



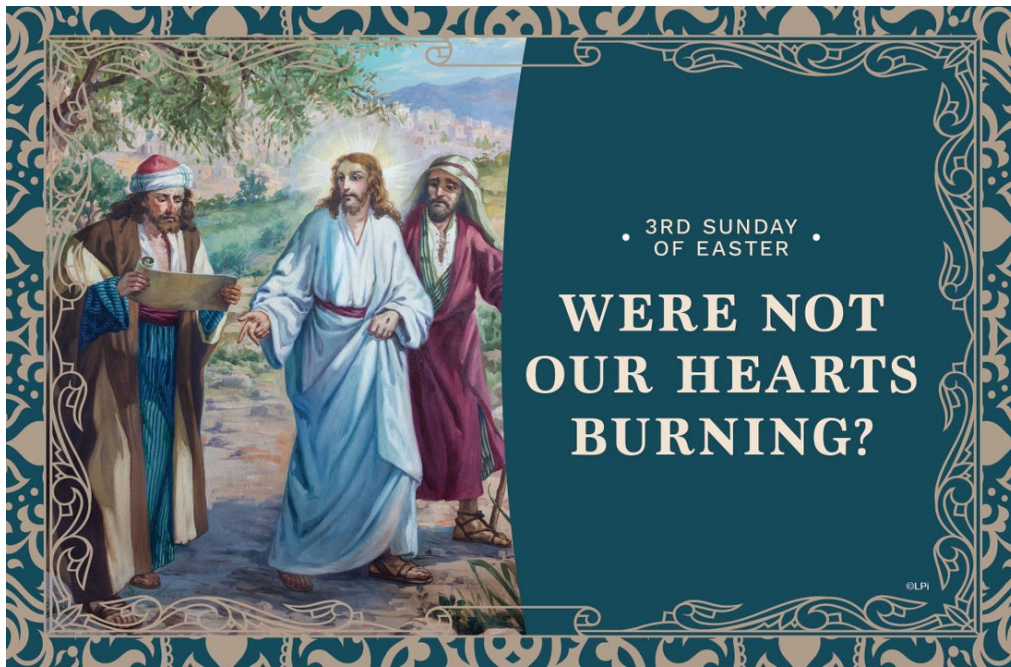

## REFLECT & RESPOND TO SCRIPTURE

### TODAY'S READINGS

Acts 2:14, 22-33;  
 Psalm 16;  
 1 Peter 1:17-21;  
 Luke 24:13-35

#### First Reading:

In his first speech on the streets of Jerusalem, Peter quotes Psalm 16 as proof of God's promise to David in raising Jesus from the dead. Have you ever made a promise to God?

#### Second Reading:

In the resurrection of Jesus, Peter urges us to have our faith and hope in God. What is something you could hope for from God this week?

#### Gospel:

Jesus' interpretation of Scripture opened the eyes of the two disciples. Does reading the Bible bring you clarity?

Today's readings focus on a theme of "sojourning." As Christian stewards, we know that our lives are a sojourn toward the ultimate destination of heaven.

Our second reading instructs us to "conduct yourselves with reverence during the time of your sojourning, realizing that you were ransomed... with the precious blood of Christ." What a powerful reminder during the Easter season of our "why" for embracing the stewardship way of life — we have been ransomed by our Lord's saving death and Resurrection. Our lives are a gift from Him — as we sojourn through life, we are to make our lives a gift to Him in return.

Our Gospel passage today describes a sojourn as well — the familiar Easter season story of the two disciples on the road to Emmaus. The two are dejected and despondent after Jesus' death. These men knew Jesus personally. They were believers. They had heard the Gospel message directly from His lips. They talked with Him, traveled with Him, and ate with Him. They heard the testimony of the women who discovered our Lord's empty tomb and saw a vision of angels announcing He was alive. And if that were not enough, they had also been informed by other disciples who went to the tomb that all was exactly as the women reported.

How much more obvious could the Good News be?

And yet, at times, the reaction of the two disciples describes our own walk of faith, doesn't it? We have the fullness of the Catholic faith, the power of the sacraments, and the support of our parish family. Yet, we lose our way. We fail to see all the gifts we have been given. We lack trust in the perfect goodness and almighty power of God. The life of a disciple — even for us modern-day disciples — is truly a sojourn, with valleys and mountaintops, wrong turns, and course corrections required regularly.

