

MATT HAWKINS FOR ST. ELIZABETH ANN SETON PARISH (Part I)

The Appreciative Inquiry Interview Process

From May through August, 2015, I conducted a series of 30 1-hour conversations with individual parishioners to collect their impressions and experiences as members of SEAS. The conversations were part of a process known as "appreciative inquiry," where the emphasis is on encouraging parishioners to focus on what is *right* about a parish's pastoral care and ministries. The discussions created an opportunity for SEAS parishioners to tell their stories and explain what they appreciate about their parish. This is known as a "strengths-based" approach to pastoral planning. What follows is a merger of responses from SEAS parishioners during those 1-hour conversations, placing their responses in categories in order to flesh out larger themes.



The Parish On a Journey toward Re-Discovery

Older members of SEAS parish consider themselves to be "survivors": They survived the tension surrounding the merger of the six original parishes, in 1992, and they have survived the damage done to church buildings during the flood of 2004. They remember when the parish they belonged to was bound together by a sense of community that shared a common ethnic culture. Although the new parish, SEAS, is not defined by a single ethnic culture parishioners are finding ways to re-discover community life through their participation in the parish.

'It was a painful transition, but you could see it coming. People were dying or leaving the parish and younger families were not moving in at the same rate. The population was dwindling."

"Before the merger there was a lot of anxiety. There was a lot of suspense about which church buildings would be closed and which ones would remain open. Nobody knew what was going to happen but everyone had something to say about it. There were no answers. The more we talked the angrier we got. I think that's why a lot of people left the church."

"We went through about ten years of what felt like a revolving door of pastors. People were getting disgusted with the whole thing. I think that's why they left."

"We used to be bound together, as a community, by a shared ethnic identity. We had customs that we shared, and this included spiritual devotions. After the merger we had to figure out what makes a community if it is not a shared ethnicity."

"I loved growing up in St. Ignatius [before the merger]. The parish helped to preserve Polish traditions. I loved the singing and the Masses, which were said in Polish. I feel that a part of those memories have been preserved in the new SEAS church. The statues behind the altar and the crucifix are all from St. Ignatius."

"The people in our parish are older. Sometimes it feels as though we are not growing, but at the core of our parish is a strong group of very spiritual people. They're the ones who are holding it together."

"Part of the healing process came from retreats that were promoted through the Church. This gave us the opportunity to deepen our experience of life within the Church. We also benefited from a three-year [Lenten] program for parish renewal called Living the Eucharist".

"When we participated in Living the Eucharist' I became aware of how much people in our parish want to deepen their spiritual life."


