

# Faithful Chronicles By Father Frank D. Almade

(Bishop Zubik very graciously invited me to preach at last year's annual Labor Day Mass in St. Benedict the Moor Church in the Hill District, prior to the Labor Day parade. This year both the Mass and parade are cancelled because of the coronavirus pandemic. This was my sermon in 2019.)

Anniversaries not only remind us about our past, they also challenge us to determine what we value in the present.

This Labor Day, the Diocese of Pittsburgh hosts the 60th annual Mass celebrating workers and labor unions. It was begun by then-Bishop John Wright on September 7, 1959, right after he was appointed as our eighth bishop. As a kid I can still remember being dragged by my dad, a proud member of the United Steelworkers local 1843 in Hazelwood, to Labor Day Masses at St. Paul Cathedral. At least one Mass was even held in the former Civic Arena, with maybe 10,000 in attendance. In the late 1970s, the Mass was moved to St. Benedict the Moor Church in the Hill District, to serve the many labor leaders, politicians and workers who would walk in the parade.

This year also marks another, sadder, anniversary. One hundred years ago over 350,000 steelworkers went on strike in 16 states. The American Federation of Labor and many smaller unions had struggled to organize the country's steel mills, after the failure of the 1892 Homestead steel strike against the Carnegie Steel Company, where Pinkerton guards killed ten men. Eventually the power of the owners used law enforcement, health departments and banking to pressure workers to end their strike after 15 weeks. Union organizing in steel plants wouldn't become viable again for another 15 years.

A Pennsylvania historical marker acknowledges the Great Steel Strike of 1919 in the parking lot of the USW local 1219 in Braddock. It also notes, "Rev. Adalbert Kazincy, pastor of St. Michael's here, championed the strikers and provided the church as a meeting place." Across the street from the sign is Good Shepherd Catholic Church, which before the merger of seven parishes in Braddock in 1985, was called St. Michael the Archangel. Both the sign and the church are in the shadow of the Edgar Thomson steel mill, now in its 147th year of operation, which is part of U.S. Steel's Mon Valley Works.

Father Kazincy was an immigrant from Slovakia, who in 1896 was named pastor of St. Michael the Archangel Church in Braddock. In his pastoral care for his parishioners he came to see the hardships the mills inflicted on men, women and children. Six and seven days of work a week, ten and twelve hours a day, no health benefits and unsafe working conditions for the workers.

In 1919 when the strike began "Father K" allowed union organizers into his church to – yes, pray – as well as organize and teach and feed and support workers. The banks tried to foreclose the mortgage on his church. His

bishop at the time tried to stop his pastoral care to these workers, most of whom were immigrants from eastern Europe. The legislature dragged him into hearings and possible criminal accusations. But Father K held firm in his concern for steel workers and their families, before, during and after the 1919 strike. He remained pastor in Braddock until his death in 1947.

In one of those personal ironies only God can create, I am a successor to Father K. If only I could be one tenth of the priest he was.

The third anniversary for this year is a seminal document of the Catholic bishops of the United States, called "The bishops' program for social reconstruction." It was ghostwritten by a young priest from Minnesota, John A. Ryan, who would go on to be an advisor on labor issues to President Franklin Delano Roosevelt during the Great Depression.

This 1919 document was far ahead of its time.

One section of the document was entitled "abolition and control of monopolies." The bishops wrote, "Human beings cannot be trusted with the immense opportunities for oppression and extortion that go with the possession of monopoly power."

To oppose monopolies, the bishops encouraged employee ownership. The bishops affirmed the principle of the universal destination of goods, that is, that the goods of God's earth are for all, not just the one-tenth of one percent. Worker participation in management and ownership can enhance productivity, increase profitability and provide greater job security.

The 1919 bishops' program wholeheartedly backed unions and the union movement. Years before the national Labor Relations Act, the bishops' program asserted the right of labor to organize and deal with employers through representatives. Here the bishops were completely in line with Pope Leo XIII's groundbreaking 1891 social encyclical "Rerum Novarum." All popes since then down to Pope Francis continue to affirm and protect the rights of workers and the value of unions.

A fourth issue the 1919 bishops' program supported was universal health care. Health care is a right of all persons, and needs to be brought about by government and society, employing the principle of subsidiarity.

These anniversaries challenge us today. Is it possible for church leaders and union leaders to work more closely together, especially in advocating for the rights of immigrants and asylum-seekers? Is it possible for our country to truly embrace and enact universal health care for all its citizens? Can workers in the so-called gig economy get a living and family wage with proper benefits during the largest bull market in our country's history? Can union membership increase, in the face of powerful monopolies? What anniversaries will our children remember?





## **CHOIRS RETURN (VIRTUALLY SPEAKING)**

During the summer of 2020, more than 70 singers and musicians have shared their talents in our virtual choir videos, which have been viewed more than ten thousand times on our parish YouTube channel: www.YouTube.com/c/SJWPitt . Health and safety concerns mean we can't rehearse and sing together in the same space this fall, but that won't stop the SJW Music Ministry. Taking full advantage of available technology, we are forming two new St. Joseph Virtual Choirs:

- A four-part traditional choir for singers with experience singing in parts, and
- A unison/two part contemporary music ensemble for singers of all ages who enjoy singing, but are not (yet) comfortable singing in harmonies.

