FEAST OF THE HOLY FAMILY OF JESUS, MARY & JOSEPH.

Among the more popular reality shows are about families. Some of the things these shows highlight are conflicts between a husband and wife, parents spending more time working than with their children, parents yelling at their children, children spending more time with nannies or cellphones than with their parents, children lying to their parents. The list goes on. While these shows also present moments of where people give each other love, care and respect, there appears to be more scenes showcasing the challenges and struggles of families today. The message we get, therefore, is what is more real are the challenges and struggles more than the love, care and respect found in families. The Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph, however, reminds us that conflicts and chaos in families are really the antithesis of a reality that we have lost as a result of sin. Prior to the fall of Adam and Eve, there was harmony and peace between them. That was the **original reality**. The reality that we see happening in families



highlighted by these shows is **not the original**, but a **distortion of that original** because of *sin*. The whole meaning of Advent that we just finished celebrating is not only waiting for the second coming of Christ in which he will restore reality into its original state, **but also** to become aware what God has been doing in our lives, in families towards that restoration.



Today's feast of the Holy Family is dedicated to the life of Jesus, Mary and Joseph commemorating their life in Nazareth, and calling us to focus on the Catholic family life. The Church presents to us the Holy Family as the benchmark for our own family life, because the Holy Family is what the *original reality* looks like. Jesus, Mary and Joseph lived as a community of persons reflecting the community of the Trinitarian God in which each of the three persons of God manifest their love for each other all having a union of will with God as the center. Because of this, there is harmony, peace, love, respect, and collaboration. The Holy Family also manifested harmony, peace, love, respect, and collaboration because what was central to their lives was the will of God. For that matter, their life is a family of prayer.

A family is a sacrament pointing to the reality of God as a community of persons. Unfortunately, the reality of a family that the world presents is the opposite of the family as a sacrament. The world has highlighted that everyone is entitled to whatever they want.

That is reality. When each assert to one's own wishes, then hardly will there be harmony, peace, respect, and collaboration.

In 2002, Pope John Paul II said in his Angelus talk of December 29, "Every Christian family is called to show "convincingly that it is possible to live marriage fully in keeping with God's plan and with the true good of the human person - of the spouses, and of the children who are more fragile". He continues to say, "A united family that follows these principles will more easily overcome the trials and difficulties it encounters on its way. In the faithful love of the parents, a gift ceaselessly to foster and safeguard, children can find the best conditions for their growth, helped by Jesus who "increased in wisdom and in stature, and in the favor with God and man (2:52)". (Novo Millennio ineunte.n. 47) God invites all families to work with Him in restoring the original reality of a family life. Let each family be a reality show witnessing to the world as a sacred sign to the community of persons of the One God.
