

FROM THE PASTOR -



Bishop's Education Fund

The Bishop's Education Fund began in 1995 with the purpose of keeping Catholic education affordable and available to the children of the diocese. In the 27 years of BEF disbursements to families in need, 52,000 grants have been provided, totaling \$23 million.

Even with this outstanding record of success, it is not nearly sufficient to meet the demonstrated need of the families. The estimated unmet financial need in the 2021-2022 school year was approximately \$9 million. Through scholarship support, families with demonstrated financial need will be provided an opportunity to give their sons and daughters a quality education, focused on Christian values and character formation at Catholic elementary schools located throughout the Diocese of Pittsburgh. Your generosity will help ensure that all families who wish to send their children to Catholic school can do so despite their financial situation. 

FIRST READING | WISDOM 9:13-18



I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.





COMMUNION HYMN | BREAD OF LIFE FROM HEAVEN





CARING + GIVING + SERVING

Work is a fundamental dimension of man's existence on earth.

-Pope St. John Paul II, in Laborem Exercens

Tomorrow, September 5, our nation observes Labor Day. Post-pandemic, the meaning and manner of work have been redefined across our country. We hear about the phenomenon called "The Great Resignation" whereby many workers quit their jobs due to fear of COVID, or dissatisfaction with wages or working conditions. Some workers, particularly women, quit in order to dedicate themselves to their children during the time school was virtual. It is thought that many workers used the time of lockdowns and layoffs to explore new or different careers that were more fulfilling. Many people who remained with an employer found themselves working from home instead of going into an office. Healthcare workers have found their jobs to be more demanding due to staff shortages and continuous need to wear personal protective equipment. Some people have chosen not to work, and businesses have needed to reduce hours of operation.

As our nation's views of work are shifting, let's explore what Catholic Social Teaching tells us about work. The Church affirms that all types of work have value and provide dignity. Pope St. John Paul II reminds us that for most of his time on earth, Jesus, the Son of God, did manual labor (Laborem Exercens, 6). Because of our ability to reason and plan, humans must have shelter and possessions to meet our needs over time, and work is the means by which we obtain these things (Leo XIII, Rerum Novarum, 5). Work also should provide fulfillment in using one's gifts (Laborem Exercens, 9). John Paul II asserts that work is a right because people need to provide for themselves and their families and support the common good of society (Laborem Exercens, 16).


People in all working situations need prayer in these difficult times. Consider asking the intercession of St. Joseph the Worker for the concerns of yourself and others.

God our Father and our Creator,

Deacon Jim going to say the "R" word?? It looks like it is time to say the "R" word, but I will not be completely retiring (There, I said it).





National Eucharistic Revival

What does the Catechism teach us about the Eucharist?

1333 At the heart of the Eucharistic celebration are the bread and wine that, by the words of Christ and the invocation of the Holy Spirit, become Christ's Body and Blood. Faithful to the Lord's command the Church continues to do, in his memory and until his glorious return, what he did on the eve of his Passion: "He took bread...." "He took the cup filled with wine...." the signs of bread and wine become, in a way surpassing understanding, the Body and Blood of Christ; they continue also to signify the goodness of creation. Thus in the Offertory we give thanks to the Creator for bread and wine, fruit of the "work of human hands," but above all as "fruit of the earth" and "of the vine" - gifts of the Creator. The Church sees in the gesture of the king-priest Melchizedek, who "brought out bread and wine," a prefiguring of her own offering.

1334 In the Old Covenant bread and wine were offered in sacrifice among the first fruits of the earth as a sign of grateful acknowledgment to the Creator. But they also received a new significance in the context of the Exodus: the unleavened bread that Israel eats every year at Passover commemorates the haste of the departure that liberated them from Egypt; the remembrance of the manna in the desert will always recall to Israel that it lives by the bread of the Word of God; their daily bread is the fruit of the promised land, the pledge of God's faithfulness to his promises.

The "cup of blessing" at the end of the Jewish Passover meal adds to the festive joy of wine an eschatological dimension: the messianic expectation of the rebuilding of Jerusalem. When Jesus instituted the Eucharist, he gave a new and definitive meaning to the blessing of the bread and the cup.

DID YOU KNOW?

Catholics of all ages are familiar with the concept of patron saints. A patron is a saint who has been assigned by tradition, or chosen by the Church, as a special intercessor with God and the proper advocate of a particular place or class of people, to be invoked in prayer for a particular reason.

Most saintly patronages came about in the Middle Ages, which were an age of great faith. Faith prompted the medieval Christian to place not only his church under the protection of a saint, but the ordinary interests of life, health, family, trade, maladies, and perils, as well as his city and his country. The whole social life of the Catholic world was animated with the idea of protection from the citizens of heaven.

Just to give a sense of how exhaustively everyday life was covered with saintly patronage, here is a very short list. For various professions, people would invoke Anastasia (weavers), Andrew (fishermen). Anne (houseworkers and cabinet-makers), Catherine (philosophers and scholars), Cecilia (musicians), Christopher (travelers), Cloud (nailmakers), Cosmas and Damian (doctors). Crispin (shoemakers), Eloi (craftsmen), Lydia (dyers), Joseph (carpenters), Mark (notaries), Luke (painters), Raymond Nonnatus (midwives), Stephen (stonemasons), Vincent

(winegrowers), and Vitus (comedians).

There were patrons or protectors against various forms of illness, too, for instance: Apollonia (toothache), Blase (sore throat), Lucy (the eyes), Benedict (against poison), and Hubert (against the bite of dogs).

Very often these patronages are connected in some way to the life of a saint, or else his or her manner of martyrdom... for example, Stephen is the patron of stonemasons because he was stoned to death, and Apollonia, the patron saint against toothache, had all her teeth pulled out! The martyrs in particular must have a great sense of humor.

Of course, this is one Catholic practice that has not diminished over the ages. While many of the patron saints of old professions and antiquated illnesses may not be familiar to us, we still look to certain saints to intercede for us for particular reasons. Saint Anthony. for example, is still very commonly asked to find lost things everything from misplaced car keys to people who have lost their way on the walk of faith. People still seek the intercession of Saint Francis for their animals and pets; Saint Dymphna against mental illness: Saint Peregrine when we face a diagnosis of cancer; Saint Monica for mothers who hope that their

children will return to the faith... and the list goes on and on.

Many causes have multiple patron saints to choose from. For example, if you suffer from headaches you can choose to invoke Agathius, Crescentinus, Denis, Gemma Galgani, Gerard of Lunel, Gereon, Pancras, or William Firmatus! Some patronages are assigned by papal decree, but more often than not they were acquired by popular piety. Each of those headache saints probably acquired their patronage in different places, and in different times. The more the merrier.

Saintly patronage is a beautiful gift that comes from the tradition of the Church, because it invites us to involve all of heaven in our prayer. In the Letter of James, we are encouraged to "pray for one another" — because "the fervent prayer of a righteous person is very powerful" (5:17); and so when we turn to the saints to intercede for us. we can be confident that we have friends and advocates in heaven who will help us with our needs on earth. As we pray for one another in this way, we strengthen the bonds between the Church on earth and the Church in heaven... so that one day, please God, we too might join the saints in eternal bliss.