Our Lord offers a course correction to the two disciples who have lost their way, opening their eyes to the reality of His presence and the truth of His Resurrection. What happens when their eyes are opened once again, and they recognize Jesus in the Eucharist — "the breaking of the bread"? They are transformed! Their hearts are set on fire with love for the Lord and for their faith. They recall that their hearts began "burning within" as the Lord was explaining the Scriptures to them.

So, what can we do when we become discouraged, when we need our hearts set on fire once again? We can go to the same sources as the two disciples on the road to Emmaus — the Scriptures (the living Word of God) and the Eucharist (the very source and summit of our faith). Frequent recourse to these two gifts from our Lord is essential to sustain us in the stewardship way of life.

In this Easter season, resolve to feast deeply on these two sources of grace. They are the fuel that will propel us on the journey toward heaven, with a renewed sense of joy and gratitude as we go!

### TEMPERANCE, EXPLAINED!

“For the grace of God has appeared bringing salvation to the entire human race... (teaching) us to reject godless ways and worldly desires,” reads Titus 2:11-12, “and in the present age to lead lives that are temperate, just and godly.”

This cardinal virtue of temperance is shown in the person who is master of his passions and his attachment to the world. “It ensures the will’s mastery over instincts and keeps desires within the limits of what is honorable,” we read in the Catechism (CCC 1809).

Temperance is not repression of feeling; it is an exercise of the will, a careful and calculated choice. In this way, temperance actually safeguards virtuous love, keeping it “whole and uncorrupted,” said St. Augustine. The practice of temperance is intimately linked to the virtue of chastity, which “protects the intimate center of the person...refusing to unveil what should remain hidden” (CCC 2521).

# OUR CATHOLIC FAITH

## FATES, PATRONAGES & SYMBOLS OF THE APOSTLES

In Catholic usage, patronage means a spiritual form of protection/intercession—an apostle or saint is regarded as a protector of God’s help for persons, places, and needs. Pope Leo XIII explicitly invokes “the Princes of the Apostles, Peter and Paul, [as] guardians and protectors of the Christian name.” He also speaks of receiving help from the celestial patronage of all these.

APOSTLE	MANNER OF DEATH	PATRON SAINT OF...	SYMBOLS OF THE APOSTLES
PETER	<b>Crucified upside down</b> in Rome, as he felt unworthy to die like Jesus.	Popes, fishermen, locksmiths, and bridge builders.	<b>Crossed Keys</b> (representing the "keys to the kingdom of heaven") or an <b>Upside-down Cross</b> .
ANDREW	<b>Crucified on an X-shaped cross</b> in Patras, Greece.	Scotland, Russia, fishermen, and throat ailments.	An <b>X-shaped Cross</b> (Saltire), often referred to as "St. Andrew's Cross."
<b>JAMES (ZEBEDEE)</b> Commonly known as James the Greater (or James the Great)	<b>Beheaded</b> in Jerusalem by King Herod Agrippa I (the first apostle martyred).	Spain, pilgrims, veterinarians, and oyster fishers.	A <b>Scallop Shell</b> , a traveler’s Staff, and a <b>Gourd</b> (symbols of a pilgrim).
JOHN	The only apostle to <b>die of old age</b> in Ephesus after surviving being boiled in oil.	Authors, theologians, and burn victims.	A <b>Chalice with a Snake</b> (referencing a legend where he was given poisoned wine but the poison left in the form of a snake) or an <b>Eagle</b> .
PHILIP	<b>Crucified</b> (some say upside down) or hanged in Hierapolis, Turkey.	Hatters, pastry chefs, and the countries of Uruguay and Luxembourg.	A <b>Tall Column or a Basket of Bread</b> (referencing his role in the feeding of the 5,000).
BARTHOLOMEW	<b>Flayed alive</b> and then beheaded or crucified in Armenia.	Leatherworkers, tanners, plasterers, and those with skin diseases.	A <b>Flaying Knife</b> (often a curved blade) or a <b>Human Skin</b> draped over his arm.
THOMAS	<b>Stabbed with a spear</b> in Mylapore, India.	Architects, builders, surveyors, and the country of India.	A <b>Spear (his martyrdom)</b> or a <b>Square Rule</b> (referencing his patronage of builders/architects).
MATTHEW	<b>Killed with a sword</b> or halberd in Ethiopia.	Accountants, bankers, tax collectors, and bookkeepers.	A <b>Winged Man (or Angel)</b> or a <b>Money Bag/Account Book</b> (from his time as a tax collector).
<b>JAMES ALPHAEUS</b> primarily known as James the Lesser (or James the Less)	<b>Stoned and clubbed to death</b> or thrown from the Temple pinnacle in Jerusalem.	Pharmacists, hatmakers, and dyers.	A <b>Fuller’s Club</b> (the heavy wooden tool used to beat him to death).
SIMON THE ZEALOT	<b>Sawed in half</b> or crucified in Persia or Britain.	Sawyers, tanners, and woodcutters.	A <b>Large Saw</b> (the instrument used to martyr him).
JUDE THADDEUS	<b>Killed with an ax</b> or arrows in Persia.	<b>Lost causes</b> , desperate situations, and hospitals.	A <b>Club or an Oar</b> (referencing his travels), and often a <b>Medallion with the face of Jesus on his chest</b> .
MATTHIAS	<b>Stoned and beheaded</b> in Jerusalem or Ethiopia.	Alcoholics, carpenters, and tailors.	An <b>Ax or a Halberd</b> (representing his beheading).
PAUL	<b>Beheaded</b> in Rome under Emperor Nero.	Missions, theologians, writers, and public relations.	A <b>Sword</b> (the instrument of his beheading) and a <b>Book or Scroll</b> (representing his Epistles).

