

EVERYTHING THAT YOU HAVE ALWAYS NEEDED TO KNOW ABOUT THE MASS, BUT NEVER GOT AROUND TO ASKING. by Fr. Michael Syjueco

Many of us lifelong Catholics have grown so used to Mass that perhaps we go through the motions without truly experiencing the awesome mystery of the Mass. Because

we have gotten so used to the Mass, our minds often wander. We are caught up with the winds no longer with Jesus. It is important, therefore, that we understand what goes on during the Mass, the words we hear and use to respond, the prayers that are used, the parts of the Mass, even the variety of postures that we take during the Eucharistic celebration. Now that I have tackled the fundamentals of the Mass—like why we worship God, how the Mass is the highest form of worship, the general meaning of the Mass, how Mass is uniquely different from the many ways we experience God's presence, what generally happens to the Mass with the Liturgy of the Word, and the Liturgy of the Eucharist and its origin, and quite recently the importance of sacred silence—I can now proceed to discuss the details in the Mass and understand in a deeper sense what all the details mean. In this article and in the coming articles that I will write, I will focus on these details with the hope that we will never take the Mass for granted ever again. I will use the book written by Mike Buruiel, "The Mass" as my main reference for this purpose.

The first thing that greets us in the Church as we come in for Mass are the Church doors. The doors are great symbols that we often take for granted. In John 10:9, Jesus says, "I am the gate. Whoever enters through me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture." In the door, therefore, we encounter the first image of Christ. We pass through this door mindful that it is through Jesus (not by any other, not by the world, not by anyone), but only through Jesus, we are saved. The next time we enter through the doors of the Church, therefore, we do well to be conscious about what specifically do I need Christ to save me from at this point in my life?

As we enter the church, we notice a big font of water. The water is blessed, and thus it is considered holy. It was blessed at the Easter Vigil for the purpose of being used to baptized the catechumens. This water reminds us of our own baptism, in which we died to our sin and chose to live for

Christ. As we bless ourselves with this sacred water, we might want to ask ourselves, how have I lived my baptismal vows so far?

STEWARDSHIP OF TREASURE REPORT -



APRIL 2019

Thank you to everyone who supported the mission and ministries of our parish during the month of April.

Our average weekly collection was \$24,158. You also generously donated to various important causes in our March Second Collections in the amount of \$30,114.

Our parish needs \$20,000 a week for us to meet many of our financial responsibilities. We budgeted our Sunday Offertory income for the first 10 months (40 weeks) at \$800,000 and received \$857,000. This additional income helps us to pay-down our \$2.5 million debt. As you know, we are totally dependent upon you all our parishioners for our livelihood. We are so grateful for the sacrifices you make so that the work of St. Francis of Assisi Parish may continue to impact the lives of so many.

FIRST SUNDAY OF THE MONTH – SECOND COLLECTION – MORTGAGE DEBT REDUCTION



Next Sunday, there will be a second collection to reduce our \$2.5 million-dollar parish debt. Yes, that number is right. Our debt has gone down by \$875,000! A very generous and loving parishioner, Ella Mary Molt-

er, left a large sum of money to the parish to reduce the debt that was incurred in building our chapel and hall. This gift encourages all of us to consider including St. Francis of Assisi as a beneficiary when managing our estate planning. The sooner we pay off this debt, the more funds we will have available to support other vital services in our growing parish. Thank you for your generosity.





In the church we encounter the sacred presence of God. The church is not a social hall. It is not a country club either where we

gather and chat with each other and catch up with the latest news of people. The church is a sacred place where we talk to God. We walk into the church to pray the greatest prayer, and to do the highest form of worship—the Mass. Mindful of this, therefore, the tabernacle ought to be the first to which we are to direct our eyes after we dip our fingers in the holy water. The tabernacle, as we all know it, houses the Blessed Sacrament—the real presence of the true Body of Jesus Christ in the form of bread. So, what we do before we enter into the rows where we will sit is to genuflect towards Christ the King, giving him the due honor He deserves. Genuflecting is an act of adoration. That very act already helps bring our mind to the presence of God. Unfortunately, however, most of the time we enter our church hearing all the noise and chatters with people catching up with their friends. We ought to first direct our eyes to the tabernacle. What if Mass will be celebrated not in a church but in a social hall? That should not take away our attention that as we enter that Hall for Mass, it does not change the fact that we are likewise about to pray the greatest prayer and the highest form of worship—the Mass. Such consciousness must still be there. I've talked about the im-
