FROM THE PASTOR

"...sometimes reconciliation is sweeter than an unbroken friendship. There are two ways of knowing how good God is: one is never to lose Him, the other is to lose Him and find Him again."

- Venerable Fulton J. Sheen

Please be attentive to the "Lenten regulations." What may appear to be just imposed "rules" are actually pathways to spiritual discipline. They are not to be taken lightly. To deliberately violate them is to commit sin and ignore your need for spiritual growth.

Page 13 lists the ceremonies, devotions and presentations that will be held during the season of Lent. Please consider in a serious manner what you will do to enrich your faith and demeanor of self-denial, as well as to prepare yourself for a renewal of baptismal promises at the Easter Feast!

Because the blessed ashes imposed on the forehead symbolize our mortality and call us to repent of sinfulness, in addition to the adults, ashes will be given only to children who are old enough to have received the sacrament of reconciliation. The Church does not recognize the child's ability to deliberately commit sin that is in need of repentance until the age of "reason" (age 7).

CARING + GIVING + SERVING

Be holy, for I, the Lord, your God, am holy. –Leviticus 19: 2

Today's first reading from Leviticus contains the command to "be holy." This may sound intimidating, and even more so when in the Gospel, Jesus commands us to "be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect" (Matthew 5: 48). It might be helpful to explore what holiness means and how this concept has been understood by Christian thinkers.

The Oxford English Dictionary defines holy as, "dedicated or consecrated to God or a religious purpose; sacred" and "morally and spiritually excellent." The word for holy in Hebrew is "qodesh," which means "apartness, set-apartness, separateness, sacredness." These definitions help us to understand holiness, but also make it sound like a difficult and abstract quality to attain in real life.

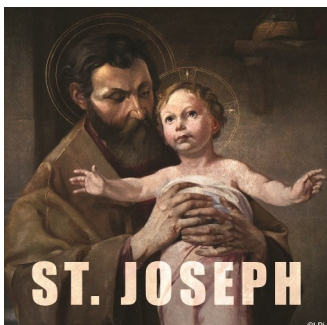
Many influential Catholic writers have provided insight into what it means to be holy. The Trappist Monk, Thomas Merton, said that to be holy is to be oneself, and that silent prayer is necessary to grow in self-knowledge. Pope Benedict XVI stated in a General Audience in 2011 that "Christian holiness is nothing other than charity lived to the full," or loving God and our neighbor. Benedict stated that God provides us with the grace to help us to be holy when we choose to receive the Sacraments, participate in the Liturgy, pray, fast, serve others, and follow the Ten Commandments. St. Teresa of Avila defined holiness simply as "friendship with Christ."

If we stop and think about people we have known, we might be able to identify someone who we could describe as "holy." We may notice that a person has a sense of peace and appears to be comfortable in their own skin. Maybe that person is or was prayerful, loving, kind, humble, and generous. When someone is consistent in practicing their faith, they live with the assurance that Jesus Christ is walking with them in the good and bad times of life. Holy people do in fact stand out as different and not attached to the ways and things of the world. We can take encouragement that even holy people are sinners, but they are seeking ongoing conversion.

As we enter the season of Lent this week and embrace the three pillars of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, let us pray that through God's grace, we come closer to attaining the holiness for which we were created and to which we are called.

DID YOU KNOW?

Lent is upon us! Ash Wednesday is this week and will bring with it all the traditional observances of the season, from fish fries to Stations of the Cross. This year Lent will also bring with it a subtle change in the Order of Penance — that is, the wording of the prayers used in the Sacrament of Penance (or Reconciliation, or Confession: they're all names for the same thing).

So what's changing, and why? And most importantly, what do you need to know as the person on the other side of the confessional?

The good news is that you, the penitent, don't need to do anything differently at all. The most noticeable change will be a subtle rephrasing of the words in the prayer of absolution. That's the prayer the priest says which effects the sacramental absolution of sins. This is the new prayer, with the changes in bold:

"God, the Father of mercies, through the death and resurrection of his Son has reconciled the world to himself

and **poured out** the Holy Spirit for the forgiveness of sins; through the ministry of the Church may God **grant** you pardon and peace. And I absolve you from your sins in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit."

The old version of the prayer had said: "God... sent the Holy Spirit among us" and "may God give you pardon and peace."

