Facts and Myths About Refugees in Canada May 21, 2018 Human Rights, Refugee Law

Misinformation and False Facts About Immigration in Canada

As long as violence and conflict persist throughout the world and populations are subjected to violence and persecution, refugees will look to other countries such as Canada as a safe haven and home. Canada's history of welcoming and supporting refugees from around the world spans decades.

But the <u>recent influx of refugees making news headlines</u>, coupled with how quickly information and misinformation can spread via social media, has perpetuated several myths about refugees throughout Canada. These myths support bias and prejudice and contribute to ongoing anti-refugee sentiment.

While determining the accuracy of a headline may seem like a straightforward process, refugee lawyers and advocates often have an uphill battle pushing back against misinformation. Here are some of the most common myths about refugee rights and admittance to Canada and the truth behind them.

5 Myths and The Facts Behind Them.

Myth: Refugees Get More Financial Aid than Canadian Pensioners | Fact: Refugees Receive Minimal Financial Support

Government-sponsored refugees receive minimal financial support (if any) during their first year in Canada for basic food and shelter costs. In fact, in Ontario, an individual refugee may receive \$781 per month, in addition to a one-time allowance payment of \$905 and a \$564 loan for housing rental and telephone line deposits.

Privately-sponsored refugees do not receive any support from the government when they arrive. It is up to their sponsors to cover their living costs until they can find employment or other sources of assistance.

Financial assistance for any refugee is not more than social assistance for Canadians.

Myth: Asylum Seekers Jump the Queue | Fact: Refugee Claims Do NOT Affect Other Immigration Applications

Under international law, refugees fleeing violence and persecution have a right to seek asylum in another country. And this application process is handled within a different stream of Canada's immigration system. As such, refugee claims do not interfere with other types of immigration applications.

Myth: Criminals Pose as Refugees to Enter Canada | Fact: Entering Canada as a Refugee is Difficult Due to Intense Security Scrutiny

Refugees undergo <u>strict background checks</u> and security screenings before their claims are processed. If any claimant poses a security risk, has a serious criminal background, has participated in organized crime, or has committed a human rights violation, they can be detained and not admitted to Canada.

The Canadian Security Intelligence Service (CSIS) checks all refugee claimants once they arrive in Canada. In fact, entering Canada as a refugee is far more difficult than as a visitor due to the number of security checks and lengthy and detailed interview process. The number of claimants who pose any sort of threat or security concern is statistically insignificant.

Myth: Refugees and Immigrants Contribute to Higher Crime Rates | Fact: Immigrants and Refugees Commit Fewer Crimes than Native-Born Canadians

Immigrants and refugees commit fewer crimes than other Canadians and are underrepresented in Canadian prisons. Just like any other population, there will always be a few who engage in criminal activity, but most people are law-abiding.

Furthermore, compared to other nations, Canada still has a remarkably <u>small number of refugees</u> per capita, according to a 2015 study. This United Nations High Commission for Refugees study found that Canada was home to around 4 refugees per 1,000 people.

Myth: Refugees Are a Burden on the Canadian Economy | Fact: Refugees and Immigration Actually Help the Economy

With Canada's low birth rate and <u>aging population</u>, immigrants and refugees help keep the economy stable by contributing to the declining workforce and economy. In fact, refugees who become entrepreneurs actually help create job opportunities in Canada.

What's more, refugees do not take jobs from Canadian citizens. <u>Refugees and immigrants contribute to the size of Canada's working population</u> and tax base in a big way, and the children of immigrants and refugees tend to outperform those of "natural-born" Canadians, academically and professionally.

Why It's So Important to Dispel These Myths

These myths are harmful to Canadian society. Compared to some other countries, Canada is fairly tolerant and values diversity. But if more people believe the myths they read online, then more people could develop an unfounded bias toward refugees in Canada.





Engaging our Community to END Human Trafficking in Windsor/Essex

'Human Trafficking is the recruitment, transportation, transfer, harbouring or receipt of persons, by means of the threat or use of force or other forms of coercion, of abduction, of fraud, of deception, of abuse of power or of a position of vulnerability or of the giving or receiving of payments, or benefits to achieve the consent of a person having control over another person for the purpose of exploitation'

(United Nations 2000)

WEFIGHT provides direct services to survivors of human trafficking, including identification of risk factors and vulnerabilities, coordination with community partners and intensive case management/support.


At our January CWL general meeting Amanda Pearce was asked how can we be involved. This is an excerpt from the letter she sent to us -:

"With respect to preventing Human Trafficking, I think the best thing we can be doing is fostering a sense of community, while ensuring all community members are aware of human trafficking. We know that the majority of victims of HT come from fractured home environments, with limited positive support from social systems. By supporting our vulnerable community members to engage in positive social systems, we will hopefully be giving them ties to the community that will reduce their vulnerability and reduce the likelihood that they will be swept into a trafficking situation. Public education is the key piece in preventing HT, and we would be happy to provide further information/training sessions should anyone see fit.

