



Administrator's Perspective

10 DAYS TO GO

Although most of us are joyful about building a new parish and the many opportunities it presents, we cannot ignore **the elephant in the room**.

The letter to all four of our parishes from Bishop Zubik back on May 27 stated the startling reality that as of July 1, 2020, **these parishes will canonically cease to exist**. After serving West View, Observatory Hill, Ross Township and Perrysville for a combined total of 361 years, Saint Athanasius, Incarnation of the Lord, Saint Sebastian, and Saint Teresa of Avila Parishes will become memories.

There is a great sense of **sadness and loss** as we move on, like saying goodbye to a longtime friend. There is a grieving process that takes time to run its course, and it can involve various emotions, like denial, anger, dread, depression, fear, and even aggression. If we do not acknowledge these feelings and face them honestly and work to resolve them, **they can do considerable damage** in the long run, to ourselves and to others.

Grieving can be described as the pain of letting go. It's also the inability to deal with change, the loss of something that is familiar and comfortable, whether it's a person, a home, or even a parish. **People grieve in different ways**, but everyone does it at various times in their lives. Many of us are doing it now, including me.

It is OK to grieve, as long as it's a stepping stone and not a final resting place. Sooner or later we need to move on and commit ourselves to a new way of managing our life.

IN OTHER NEWS: In another week or so, we will be **gradually reopening our parish offices**—all four of them—for business. We are calling our faithful employees back to sort through the backlog of mail, messages, emails, etc., but this will be a **slow and cautious process** that will comply with guidelines issued by the CDC. Hours that the offices will be available to the public will be posted and limited, so we are grateful for your continued patience and cooperation....stay tuned for more news....

Honor Your Mother and Father: There is much more to the fourth commandment than children being obedient to their parents (*although that is very important*). General respect for authority is derived from this commandment also. It is necessary for the structure of any society. Citizens have the duty to work with civil authorities to build up and maintain an orderly society. Government officials have the duty to serve the people, respecting the fundamental rights of all and using their authority with justice (Catechism 2234-2246). We need to constantly be aware of the common good of all, not just our own personal good. When those in authority *or* common citizens loose sight of this, society suffers.



The Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time June 21, 2020

It is time for the test! You do not need a #2 pencil. This is not a Covid-19 test, or theology test or even a personality test as found in some magazines. You need to relax and prepare to do some thinking.

The question Jesus indirectly asks his disciples is the same question facing us 2000 years later. It is, "What kind of church do you want to become?"


In the first century, Jesus and his small band of followers began in Galilee. This great adventure was just getting under way. The disciples really had no idea what this young rabbi was up to, but something drew them to him. This was the beginning of their formation into disciples. Jesus took every person where they appeared in life. There were no pre-requisites, no applications, and no nasal swabs. This project begins in Galilee and then heads toward Jerusalem for the final scene.

So, what kind of church do you want to become? Some theologians today ask, "do you want a transactional church? or a transformational church?" Transactional church, in this case means, fulfilling the details specified in a contract. Think of clipboards with lists detailing obligations following the commandments or church precepts. Religion, then, becomes a list of things to do instead of leading people to a new way of life. I think most believers start out this way. It's easy. We teach children to do this and to avoid that because God is watching. Then, at some point in our lives we may encounter a transformation. Something changes within us. We discover the indwelling of God's Spirit and see the world and its people through a different lens. Here, God's Word is taken seriously. The sacraments are not seen as things that need to be done, but as whole opportunities to participate in God's life. Caring for those in need and those who live in the margins of society becomes a priority.

In recent events we have seen people choose to walk with the poor and oppressed, to be taught by them, and to love them as equals. Too often we would hear commentators ask the question, "it's been two weeks, why are they still walking?" Perhaps the response is, they are prompted by the indwelling of God's Spirit to seek unity, God's justice and peace. So, here we are on the cusp of forming a new parish. If we allow the spirit of the Risen Jesus to rise up with us we could live as disciples of Jesus and face the world in a fearless manner, knowing that we are worth a great deal in the sight of our loving God. So let us live as disciples (in formation) of Jesus, facing the world in a fearless manner, knowing that we are worth a great deal in the sight of our loving God.

Take Courage with Jesus.

Breaking Open the Word: Matthew
10:26-33



Do not fear those who can kill the body. Today's passage from Matthew's Gospel is part of the missionary discourse that follows the sending out of the Twelve. Jesus reminds the disciples of the great and powerful care of the Father. Using the typical argument of the lesser to the greater, Jesus stresses that not even a sparrow dies without God's consent.

Listen to the Word: Is there a word or phrase in today's Gospel which captured your attention? What one image from this reading touches your heart?

Look into Your Life:

Children: Jesus tells us not to be afraid. Name a time when you were afraid. Did you ask Jesus to help you? Why or why not?

Youth: Jesus tells us that he will remember us to his Father if we proclaim him to others. How easy is it for you to talk about your faith with your friends? How about your family or people you don't know very well?

Adults: What is your responsibility to Jesus? How and when will you carry out that responsibility?

Give It a Try: Today's readings remind us that God watches over and protects us. **Together with your family listen** to the song "Be Not Afraid," by Bob Dufford. (It can be downloaded from i-tunes.) Discuss: How does faith in Christ help you when you are afraid?

Say a family prayer with petitions for people who live in frightening surroundings. Include your own intentions. Respond, "Lord, in your great love, hear our prayer."

Sit down with your family and watch a favorite suspenseful movie. After the film, discuss ways that courage was shown or not shown in the movie. Discuss: Why are you afraid sometimes? How can you help someone who is afraid?

Jeremiah 20:10-13 Confidence in God

Today's First Reading alludes to the betrayal and plotting of those close to Jeremiah, and give voice as well to the prophet's unshakeable conviction that God will ultimately vindicate him. His confidence in God's deliverance has been held up by Christian authors as an image of Jesus' own trust in God and as an example to be followed by Jesus' disciples.

Romans 5:12-15 The Gift

In today's Second Reading, Paul begins to compare the first man, Adam, with Jesus. Through Adam sin and death entered the world, while through Jesus came obedience and life. Through Jesus the gift ("the grace of God") was given, a gift more powerful than the death brought through Adam.

Matthew 10:26-33 Do Not Be Afraid

Today's Gospel contains a three-fold admonition not to be afraid. Jesus uses the homey images of sparrow being watched over and the hairs on one's head being counted by the Father to point out that God's care and Providence will sustain his followers. Ill