This change is part of the same slow-moving process of retranslation that produced the version of the Order of Mass we've been using since 2011. The reason for the change is that this new prayer is closer to the original Latin. You'll notice that this adjustment is much more subtle than the shift from "And also with you" to "And with your spirit." In fact, I'm betting that if I hadn't told you, you wouldn't have noticed it at all.

Priests can start using the new translation on Ash Wednesday, but this Lent is a kind of "breaking in" period where both the old and the new versions of the words of absolution are licit options. On Divine

Mercy Sunday, April 16, the new version will go into effect across the board.

You might be wondering: what happens if a priest accidentally says the old version of the prayer of absolution beyond April 16? Priests, being human, are known to mess up at times... and as subtle as the change is, I know I'll be reading the new prayer off a card for quite a while.

Not to worry. A few misplaced words are not enough to affect absolution. The bare essential words of the sacrament — the sacramental "form," as we call it — are simply "I absolve you." Of course, priests should always be careful to follow the rites of the Church without any undue alteration, but as long as the priest says those three words, you can rest assured that the minimum requirements have been met. Your sins are forgiven. What beautiful words they are!

LENTEN REGULATIONS

1. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. The Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence in the United States.

2. The obligation of abstinence (refraining from eating meat) begins at the age of 14. The law of fasting (limiting oneself to one full meal and two lighter meals) obliges all between the ages of 18 and 59. No one should consider this obligation

lightly.

3. Those individuals who have a medical condition in which fasting may be considered harmful are not obliged to fast, but should perform some other act of penance or charity.

4. Pastors and parents are to see to it that minors, though not bound by the law of fast and abstinence, are educated in the authentic sense of penance and encouraged to do acts of penance

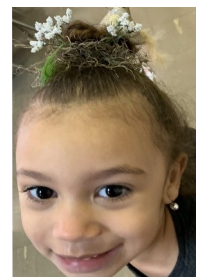
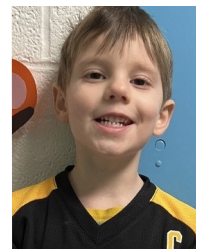

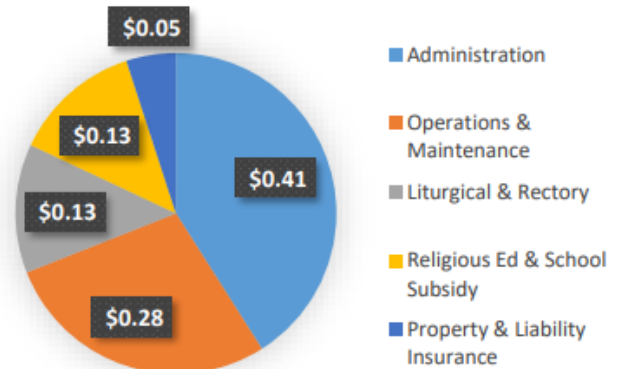

IS GOSSIP A SIN?

Question: Is gossip a mortal sin?

Answer: To really ask this question, we must consider the Eighth Commandment: "You shall not bear false witness."

In its reflections on this commandment, The Catechism of the Catholic Church invites us to not only think about what bearing "false witness" means, but to also consider how we understand the truth and how we communicate more broadly. This is why so much of this section of the Catechism has to do with the gift of language. With this in mind, we will notice that the word "gossip" isn't used by the Catechism. Instead, we find the words "detraction" and "calumny," which are actually two forms that gossip can take, and both can be quite serious.

First, detraction is the revealing "another's faults and failings to persons who did not know them," without morally valid reasons. Calumny, by extension, is saying something about another person that is untrue, and it is sinful because it "harms the reputation of others and gives occasion for false judgements" (see no. 2477).

In all of our communication, we have to always recognize that we have a moral obligation to the truth and to always work to protect the reputation and honor of our neighbors (see no. 2479).

Gossip can, in fact, prove to be a very serious sin. After all, the Catechism reminds us: "No one is bound to reveal the truth to someone who does not have the right to know it" (no. 2489). When we have gossiped, especially if we are aware we have damaged another person's good name or reputation, we want to make every effort to undo the damage we have done, including seeking the grace and forgiveness offered in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. ©LPi
