

TENSION WITHIN US

I've always wondered whether one's religious and political/secular views can ever be kept compartmentalized, that is separate or apart within us. Some of us claim that we can. If they are in alignment, we feel good about ourselves but if they are not, there is tension. We feel unsure which one is right but we usually end up justifying these conflicting positions. We rationalize how both can be somewhat right or we just ignore the differences and move on.

Today's parable of the weeds and wheat illustrates the tension between that kind of muddled mixture inside us, the good wheat and not so good weed. Jesus teaches us that God allows both the "weeds and the wheat" to grow in the same field, our own self. This is true for you and for everyone around you. We are all mixtures of weeds and wheat. We will always be a jumble of yin and yang, simultaneously saint and sinner.

In one of his homilies, Fr. Richard Rohr said that we cannot deny the wheat, thinking of ourselves as terrible, leading often to discouragement. Nor can we deny the weeds and ignore our own evil. Jesus doesn't mean that it's OK to be selfish, violent and evil. Jesus just means that we need to be realistic about ourselves.

We are not perfect. No one is. To grow in perfection is our life's project, and we need God's help to do that. By accepting that we are imperfect, we can learn patience, compassion and forgiveness. We can love our imperfect selves. We can care for others in spite of the faults we see in them. We can leave it up to God to decide what is wheat and what is weed, because that is what he will do at the end of time.

In the meantime, we can hold the tension within us, the mystery of holding weed and wheat together in the field of our lives. Then we will hear the good news more clearly with our eyes, ears and hearts wide open.— **Dcn. Joe Cabrido.**


The Peace Prayer of St. Francis





J.O.Y. Jesus, Others and

Yourself: J.O.Y. is our religious education process for children 1st grade-High School. In this process the children and youth learn the basics of the Catholic Faith. Children preparing for Sacraments of First Eucharist and High School Confirmation start their preparation in J.O.Y. Registration for J.O.Y. starts July 1 and closes August 30. Registration is done on our website at www.sfoasj.com.

First Communion- First Communion preparation starts in the J.O.Y. process. Those wishing to prepare for First

Communion must have been in J.O.Y. in the year prior. Children must be in the second grade or above and already baptized as a Catholic.

High School Confirmation-High School Confirmation starts in High School

beginning in the 9th grade. Preparation for Confirmation starts in our J.O.Y. process. Youth must have been in J.O.Y. in the year prior. Youth must have been baptized Catholic, received First Communion.

Scripture Reflection and Study-Every Wednesday from 10:00-11:00am, we dive into the Sunday readings. We reflect and share our thoughts and the message of Jesus. Come and see what Jesus has in store for you.

Adult Confirmation-If you did not complete the Sacrament of Confirmation, we offer monthly sessions to learn and grow in your faith. Online Registration begins in July-August.

The Memorial Garden is a place for the cremated remains of those who have gone before us, and to memorialize others who have died but are buried elsewhere. St. Francis is unique in offering this service to the Catholic Community.

This Garden space is set aside because those who have died form with us the Communion of Saints and are always present with us in prayer. We stand with all people, both living and dead, to sing our one song of praise to God for those who have died with Christ, have risen with Him and for the one Spirit that binds us together as one people.

The Garden is a quiet space in which you can pray and remember those who have died. We also honor the four periods and peoples of the history of Evergreen: the Ohlone Native Peoples, the Spanish and Mexican settlers, the ranchers and vintners, and those who have developed the land and reside here now.
