A REFLECTION FROM FR. VINCENT PINEDA June 22, 2025 - The Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi) "Give them some food yourselves." - Luke 9:13

Dear St. Francis of Assisi Family,

Today's Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ invites us to reflect on the Eucharist – Christ's extraordinary gift of himself to us and the call to become what we receive.

The Gospel story of the feeding of the five thousand begins with Jesus welcoming the crowds, speaking to them about the kingdom of God, and healing those who needed cure. When evening approaches and the disciples suggest sending the people away, Jesus gives a challenging response: "Give them some food yourselves."

The disciples see only scarcity – five loaves and two fish among thousands of people. But Jesus sees possibility. Taking the little they have, he blesses it, breaks it, and gives it to the disciples to distribute. Not only is everyone satisfied, but twelve baskets of fragments remain.

This miracle prefigures the Eucharist, where Jesus continues to take, bless, break, and give himself to nourish us for our journey. It also reveals a profound truth: in God's economy, when we offer our "not enough," it becomes more than enough in his hands.

The Eucharist isn't just about receiving; it's about becoming – becoming the Body of Christ for a hungry world. Jesus' words to the disciples echo to us today: "Give them some food yourselves." Having been nourished by Christ, we're sent to nourish others – not just with material food, but with compassion, justice, hope, and love.

This week, we ask ourselves: What "loaves and fishes" – what seemingly insufficient resources - might God be asking you to offer? How is God calling you to feed others from what you have received?

WHAT IS LITURGY? BY DEACON JOE CABRIDO

You've heard the word **liturgy** commonly spoken in church: Eucharistic liturgy, liturgy of the word, liturgy of the hours, baptismal liturgy, etc. And because we hear it so often, it is assumed everyone knows what it means. I always thought of it as public prayer, but I learned that there is more to it than that, and its meaning changed over time as Christianity developed.

The word liturgy originates from the Greek word *leitourgia*, derived from two other words *leitos* or *leos*, meaning people or public, and the verb *ergon*, meaning to do. As early Christianity

was developing, the word used in the general population was *leitourgos*, which denoted someone who served in a public duty of some kind, in the service of others. And so secularly, the noun *leitourgia* came to mean to support some public work of some kind or to minister to people, or it also came to mean the public work itself.

As the early church was developing and trying to understand what Church meant, the early Christians began to view some of what they were experiencing as *leitourgia*, as work done for others by someone. Early Christians began to see Christ as *leitourgos*. In his letter to the Hebrews, St. Paul teaches that Jesus is the eternal high priest who ministered to us by offering himself as a sacrifice to give us the gift of salvation.

Eventually, the word liturgy became to be understood as the worship of God and its associated rites and rituals. For the first hundred years, beginning with St. Paul, he uses the phrase, "breaking of the bread". The patristic fathers then called it *mysterium* or mysteries, but it wasn't until the Council of Trent in the 16th century that the word "liturgy" was re-introduced and became standard use referring to the Holy Mass, or Eucharistic liturgy.

And it wasn't until 1947, in his encyclical *Mediator* that Pope Pius XII offered a formal definition of liturgy, stressing that it is a public act. It is public worship by Christ to the Father, and community to its Founder through Christ. It is a public action that is communal, work done by the sacramental community, the Mystical Body of Christ, for the entire world. Liturgy is not a personal prayer. Nor is it a show for public display, or just following rubrics, but a public act of praise and adoration of God to return us to the right relationship with the Father.

This definition becomes the seed for teachings of the Second Vatican Council on liturgy, "considered as an exercise of the priestly office of Jesus Christ himself, and in this liturgy, the whole public worship is performed by the Mystical Body of Jesus Christ, that is, by the Head and His members".

This is why we are encouraged strongly to actively participate in Mass and not be passive spectators. By participating in liturgy, we are put in contact with the mystery of the Triune God, experiencing Jesus using our five senses through the words and actions of the liturgy. Active participation involves being fully engaged both outwardly and inwardly in the liturgy, including conscious prayer, attentive listening, and outward gestures. It's not just about attending Mass but about actively uniting oneself with Christ and the Church in the sacred mystery being celebrated. So, don't spectate. Actively participate.




FAMILY AND KID STUFF TO DO DURING THE MONTH OF JUNE AND SUMMER MONTHS!
