

As you know from multiple announcements and homilies, Bishop Zubik last year launched a major initiative *On Mission for The Church Alive!* The initiative is meant to reconfigure all our resources—churches, property, priests, volunteers, worshipers, and donations—toward the mission of Christ and his Church.


There are dramatic proposals on the table. We've got a lot of discernment and deliberation ahead of us, until the final decisions are made in 2018. Here at St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Parish, our initial consultations will take place:

- Wednesday, November 9, from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m.
- Tuesday, November 15, from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m.

Everyone from SEAS Parish is encouraged to attend one or both consultations.

- All Saints' Day, November 1, is a holy day of obligation this year. The special Mass schedule is posted elsewhere in this bulletin.
- All Souls' Day, November 2, is the day in the Roman liturgical calendar most solemnly dedicated to prayer for the dead. After the 8:00 morning Mass, we'll drive to St. Ignatius Cemetery to pray especially for the dead buried in our parish cemeteries.
- We'll also host a special Mass at 6:30 the same evening, praying for all the dead but especially for those of our community who have died in the past year. All are welcome to this extraordinary service.
- Daylight Savings Time ends Sunday, November 6. Be sure to set your clocks back one hour the night before, or you'll be an hour early for Mass!
- The Carnegie Historical Society announces recipients of various awards—including Marlene Pendleton for community service, Vince Bellini and Vincent Dlugos for the social and religious outreach, and Cristy Crawshaw as "youth of the year." Congretulations to Marlene Vince Vince

EVANGELIZATION AND ALL SOULS' DAY

According to Bishop David Zubik, the very first place of Christian evangelization was a cemetery... for the angel said to Mary Magdalene at the tomb: "He is not here. He has been raised from the dead." That, Bishop Zubik says, is "the first proclamation of the good news that Christ is victorious over sin and death."

So how can we continue that proclamation of the Good News, that evangelization, in the face of our fellow parishioners' losses? "The mission of the Church to evangelize is very evident in the ministry of consolation. This ministry is a vehicle for sharing grace and communicating hope to those who feel broken or abandoned..." says Fr. Terence P. Curley, a faculty member of St. John Seminary in Brighton, MA.

So, whether you go to the cemetery on All Souls' Day, November 2, after the 8:00 a.m. Mass to pray for the dead, attend our 6:30 p.m. annual Mass for the dead, or join us at the reception after that Mass to console the loved ones of those whom we buried in the past year, you are taking part in Evangelization! All are invited. Come together with members of our faith community, and share grace, and communicate hope, and minister to each other!

General Election 2016: Pennsylvania's U.S. Senate Candidates

In our commitment to follow Jesus Christ we must do more than just show up for Mass on Sunday morning, we must bear Christian witness in all we do – in our homes, in our work and recreation, in our interaction with the world around us, and in the public square.

Any politics of human dignity must seriously address issues of racism, poverty, hunger, employment, education, housing, and health care. Therefore, Catholics should eagerly involve themselves as advocates for the weak and marginalized in all these areas. But being 'right' in such matters can never excuse a wrong choice regarding direct attacks on innocent human life. Indeed, the failure to protect and defend life in its most vulnerable stages renders suspect any claims to the 'rightness' of positions in other matters affecting the poorest and least powerful of the human community. If we understand the human person as the 'temple of the Holy Spirit' -- the living house of God -- then these latter issues fall logically into place as the crossbeams and walls of that house. All direct attacks on innocent human life, such as abortion and euthanasia, strike at the house's foundation. These directly and immediately violate the human person's most fundamental right – the right to life.

The Pennsylvania Catholic Conference (PCC) neither supports nor opposes any candidate for public office. In an effort to educate voters, the PCC gave the statewide candidates the opportunity to make their positions known on key specific issues important to Catholics. Incumbent Senator Pat Toomey (Republican) completed a written questionnaire (complete responses available at www.pacatholic.org). Candidate Katie McGinty (Democrat) did not respond to the candidate questionnaire. Information about her views was therefore compiled from her campaign website and public statements.

On Life & Dignity of the Human Person

McGinty is endorsed by EMILY'S List, a political action committee with a mission to "elect pro-choice Democratic women to office." They describe McGinty as "pro-choice, and supports Roe v. Wade." (www.emilyslist.org)

Toomey opposes legalized abortion, except when the life of the mother is in danger or the pregnancy is a result of rape or incest. (PCC Survey) He is endorsed by the PA Pro-Life Federation. (www.paprolife.org)

Immigration

McGinty denounced federal legislation that would deny Community Development Block Grant funds to cities that in effect shelter or give sanctuary to illegal immigrants. At the same time, she wrote a letter to Philadelphia Mayor Jim Kenney requesting him to reconsider the city's immigration policy and open the dialogue with federal officials "so that those who pose a threat don't fall though any crack in local and federal jurisdiction." (katiemcginty.com)

Toomey describes our immigration system as "fundamentally broken." He has "supported efforts to strengthen border security, ensure that our immigration laws are enforced, and stop the outrageous practice of sanctuary cities that undermine our laws." (PCC Survey)

Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity, & Religious Liberty

McGinty has not commented specifically about religious exemptions in non-discrimination legislation. However, she says she will fight to expand antidiscrimination protections, "No one should be denied access to housing, healthcare, or employment of gender because their identity orientation." (katiemcginty.com)

Toomey supported the Employment Non-Discrimination Act that would prohibit discrimination based sexual orientation. However, he "introduced and forced a vote on an amendment to strengthen and broaden the bill's underlying protections for faith-based organizations." (PCC Survey)

Access to Health Care for the Poor

In a press release, McGinty said that she was "proud to work with Governor Wolf to expand Medicaid that provides health care to more than 600,000 Pennsylvanians" during her time as his chief-ofstaff. (katiemcginty.com)

Toomey believes that Medicaid is a valuable program but that its "flawed financing structure encourages states to further expand their Medicaid programs while shifting growing costs to the federal government." He supports giving states more flexibility to encourage efficiency. He does not support further federal mandates. (PCC Survey)