In terms of supporting survivors, many of our clients rely heavily on donations. Should anyone be willing to donate grocery gift cards, (Walmart or Shoppers etc.) our clients would be deeply grateful (though it should be noted that we are not able yet to provide a tax receipt for charitable donations ...we are working on it). Perhaps if your members are renovating or upgrading and have gently loved furniture, clothing or household supplies that they are open to donating, they could reach out to us and let us know. Unfortunately, we do not have access to any storage space, but if we do have a client that happens to be in need at that time, we would be happy to take any donations off your hands. And, of course, if we do not have a client in need at the time, we'd be happy to redirect that donation to another group, e.g. St Vincent De Paul.

For those that are politically inclined, it is helpful to reach out to your MP and MPP to express your concern for this issue and ensure that your politicians are aware that this is an issue that matters to their constituents. This helps provide the political clout we need to have legislation and funding put in place to further support our survivors.

Human Trafficking Awareness Month Human Trafficking Myths

MYTH: Human trafficking and smuggling are the same.

FALSE: Human trafficking is the business of exploiting and profiting off of women, men and children, through the use of brute force, manipulation, fraud, or coercion to obtain some type of labor or commercial sex act. Movement across borders, states lines or any type of transportation is NOT required for it to be considered human trafficking, it can happen within your own neighborhood or city.

Human smuggling is the transportation of individuals across borders. Movement across a country's borders is a requirement to be considered human smuggling.

MYTH: People have free will and choose this lifestyle.

FALSE: Many times victims are lured and manipulated into trafficking with hopes of false love, fake jobs or threats of violence and harm. Traffickers use tactics of deception, force, threats and intimidation. Further, any individual being bought and sold for sex under the age of 18 is automatically a victim of trafficking.

MYTH: Human trafficking victims always come from low-income or rural areas.

FALSE: Poverty can be a factor in human trafficking because it is often an indicator of vulnerability but it is not the main cause. Trafficking victims can come from a range of income levels, and many may come from families with higher socioeconomic status. In fact, most trafficking victims come from the local area in which they live. Nevada reported in 2018 that 68% of children trafficked in the state were local residents.

MYTH: Victims of trafficking will seek out help and identify as victims.

FALSE: Victims may be fearful due to threats they have received from their trafficker. They may blame themselves for their situation or they may distrust offers of help. They have likely been coached by the trafficker on how to act and what to say.

MYTH: It is easy to spot a human trafficking victim.

FALSE: Many stereotypes about victims affect our ability to recognize trafficking; for example, victims of trafficking are not only heterosexual females – they may also be male or LGBTO.

MYTH: If I see a trafficking victim, I should approach them to help.

FALSE: Remember, trafficking victims may be under surveillance by their trafficker. Your safety, as well as the safety of the victim, is paramount. Do not attempt to confront a suspected trafficker directly or alert a victim to any suspicions. Immediately contact a member of the security team, and let them know what you saw or heard that gave rise to your suspicions.

My Life with the Saints by Father James Martin S.J.


This easy-to-read and interesting book talks about the lives of a number of saints and holy people. Father Martin, a Jesuit priest, has written a number of charming books on Catholic spirituality which can help us on the road to holiness.

It is interesting to see the many different ways that God's grace is shown in the lives of the saints, who come from such different backgrounds and have different challenges to face in their search for holiness. Their striving to know God and to do his will in their lives is a powerful example for each of us.

The chapter on Saint Bernadette Soubirous includes a detailed and sometimes humorous account of Father Martin's trip to Lourdes as the chaplain of a Catholic group helping sick people. The chapter on Pope John XXIII shows us his warmth and self-effacing humour.

The life of Dorothy Day, who founded the *Catholic Worker* newspaper, is the example of a holy person who helps the poor directly and also works to eliminate some of the causes of poverty, such as unjust working conditions. Father Martin writes also about the Ugandan martyrs, who lost their lives in the late 19th century.

The examples of these holy women and men can inspire us to seek God's grace and continue on our path to holiness.



Catholic social teaching is the body of doctrine developed by the Catholic Church on matters of social justice, involving issues of poverty and wealth, economics, social organization and the role of the state.

Modern Catholic Social Teaching began with Pope Leo XIII in 1891, when he issued his Pastoral Letter: On the Condition of the Working Class. Catholic Social Teaching applies the Gospel to bring about social justice and social love. "To teach and spread her social doctrine belongs to the church's evangelizing Mission and is an essential part of the Christian Message."

The seven principles of Catholic social teaching are:

- **Dignity of the Human Person**: human life is sacred and the dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision for society.
- Call to Family, Community and Participation: how we organize our society in economics and politics, in law and policy directly affects human dignity and the capacity of individuals to grow in community.
- Rights and Responsibilities: human dignity can be protected and a healthy community can be achieved only if human rights are protected and responsibilities are met.
- Preferential Option for and with People who are Poor: a basic moral test is how our most vulnerable members are faring.
- Dignity of Work and the Rights of Workers: the economy must serve people, not the other way around.
- **Solidarity**: We are one human family whatever our national, racial, ethnic, economic, and ideological differences.
- Care for God's Creation: We show our respect for the Creator by our stewardship of creation.



Here are a few examples on conserving water at home:


- Turn off the tap while brushing your teeth and scrubbing your hands.

Dear Our Lady of the Atonement CWL, Warm and seasonal greetings from Vijaya Rani (HB1300) and family.




