HELP OTHERS ALONG THEIR PATH TO TRANSFORMATION

In this Sunday's gospel, Jesus offers us a template on how to bring someone back into the community after committing a sin against another. It starts with a dialogue between victim and offender, with witnesses and the larger community becoming involved if the dispute remains unresolved. Jesus teaches us that we are responsible for each other. We are to keep the community together and work at restoring to wholeness the people and broken relationships without resorting to violence. This is not how most religions and cultures deal with offenders against the community. Retribution is demanded of the sinner promoting a system of reward

and punishment, the identification of good people and bad people. This is called retributive justice. Bad deeds are to be punished as it is deemed as the best morally acceptable social response. However to Jesus, sin and failure are an opportunity for the transformation of the person harmed, the person causing harm, and the community. Quid pro quo, an eye-for-an eye or a tooth-fora tooth is not the way of the Gospel. Our best self wants to restore relationships, and not just blame or punish. This is the operative idea of restorative justice, a movement toward the healing of broken relationships with God, community and self. As a Catholic detention minister at the Santa Clara county jails, one way I minister to inmates is by engaging them in a discussion over scripture readings. They all share a deep spiritual desire to experience a holy presence. And once this holy presence is experienced, whether it's a conversation with someone, or in the silence of their jail cell, a relationship with God is established. I take this opportunity to invite you to help the incarcerated to experience such a transformation. We share the Good News with our brothers and sisters through prayer, liturgical services and the Word of God. Though incarcerated, we affirm that they, just like us, are children of God in need of forgiveness and his loving mercy. 

The Memorial Garden is a place for the cremated remains of those who have gone before us, and to memorialize others who have died but are buried elsewhere. St. Francis is unique in offering this service to the Catholic Community.

This Garden space is set aside because those who have died form with us the Communion of Saints and are always present with us in prayer. We stand with all people, both living and dead, to sing our one song of praise to God for those who have died with Christ, have risen with Him and for the one Spirit that binds us together as one people.

The Garden is a quiet space in which you can pray and remember those who have died. We also honor the four periods and peoples of the history of Evergreen: the Ohlone Native Peoples, the Spanish and Mexican settlers, the ranchers and vintners, and those who have developed the land and reside here now.

WHICH SAINT WAS CALLED TO CONVERSION BY THE VOICE OF A CHILD?

St. Augustine was not saint material to begin

with. Though gifted with a brilliant mind, he was a womanizer, a rowdy drunk, an occasional thief, and an unbeliever. Yet, his mother, St. Monica, prayed continually for his conversion. For many years, her prayers seemed to

be unanswered. From Carthage to Rome to Milan, St. Augustine pursued only fleeting pleasures, engaged in entangling affairs, practiced the anti-Christian polytheistic religion Manichaeism, and distanced himself from his mother and her devout faith. As her son risked his eternal soul and dismissed his inheritance of faith, St. Monica could only watch, deeply pained, and continue to pray for her

beloved son. These years of constant prayer were rewarded when one night, St. Augustine heard the soft voice of a child call out to him from the darkness. The voice urged him to "take up and read." "Not in rioting and drunkenness, not in chambering and wantonness, not in strife and envying, but put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh to fulfill the lusts thereof." (Romans 13:13-14)The words of St. Paul spoke through the centuries and cut directly to St. Augustine's heart. Moved by the power of Scripture, St. Augustine began to yearn for truth. After decades of loss, pain, and disappointment, St. Monica's prayers were answered. On the Easter Vigil in 387 A.D., St. Augustine was baptized. He became a priest, then a bishop, preached over 6,000 sermons, fought heresies, explained doctrine, became one of the greatest Fathers and


