## ADDITIONAL SEATING

It is becoming increasingly clear that **more people are returning to physical attendance at Mass**, and this is a wonderful thing to see. Unfortunately, however, we are having trouble fulfilling the need for **enough seats** to provide for everyone during our time of restricted seating. When we reach capacity at any of our churches, we are forced to ask those we cannot accommodate to return to their car and **tune in to Mass on their radio**, then enter the church to receive Holy Communion. We don't like having to do this, but there it is.

We are aware that there are **some parishes**—even nearby—who do not enforce social distancing or the wearing of masks, **in violation of various guidelines**, including those of the Diocese of Pittsburgh. This has no bearing on our decisions in *this* parish to keep everyone as safe as possible, and you, the members of Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish, can be proud that you are cooperating with those directives that are there for the benefit of everyone.

With all of this in mind, we are making every effort to **maximize whatever space we have available** in our four churches. We have spent many hours measuring and discussing all the alternatives, and we continue to remind everyone to register for Mass.

As a result of our deliberations, you will notice that we have **slightly increased our seating capacity** by adding chairs where it is possible to remain distanced. This will add 10 seats to Saint Athanasius, 20 seats to Incarnation of the Lord, 15 seats to Saint Sebastian, and 15 seats to Saint Teresa, a total of 60 additional seats. These numbers are approximate and may vary depending on family members that are sitting together. This is **still not enough**, we know, but it's a start. We will continue to add more seating as restrictions are lifted.

This new seating is gradually going into effect over several weeks.

**IN OTHER NEWS:** Dorothy Doctorick, a parishioner of the former Saint Sebastian Parish who died in 2016, left a most **generous bequest** that will benefit many people in different ways. First, there are two quite beautiful **Thomas Kinkadee paintings** that now hang proudly in our Parish Center. In addition, Dorothy, who was a dedicated member of the **Ladies of Charity**, left them a sizeable donation to help carry on their work, and then twice that amount to our parish. We are grateful that Dorothy has shared our Lord's goodness to her with the rest of us....Stay tuned for more news....

### First Reading: *Jeremiah 31:31-34*


Jeremiah tells the people that the Lord will make a new covenant with them, planting the law within their hearts.

## Catholic Social Teaching

The diocesan website has a Lenten Guide ([diopitt.org](http://diopitt.org)) with special links for examination of conscience as we prepare for confession. There is an examination of conscience in light of Catholic Social Teaching from the USCCB. Questions relating to the last two of the seven themes of Catholic Social Teaching are:

**Solidarity:** Does the way I spend my time reflect a genuine concern for others? • Is solidarity incorporated into my prayer and spirituality? Do I lift up vulnerable people throughout the world in my prayer, or is it reserved for only my personal concerns? • Am I attentive only to my local neighbors or also those across the globe? • Do I see all members of the human family as my brothers and sisters?

**Care for God's Creation:** Do I live out my responsibility to care for God's creation? • Do I see my care for creation as connected to my concern for poor persons, who are most at risk from environmental problems? • Do I litter? Live wastefully? Use energy too freely? Are there ways I could reduce consumption in my life? • Are there ways I could change my daily practices and those of my family, school, workplace, or community to better conserve the earth's resources for future generations?

**Food Pantry Needs:** Juice, Campbell's tomato soup, oatmeal (not packets) egg noodles, carrots, beets, baked beans, peanut butter, jelly, applesauce, teabags, jar and canned pasta sauce, hamburger helper, boxed potatoes, Uncle Ben's rice, Rice A Roni, canned chicken, pears and peaches. We have set two food collection bins outside of Haber Hall at the St. Sebastian site. You can also drop off donations in the narthex at St. Athanasius Church when it is open, or leave in the bin outside of Athanasian Hall. *Also, we have recently put collection boxes at St. Teresa of Avila Church in the narthex and lower level. Thank you!*



## Fifth Sunday of Lent

Jeremiah sets the tone for today's readings when he writes that the Lord promises a new covenant. The old covenant was external: the Chosen People were led by the hand. But the new covenant is internal, written upon our hearts. As Christians, we believe that the new covenant is fulfilled in God's Son, who came into our hearts at baptism, who animates our lives, and who can be found in those we meet.

## Did You Know?

Two weeks ago, I wrote about the lighting of the stained glass at Incarnation of the Lord Church. Here's a little more Lenten-themed parish information that you may not know about:

At St. Teresa of Avila Church, the side windows aren't just beautiful images of events in the life of Christ, but are actually the Stations of the Cross. Look closely at Veronica. We see Jesus' image on her veil. This was created by a freehand-drawn technique by the artist Nicholas Parrendo. It is very rare in church stained glasswork.



At St. Sebastian Church, it is a Lenten tradition to illuminate the Stations of the Cross. You will not find them lit at any other time of the year. The light shows the sometimes overlooked detail of each Station, such as the wood carving and the use of stain to achieve the colors depicted in each scene. The added lighting creates even more depth in shadows and shows the haunting beauty hidden within each Station.

At St. Athanasius Church, the magnificence of the stained glass windows can take your breath away, but if you look carefully between the windows at the Stations of the Cross, you will see something unusual. The Stations aren't just on the walls, but *in* them. The church was built with small niches that allowed the Stations to be placed directly into the walls—a lost technique you won't see in newer construction. It is a stunning collection of art to meditate upon. **What other treasures do you see in our four churches?**


## Death to New Life

**Breaking Open the Word: John 22:20-23**

If it dies, it produces much grain.

The evangelist of today's Gospel writes for a

Greek audience. Jesus' response to some Greeks asking to see Jesus becomes a prediction of his death and glorification. In the image of the grain of wheat that dies to produce life, we see God's glorification in the death of Jesus. Jesus will be exalted, drawing all persons to himself and thus to eternal life.



**Listen to the Word:** Listen closely to this gospel reading. What words or phrases strike you? Is there one word or phrase that captures your attention? What touches your heart? What image of faith does this reading give you?

### Look into Your Life:

**Children:** Name one thing you can do or stop doing that will help you have a better friendship with Jesus.

**Youth:** Sometimes one thing needs to die in order for something new to be born. When have you experienced this in your own life? What do you need to let go of now for something new to grow?

**Adults:** Name one area in your life that you need to let go of - to die to, in order to rise with new life.

**Incarnate the Word:** As you reflect on the Scripture reading choose one of the following activities: Decorate small flowerpots with signs of new life then plant seeds in them. Carefully, water the seeds. Watch the seeds grow with your family. Relate this mystery to the mystery of Jesus' death and resurrection. Select one station of the cross to pray each day. During family prayer, talk about what happened at that station and relate it to the difficulties family members face today.
