PARISH MISSION

We, the Roman Catholic Community of St. Bartholomew the Apostle, are brought together by Jesus, as we recognize His presence among us in Word, Sacrament and each other. Through the grace of the Holy Spirit and the intercession of the Blessed Mother, we accept Jesus' invitation to be His disciples by using our time, talent and treasure for the benefit of all.

FROM THE DESK OF FR. JOHN

Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him.

Do not forget the Lord, your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, that place of slavery. These words of Moses to the people in today's first reading are both a bit of a reproach, and a compassionate gesture. We encounter Moses after he has just finished giving some specific instructions and prophecies to the people (Deuteronomy 7:1-26). Now he is instructing them to be faithful, and recounting how God has always cared for them, guided them, and provided for them.

Notice, though, that Moses also says that God let them be afflicted with hunger. God was testing them with physical hunger so they might recognize their dependence upon him. Not only does he feed them, he feeds them with manna, a food unknown to [them] and [their] fathers. In other words, he offered them something new - something that gave them life and kept them alive.

It was also something that represented, in physical form, the words of promise he had spoken to them: You have seen how I treated the Egyptians and how I bore you up on eagles' wings and brought you to myself. Now, if you obey me completely and keep my covenant, you will be my treasured possession among all peoples, though all the earth is mine. You will be to me a kingdom of priests, a holy nation (Exodus 19:4-6a). We are shown that true life comes from listening to every word that comes forth from the mouth of the Lord.

The greatest word that ever came forth from the mouth of the Lord was the Word that became flesh: Jesus Christ. Listening to him and following his commands is the way to eternal life. He is the greatest gift ever given to us, and he says to us every day what is written in today's Gospel: I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world.

This is what the Church celebrates today in its Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ: "Corpus Christi." It is a celebration of God's saving grace given to us in his word, promise, and hope for eternal life - all in the person of Jesus Christ. Jesus, who gives us his body and blood in the Eucharist, is the perfect satisfaction of all desires and all hunger. He is the satisfaction of hunger for one's life to have meaning, to have forgiveness, and to have acceptance. These are some of our deepest spiritual hungers. They ultimately point to our hunger for God. These hungers can only be satisfied by spiritual "food" - the food that is ultimately an encounter with God through Christ Jesus. Or as Jesus says in the Gospel, Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him.

What a blessing that the Church provides us with many opportunities to be fed by Jesus. We are fed through the love we share with one another, through our shared acts of service and justice, through our shared prayer, and especially in our sharing of the Eucharist. Let us give thanks for these gifts.



WELCOME FR. ANDY PRACHAR

We hope you have the opportunity to say hello to our new Pastor, Fr. Andy Prachar - he is here this weekend (June 11) at the Parish Picnic to greet parishioners! Read more about Fr. Andy here:

I am very excited about being a part of the leadership of this faith community which Fr. John has shepherded so well and with great love. I look forward to getting to know each of you and hearing from you more about the St. Bartholomew Community.

I am proud to be a "Newark boy!" I was born to Joan and Andy Prachar (both now with God on a full-time basis) on January 25, 1957. Dad was a fourth generation Newark firefighter and Mom was putting out fires at home with my two brothers and sisters and myself in our five-room apartment. I was baptized into the faith a few weeks later



at Blessed Sacrament Church in Newark. Catholic education has been a part of my life throughout elementary and high school. I was very active in my home parish of Sacred Heart, Vailsburg, Newark. Most of the priests, nuns and brothers were very good and faith-filled people who helped me in the darkest times of my early life. Upon graduating from Seton Hall University I backpacked through Europe for two to three months.

After college, I was a school teacher for seventh and eighth graders in Elizabeth and St. Helen's in Westfield was home to me for a few years as the Director of Youth Ministry. I experienced and discerned God calling me to give myself to others and to God in the priesthood. I was 27 when I entered the seminary. Priesthood came late: I worked with a therapist and chose to delay my ordination, with the Archbishop's okay, by two years. During those two years I ministered at St. Catharine, Glen Rock. I learned a lot especially about myself and creating a ministry with and for married couples. I was ordained to the Priesthood of Jesus Christ on November 17, 1990. I've been assigned in Bayonne, in Kearny as Director of Youth Retreats, and Livingston. I was called to be pastor at my home parish in Vailsburg and then for fourteen happy and challenging years at our neighboring parish in Berkeley Heights, Church of the Little Flower. In addition, For the past 25 years, I have been blessed to have served as a chaplain to men and women in the fire service and in law enforcement. I have worked with other chaplains and the Port Authority police at Ground Zero and have ridden twice in the Police Unity Tour. I have served on the Council of Priests representing the priests of the Archdiocese. I was elected twice as the Chairman of the Council.

In November, I completed my second sabbatical where I participated in a program for priests at the North American Pontifical College in Vatican City. While there I continue with my Italian lessons! I also "dabble" in the Spanish language, however I've learned how to merengue (dance) better than I can speak Spanish! I love to travel especially in Europe, stay active and I took up baking during Covid. I like to cook and eat! I believe I am a listener, one who accompanies others on our journey to and with God. I am a big-picture guy who needs help with details and I can be serious but love to laugh. If you want to learn more, invite me over for dinner. I look forward to meeting you all!

The RCIA Program (Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults) might be right for you!

WHAT IS RCIA?

The Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) introduces adults to the Catholic faith and tradition, as well as prepares adults for receiving the Sacraments. The RCIA process is one of study, exploration, faith sharing and faith formation. The RCIA Process is for adults who seek full initiation in the Catholic Church, including those who have never been baptized, baptized Christians desiring to convert from other denominations, and baptized Catholics desiring to receive any of the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist).

WHEN DOES RCIA BEGIN?

You can reach out to us at any time - the process begins as soon as you sign up! There are options for meeting individually or in small group sessions. Sacraments of Initiation are bestowed during the Easter season.

Reconciliation (Confession)


Confession is offered every Saturday at 4pm or you can call the rectory to schedule an appointment (908-322-5192).