## AROUND THE DIOCESE

### NOW ACCEPTING APPLICATIONS FOR 2026-2027 ACADEMIC YEAR

#### WHAT IS THE PROGRAM?

Students attend six semesters completed in three years. All students attend weekly classes on Wednesday evenings. The Institute meets during a regular academic school year with classes beginning in the fall semester. The two-year core curriculum includes Sacred Scripture, Christology, Ecclesiology, Church History, and the relevance and importance of the Sacraments. Students are also exposed to material that makes up much of the Church's contemporary debates in social justice and morality. In addition, students go through a module on discernment that starts at the end of their first year and continues at the beginning of their second year. The students, in consultation with their pastors, determine how they will exercise their leadership in the parish and how they will focus and participate during the years of ministry formation. The third year includes courses on pastoral ministry to give the students a solid foundation in Catechetics (Children, Youth, and Adult), Liturgy, and Social Justice Ministry. Students gather once a month on a Saturday for leadership training in communications, conflict management, lay

ministry, and cultural diversity. These special sessions are designed specifically to teach the students how to work effectively with others in the spirit of Christ. Other Saturday sessions focus on the spiritual growth of the pastoral person.



#### WHAT ARE THE REQUIREMENTS?

Here are some qualities of the ideal candidate:

- a call to the ministry of leadership within the Catholic community
- demonstrated or potential leadership ability
- current participation in pastoral ministry
- prior formation in the faith
- willingness to commit to 10-12 hours per month for classes
- ability to complete the reading and writing assignments
- ability to devote additional hours outside of class for assignments.

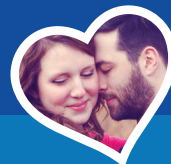

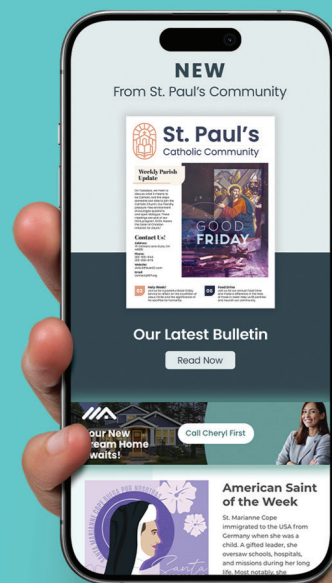

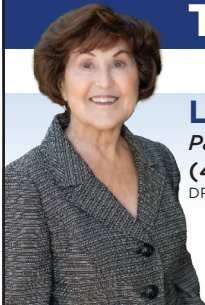
