Stewardship of Treasure Report - May 2023

May is the penultimate month of the current fiscal year. Thank you for your continued support of the mission and ministries of our parish. During the month of **May** our average weekly collection was \$18,627 (3.8% decrease vs. Apr. 23). You also generously donated to various important causes in our May second collections at \$20,820 (\$5,205 a week.) This brings our May weekly average to \$23,832. We budgeted our Sunday Offertory income for the current fiscal year (46 weeks x **\$16,000**) at **\$736,000** and received **\$898,564 (+\$162,564).** We have budgeted the extra income for the continuing maintenance and improvements to our parish campus buildings and grounds. As you know, we are dependent upon your practice of good stewardship to fulfill our parish mission. The love that these gifts represent will enable us to continue the work that we must undertake here at St. Francis of Assisi Parish.

troops' arrival came a full two and a half years after the signing of the Emancipation Proclamation. Juneteenth honors the end to slavery in the United States and is considered the longest-running African American holiday. On June 17, 2021, it officially became a federal holiday. The parish office will be closed on June 19, 2023.

## Just one-third of U.S. Eucharistic Catholics agree with their church that Eucharist is body, blood of Christ

About six-in-ten (63%) of the most observant Catholics — those who attend Mass at least once a week — accept the church's teaching about transubstantiation. Still, even among this most observant group of Catholics, roughly one-third (37%) don't believe that the Communion bread and wine actually become the body and blood of Christ (including 23% who don't know the church's

teaching and 14% who know the church's teaching but don't believe it). And among Catholics who do not attend Mass weekly, large majorities say they believe the bread and wine are symbolic and do not actually become the body and blood of Jesus.
