

Vocation Prayer for July


This month please pray for **Mateusz Puzanowski**, First Pre-Theology, St. Joseph, Central Falls



The Saint we invoke this month is **St. Junipero Serra**, Feast Day: July 1. Saint Junipero Serra, patron of vocations to Church ministry and missionary to the Americas, established 21 missions throughout California and Mexico and aided the conversions of many natives of the New World to the Catholic Faith. May Saint Junipero intercede in behalf of all those who are called to missionary work.

A Summer Reading Suggestion:

The Case for Jesus, by Dr. Brant Pitre, is an outstanding book which can have a transformational impact on the reader. It presents much evidence that strongly supports what Christ claimed about Himself, namely, that He is God. Pitre's understanding of this subject has been enhanced by his early experiences of studying religion at Louisiana State University, and during a master's program at Vanderbilt University. It was then that he began to doubt, and nearly lost his faith. His instructors were pushing theories that the Gospels were anonymously written, and that we didn't really know who wrote them, and that Jesus never actually claimed He was God. In his 200-page work, Pitre points out that there are no anonymous ancient manuscripts of the gospels in existence, and that the early Church fathers of the 1st through 3rd centuries did not adhere to this idea, but recognized Matthew, Mark, Luke and John as the true authors in their writings. Most importantly, Pitre brings out very strong evidence that Christ is God, by examining the truth of the messianic prophecies, with significant emphasis on Daniel chapters 2, 7, and 9. As a scholar of ancient Judaism, he is able to bring to light insights that have sadly been lost to many contemporary Christians. It is not exaggeration to say that if people were aware of these, as well as many other points that Pitre brings out, that they would be bordering on insanity to not take Christianity seriously.



Not only did the prophet Daniel predict, according to ancient Jewish interpretation, that the Divine Messiah would come during the time of the Roman Empire, but that He would be killed and His everlasting Kingdom would be established. In Daniel Chapter 9, it appears that Daniel prophesied His death exactly 490 years (70 weeks of years) from the year when Persian King Artaxerxes commanded that Jerusalem be rebuilt. According to Pitre, the order to rebuild Jerusalem went out in the seventh year of Artaxerxes' reign, which was in 457 B.C.. Adding 490 years to this gives us the year 33 A.D.

The New Testament also gives much evidence of Christ's divinity, as Pitre points out, not just John's Gospel, but all the synoptic (comprehensive) Gospels. His study of ancient Judaism gives him a particularly important insight into some of Christ's final words: "My God, My God, why have you forsaken Me." For some, this appears to be a scandal, as it appears to them that Christ is despairing. However, the author points out that, in ancient Judaism, it was the custom to refer to a particular psalm by its first stanza. The phrase, "My God, My God, why have you forsaken Me" refers to Psalm 21. In this psalm, we see more evidence that Christ's suffering and death have been foretold in great detail by the prophets, and that this will be followed by a great victory, as the 'families of the nations shall worship Him.' This was the message that Our Lord wanted to call our attention to with His dying breath, and yet, few today seem to be aware of this.

Pitre also brings in the testimony of first century Jewish historian Flavius Josephus, in order to crystallize for the reader the significance of Christ being pierced in His side, and of blood and water flowing out from His side. Josephus, who was a Jewish priest, but who also wrote extensively about the Jewish wars, and to some degree about the early Christians, described what happened at the temple during the Passover. Large numbers of observant Jews brought Lambs to the temple to be sacrificed. At the foot of the altar were drains, where the blood flowed through. This blood then flowed into a stream of water that flowed under the temple, which then flowed out of the side of the temple. The blood and water therefore flowed out of the side of the temple. That blood and water also flowed out of the side of Christ indicates that Christ is the true temple. Ancient Jews believed that God was present everywhere, but they believed that He was present in a special way inside the temple. If the body of Christ is the true Temple, then God is also present inside the body of Christ in a special way. It's interesting and unusual how John wrote about the blood and water coming from the side of Christ. He mentioned that there was an eyewitness who saw it, and that his testimony is reliable; it is evident that He very much wants the reader to believe this, and that he attaches special significance to it. It is likely that the blood and water coming from the side of the temple was a well known feature of life for ancient Jews in Jerusalem, and that they were likely to get the significance of its connection with Christ crucified.

During His earthly ministry, Christ was confronted by the Pharisees and scribes, who demanded a sign. Christ responded by saying that they will get none, other than the "sign of Jonah." Pitre, using his knowledge of ancient Hebrew and Judaism, brings out some important detail of what this means, per a reading of the book of Jonah in Hebrew. Popular accounts of Jonah's experience in the whale (or big fish) are that he was alive in the whale and was vomited out alive after 3 days. But a careful reading of the Book of Jonah indicate that he died in the belly of the whale. The phrase that his 'spirit fainted' indicates that he died, as well as the phrase that He cried out from the 'belly of Sheol,' as this is a standard Old Testament term for the realm of the dead. So one aspect of the "sign of Jonah" is that Jonah died, but after three days was resurrected. Another aspect of the "Sign of Jonah" is the conversion of Ninevah, the capital of the Assyrian empire, one of the Israelites' fiercest pagan enemies. The conversion of this vast city, after Jonah called its inhabitants to repentance, was a stunning event to the ancient Jews. So the Sign of Jonah mirrors the death and resurrection of Christ and mirrors what was probably considered unlikely at the time, the future conversion of many additional pagan nations to faith in Christ. Therefore, the "Sign of Jonah" is yet another sign of Christ's divinity.

This incomplete summary of Dr. Pitre's presentation is enough to understand that the teaching that many Christians have received is seriously lacking key elements. It is definitely a reason why many Churches today are nearly empty. His book is a significant contribution to solving this problem, and it's very important that it be widely read.

Feast of St. Swithun: 15th of July

Swithun, also spelled Swithin, was born in Wessex, England and was educated at the old monastery, Winchester, where he was ordained. He became chaplain to King Egbert of the West Saxons, who appointed him tutor of his son, Ethelwulf, and was one of the King's counselors. Swithun was named bishop of Winchester in 852 when Ethelwulf succeeded his father as king. Swithun built several churches and was known for his humility and his aid to the poor and needy. He died on July 2. A long-held superstition declares it will rain for forty days if it rains on his feast day of July 15, but the reason for and origin of this belief are unknown.
