related Rites and prayers: The Vigil for the deceased is the principal rite celebrated by the Christian community in the time following death and before the funeral liturgy. Words of Remembrance may be spoken at this time without any limitations to the number of speakers.
- **2. Funeral Liturgy:** This is the central liturgical celebration for the deceased and should be scheduled for a time that permits as many of the Christian community as possible to be present. Please see further description below.
- **3. Rite of Committal (Cemetery or Other Arrangements):** The Rite of Committal at the conclusion of the funeral rites is the final act of the community of faith in caring for the body or ashes of the deceased. When possible, it should be celebrated at the site of committal, which is beside the open grave or place of interment.

<u>Cremated Remains</u> - For funerals that will include cremated remains, please note the following guidelines.

Since 1997, cremated remains have been allowed to be present at funeral Masses and are given the same respect as remains in a casket.

The Church strongly prefers cremation to take place after the full funeral liturgy with the body. The presence of the body most clearly brings to mind the life and death of the person and better expresses the values that the Church affirms in its rites. These rites are sacred acts that help bereaved families on their journey over several days through mourning, prayer, consolation and separation from their deceased loved one, in the company of friends and neighbors. The body forcefully brings to mind our belief that our

human bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit and destined for future glory at the resurrection of the dead.

The Church also teaches that the cremated remains be interred just as a body, in a cemetery, crypt or other appropriate burial place. The Church allows burial at sea providing that the cremated remains of the body are buried in a heavy container and not scattered. Scattering ashes or keeping them at home is not part of the Catholic tradition. In some cases, family members and friends that have opted to scatter the ashes have later regretted that choice because there is no place where they can go to honor the deceased. In the case when ashes are retained by the family, future generations often feel burdened having to dispose of the ashes of unremembered kin.

Brief descriptions of the important parts of the funeral Mass are below.

- **Holy Communion:** Communion will be offered under one species in the appearance of bread, at the funeral liturgy.
- Music Selections: St. Edward and St. Jude Parishes have separate Music Ministries. Each church provides a list of hymns and psalms appropriate for a funeral liturgy (<u>see Funeral Music Selections</u>). If other music is preferred, please contact the Bereavement Facilitator for discussion and possible approval.
- **Pallbearers:** Up to six family members or friends of the deceased may be selected as pallbearers. This should be coordinated with the funeral director.
- **Placing of the Pall:** A funeral pall, reminding us of the garment given at baptism and symbolizing our life in Christ, is draped over the coffin at the beginning of the liturgy by funeral home staff or family members.
- Prayer of the Faithful: The prayers are intercessions to express the
 congregation's prayerful concerns for the deceased and the family. The
 family is asked to complete the template provided herein (see Prayer of
 the Faithful) and may draft their own prayer. Each prayer concludes
 with "We pray to the Lord" to which the congregation will respond "Lord,
 hear our prayer".
- **Presentation of Gifts:** Family members or friends may bring the gifts of bread and wine to the altar. Two or three individuals may be selected.
- **Readings:** There are four selections from Scripture:
 - The first reading is chosen from the Old Testament (<u>see Reading</u>
 I) and may be read by a representative of the family.
 - The Responsorial Psalm, selected by the family, is sung by the Cantor (<u>see Responsorial Psalm</u>).
 - The second reading is chosen from the New Testament (<u>see</u> <u>Reading II</u>).
 - The Gospel reading is chosen by the priest.
- Readers: You may invite family members or friends to do a reading from the Old Testament and a second reading from the New Testament (see <u>Index of the Readings</u> for all options). Copies of the chosen readings will be provided for the readers ahead of the liturgy to practice as needed. The readings will be on the lectern for the convenience of each reader.

- **Symbols of the Christian life:** One symbol of the Christian life, provided by the family, may be carried in the procession, and placed on or near the coffin at the conclusion of the entrance procession.
- Words of Remembrance (OPTIONAL): One family member or friend may offer prepared Words of Remembrance conveying the consolation of God's love, grace, and mercy on the deceased. The words should not exceed 5 minutes. Please read the specific instructions and guidelines (see Words of Remembrance). The script should be emailed to the Bereavement Facilitator by 5 PM the day prior to the funeral.