Both choirs will rehearse weekly using the online meeting site, *Zoom*. After rehearsal, choir members will submit individual videos to director Norm Chapman, who will combine them to create Virtual Choir videos for inclusion in our Sunday Mass Live Stream. The videos will also be seen and heard on big screen TVs in some of our churches and on our YouTube channel, ministering to viewers all over the world. By using technology, our choirs will enhance our weekly worship experience, and enrich the spiritual lives of St. Joseph the Worker parishioners and all who view our videos.

Rehearsals will begin the week after Labor Day. The Contemporary Choir will rehearse on Tuesdays from 7:15-8:15 pm, and the Traditional Choir will rehearse on Wednesdays from 7:15-8:15 pm.

### THE GIFTS OF THE SACRAMENTS: HOLY ORDERS WITH FR. MOHLER

Through baptism all Christians are configured to Christ and become members of the Church as a priestly people (see CCC 1591). But Jesus also called men to be set apart as priests to lead and minister to His people and in His name. "Holy Orders is the sacrament through which the mission entrusted by Christ to his apostles continues to be exercised in the Church until the end of time" (CCC 1536). "The ordained ministers exercise their service for the People of God by teaching, divine worship, and pastoral governance" (CCC 1592).

Priesthood and fatherhood are central to the call of Holy Orders. A priest is an authorized mediator who offers sacrifice to God on behalf of others and returns blessings from God. Fatherhood is not merely a biological reality but a call to guide, protect, and support those under his care. We see this lived out throughout salvation history, from the patriarchs who offered God sacrifices on behalf of their families (see Gen. 8:21, 12:8), to later when God called the men of the tribe of Levi to serve as the priests for Israel's collective worship (Ex. 32:29). Jesus likewise chose 12 men to serve as the new priests and fathers in His Church and this is why men alone can receive the sacrament of Holy Orders. The sins of priests violate this fatherly call, yet it does not prevent the grace of God from working in the sacraments. The authority given to the ordained is meant to be used to model the sacrificial love of Christ in humble servant leadership.

#### The Three Ranks of Holy Orders

From the New Testament there already exists a vision of different offices to lead in the name of Christ: as bishop/ overseer (Acts 20:28), presbyter/priest/elder (Acts 14:23) and deacon/servant (Acts 6:1-6). Each ones ultimate importance comes not just from their ministry, but in how it conforms the recipient to Christ and allows them to make Him known. Thus this sacrament gives a permanent indelible mark to the one ordained that cannot be lost or taken away, like in Baptism and Confirmation. Bishops possess the fullness of Holy Orders and the priesthood as true successors of the apostles. They are selected by the Pope and normally become pastors or shepherds of a particular diocese to lead the people of God in that region. Each bishop also must select and ordain the men who will serve under him as priests and deacons in the local church. Priests share in the priestly office that is bestowed on them and are given authority to act in the person of Christ to bring the sacraments to the people of God, most especially through the Eucharistic sacrifice from which "their whole priestly ministry draws its strength" (CCC 1566). Deacons are ordained to a unique life of service in the Church, where they too receive the permanent character of Holy Orders and yet are ordained "not unto the priesthood but unto the ministry" (CCC 1569). This makes them a bridge between the laity and the priesthood as they minister under the bishop and with his priests, in the service of the liturgy, the Gospel and in works of charity (CCC 1588).

Celibacy is a gift that has been practiced from the very beginnings of the Church as a means by which a Christian can more directly unite himself to Christ and service in His Church "for the sake of the kingdom of heaven" (Mt. 19:12). This makes it fitting that celibacy has a place as part of the sacrament. For example, only celibate men are chosen from the priesthood to become bishops. In the Western Church, only celibate men, who have first been ordained deacons (known as transitional deacons) are ordained priests in taking on the service of the Church as their bride. Men who are already married can be ordained as deacons (called permanent deacons) in the West, or as either deacons or priests in the Eastern churches.

#### **Rite of Ordination**

"The essential rite of the sacrament of Holy Orders for all three degrees consists in the bishop's imposition of hands on the head of the ordinand and in the bishop's specific consecratory prayer asking God for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit and his gifts proper to the ministry to which the candidate is being ordained" (CCC 1573). Bishops alone can ordain men who are chosen for these offices, while multiple bishops gather to ordain new bishops after they have been selected by the Pope. Various rites appropriate to each ministry are used in the different ordination rites, including an anointing of the hands with the holy chrism to those men who are consecrated as priests.

Both of my ordinations, first as a deacon and then as a priest, were powerful liturgies where I encountered the Lord's invitation into a sacred ministry which is much bigger than myself. I am continually humbled by the call to Holy Orders and ask for your prayers for me, all other clergy, and the men who are discerning a call into this powerful ministry.
