

lesus was born. Although we know virtually nothing about them, we do know they brough three gifts:

- Gold, a symbol of wealth and power, identifies the recipient as a king.
- Frankincense, the crystalized resinous sap of a tree used as incense and as an offering, is symbolic of prayer.
- Myrrh, another resinous tree sap, was used in healing liniments and as an embalming ointment. Myrrh is an odd gift for a child—so, even at the beginning of Jesus' life on earth, this gift foreshadows his death.

FROM THE PASTOR

HAPPY EPIPHANY!

Today's feast continues the Christmas theme—how God has made himself known to us. We get to know God by encountering Jesus, and we have seen him in his birth, in his family life, and now in his manifestation to the astrologers.

The coming of the astrologers to see Jesus involves some irony: You don't have to know God well in order to see Jesus. The astrologers were likely Persians with little knowledge of the God of Israel. They weren't especially good or godly men, but they were clever enough to figure out that Jesus was somebody important. They adjusted their lives in order to make the long trip to Bethlehem, and they are rewarded by finding in Jesus the meaning and purpose of their lives.

One way in which Jesus continues to make himself available to us is in the sacraments. A whopping 1,749 people attended Mass on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day, more than the past five years. Here's how the other sacraments from 2017 stand:



NOT WILLING TO LET GO OF YOUR MARRIAGE?


Many couples continue to struggle in a marriage, but are not willing to give up on each other. There is hope.