2. Reading I from the Old Testament

The family may select one Scripture reading from the list of the New Testament readings below.

This section provides the list of reading options and a summary; for the full text, please use the Appendix.

- Pentecost through Lent Old Testament
 - o 1 through 13 are all option but note that 1 and 13 are normally used when a woman predeceases her husband otherwise then infrequently.

6. Prayer of the Faithful

The family **may** compose a prayer of the faithful. Each prayer should conclude with "We pray to the Lord" and the response from the congregation is "Lord, hear our prayer."

Below is a sample that may be used or modified accordingly.

Opening Prayer said by the Priest.

For (deceased name) who in baptism was given the pledge of eternal life, that he (she) may now be admitted to the company of the saints.

We pray to the Lord. LORD, HEAR OUR PRAYER.

For our brother (sister) who ate the body of Christ, the bread of life, that he (she) may be raised up on the last day.

We pray to the Lord. LORD, HEAR OUR PRAYER.

For all those people who ministered to (deceased name) during (his/her) illness, that they may be blessed in abundance with God's love for them. **We pray to the Lord. LORD, HEAR OUR PRAYER.**

For the deceased members of the ______ family, grant them an everlasting home with your Son. (You may wish to name some immediate family members, but a large list would not be appropriate.)

We pray to the Lord. LORD, HEAR OUR PRAYER.

For the family and friends of our brother (sister) (deceased name), that they may be consoled in their grief by the Lord, who wept at the death of his friend Lazarus.

We pray to the Lord. LORD, HEAR OUR PRAYER.

For all of us assembled here to worship in faith, that we may be gathered together again in God's kingdom.

We pray to the Lord. LORD, HEAR OUR PRAYER.

Closing Prayer said by the Priest.

7. Words of Remembrance (Optional)

A Guide for the Speaker at a Funeral Liturgy

Offering Words of Remembrance at the Funeral Liturgy is **optional.** It is not intended to be a eulogy or historical review of the deceased's life, but rather to convey the consolation of God's love, grace and mercy in their Christian life.

At the funeral liturgy at the Church, the focus shifts to what Jesus has done for us and how our faith offers us hope. It marks the end of an earthly journey that began in the context of faith at baptism and continues with a new life in God. It is within this context that you are asked to prepare your remembrance and to remember the ways the deceased was faithful to his (her) Baptism call by loving God and loving his (her) neighbor.

- Decide with family members if Words of Remembrance will be given (this
 part of the mass is optional). Remember there are many opportunities for
 individuals to share remembrances before or after the mass, perhaps at the
 wake or cemetery.
- Only **one** person may speak on behalf of the family. Please keep your remembrance simple, brief and prepared, **no longer than 5 minutes**. That is about one page of printed text.
- Additional speakers may not speak at the funeral liturgy, however they are encouraged to share remembrances at the wake, cemetery and/or collation (reception) following the service.
- **Begin by praying** that you will honor the person you are speaking about and that your words will be witness to his or her faith and a blessing to family and friends. Avoid inside jokes or humor that may be misunderstood.
- The text of the Words of Remembrance **must** be sent to the bereavement facilitator one day in advance of the funeral mass. This allows the priest to review the text and help prepare for the homily.

Thank you for following the guidelines stated above, as they are intended to respectfully remember your loved one. Please contact the funeral planning facilitator if you have any questions regarding the Words of Remembrance.

Proverbs 31: 10-13, 19-20, 30-31

A reading from the Book of Proverbs

When one finds a worthy wife, her value is far beyond pearls. Her husband, entrusting his heart to her, has an unfailing prize. She brings him good, and not evil, all the days of her life. She obtains wool and flax and makes cloth with skillful hands.

She puts her hands to the distaff, and her fingers ply the spindle. She reaches out her hands to the poor and extends her arms to the needy.

Charm is deceptive and beauty fleeting; the woman who fears the Lord is to be praised.

Give her a reward of her labors, and let her works praise her at the city gates.

A reading from Maccabees
