

PRAYER & WORSHIP

FROM THE PASTOR

Notification arrived from Bishop Zubik that the bishops of Pennsylvania jointly agreed that the "obligation" to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy days would be revived on the weekend of August 14/15. As is clear from their statement, it is always the understanding that those prohibited legitimately from attending because of uncontrollable or unexpected conflicts or health issues of their own (or of those for whom they may be sole caregivers), are exempt from the obligation. In those cases, the "live stream "of Mass can still be of assistance in keeping Sunday holy. The deliberate, freely chosen omission of Mass is considered a mortal sin that would require the reception of the sacrament of reconciliation before the next reception of the Holy Eucharist.

The "obligation" of Mass attendance is a "Precept of the Church". It is the manner through which we as Catholics observe especially the Third Commandment to "Keep holy the Lord's Day". To deliberately omit mass on a Sunday or the few Holy days that occur on a weekday is an indication that "there are strange gods before you" who take priority on what is to be God's Day-the Sunday of Resurrection.

One's spiritual health indicates one's attitude toward Mass attendance. If you are praying regularly and are attentive to the constant presence of God in your life and your inability to give back to God for all with which he has blest you, to return to him Sunday or Holy Day worship fits naturally into your relationship. In fact, your prayer life would lead you to a desire to communicate with the Lord through the Scriptures and the Eucharist on a regular basis. Although you can pray at home (and are surely encouraged to make a habit of that) the Altar of the Lord cannot be abandoned for personal activities that on the surface may APPEAR "more exciting" or "more enjoyable". The Mass, which is the sacramental "re-presentation" of the Lord's Passion, Death and Resurrection is not for entertainment or designed to "keep your attention". It is a sacramental and scriptural reminder, in a holy place, that God's love for you extended to the sacrifice of his Son for you, to save you and to make his presence known in your life with the goal of welcoming you into the eternal heavenly worship when life in this world ends

If you understand why you NEED to attend Mass regularly, it will not be an "obligation" you will have raised it beyond mere requirement to "opportunity".

We welcome Cardinal Donald Wuerl as special celebrant for Mass at St. Margaret of Scotland church on Sunday, August 1, at 10:00 a.m.

Because of the proximity of the liturgical celebration of the grandparents of the Lord, Joachim and Anne on July 26, Pope Francis has designated Sunday, July 25, as the first world-wide celebration of Grandparents and the Elderly.

SUNDAY OBLIGATION REINSTATED A STATEMENT FROM THE BISHOPS IN PENNSYLVANIA

We have all known and felt the impact of COVID-19 in so many ways as individuals and families, among friends and at work. It has been a time of hardship and struggle, of separation and isolation. It has also had an impact on our lives of faith. Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior, has been with us throughout this very difficult period and is most especially near to us when we encounter him in the Eucharist. The Eucharist offers us his healing and peace, his mercy and reconciliation. It is time for everyone to return to the Eucharist with renewed faith and joy.

As life returns to normalcy in so many ways, each Catholic Bishop in Pennsylvania will reinstate the obligation to attend Mass in person on Sundays and Holy Days beginning on Sunday, August 15, 2021, the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The Bishops had dispensed you from this obligation in March of 2020 as the developing coronavirus pandemic required people not to assemble in group settings. Now, with the impact of the pandemic considerably reduced, it is again possible for the faithful to assemble for the Eucharist and it is time for us to lift the dispensation from the obligation.

The obligation to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days comes from our Baptism as Christians. Baptism compels Christians to unite themselves with Christ at the altar in his saving Sacrifice of the Cross. "Participation in the communal celebration of the Sunday Eucharist is a testimony of belonging and of being faithful to Christ and to his Church (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 2182). This is the foundation for the law of the Church that binds Catholics to attend Mass on Sundays and Holy Days (Code of Canon Law, canon 1247) and the Christian way fully to observe the Third Commandment, to keep holy the Lord's Day (Deuteronomy 5: 12; Exodus 31: 15; Catechism of the Catholic Church, nos. 2180-2181).

This obligation, as is always the case, does not apply to those who are seriously ill, have a serious health risk, as well as those who have serious anxiety about being a part of large groups at this time. Likewise, the obligation does not apply to those who care for those who cannot attend Mass in person (Catechism of the Catholic Church, no. 2181). Those who are legitimately excused from Mass on Sundays and Holy Days are encouraged to spend time in prayer, meditating on the Death and Resurrection of the Lord, reading the Sacred Scriptures, and uniting themselves to Christ in his worship of the Father of us all. Those who are legitimately excused are also encouraged to view a broadcast of the Mass which is intended for those who cannot participate in person.



This is a moment to thank God anew for the great gift of the Mass and the Real Presence of Jesus to us in his Holy Body and Blood as well as the joy of gathering together as people of faith.

CARING + GIVING + SERVING

"Yes, Lord. I have come to believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one who is coming into the world."

-St. Martha in John 11: 27.

This Thursday, July 29, we observe the Memorial of St. Martha. What we know of St. Martha from the Gospels can teach us much about relationships.

We all have an interior self who may strive to attain peace, but is sometimes wrestling with conflict, temptation, and sin. St. Martha is described as "burdened" in Luke's Gospel (Luke 10: 40). Whether she is just overwhelmed, a little critical or judgmental, or perhaps harboring some sibling rivalry, she accuses her sister, Mary, of being lazy. Jesus responds by gently pointing out that she is "anxious and worried about many things (Luke 10: 41)." When we feel overly stressed like St. Martha, perhaps we need to give ourselves the time and space to recognize the source of our attitude and behavior.

Family relationships are often complex. We know from the Gospels that Martha, Mary, and their brother, Lazarus, were close friends of Jesus. Our Lord enjoyed being with this family, despite the fact that, like all families, they were imperfect. Reflecting imaginatively on the texts about this family, Martha might suffer from anxiety, Mary might have depression, and Lazarus had some sort of physical ailment that led to his untimely death. The sisters clearly don't always agree with each other, but they share a great love for their brother. In our family relationships, if we put love first, we can tolerate challenges and things that get on our nerves about each other.

St. Martha is a great model of friendship and hospitality. She is the person who makes Jesus feel at home and relaxed when he needs a break from teaching, healing, and forming his Apostles. St. Teresa of Avila says about Martha, "If she had been absorbed in devotion all the time as the Magdalen (Mary) was, there would have been no one to prepare a meal for this Divine Guest" (*The Way of Perfection*). The fact that people come to comfort Martha when Lazarus dies suggests that she was known and loved in the community. Martha was likely the type of friend who showed up at the door with food when there was a death in someone's family or helped to serve at celebrations in her village. Martha was a doer, like all the volunteers who made our recent parish festival happen.

Finally, St. Martha teaches us about relationships with God. Martha is not afraid to express her honest feelings to Jesus. She opens her heart to the Lord without pretention. When admonished for her criticism of her sister, Martha accepts the just correction and grows from it. When Lazarus dies, Martha goes to Mary, who is sitting at home, and lets her know quietly and gently that Jesus is asking for her (*John 11: 28*). Martha puts her trust completely in Jesus and proclaims with confidence that he is the promised Savior.


